Pool Update

he good news is, we won't have to replace our pool. According to recent studies of our pool infrastructure (initiated because of several closings in 2018), the heart of our pool and kiddie pool are in good shape. The studies* evaluated the adult pool concrete shell in the ground including piping, plumbing, electrical, and drains embedded in or under the pool decking. A lot of work needs to be done to get the pools into condition to carry us forward for several years.

The pool studies' findings were:

- ▶The bathhouse/changing rooms need to be updated. The roof and pipes leak;, and there is mold on one wall.
- ▶Plumbing and electrical needs to be brought up to code.
- The pool skimmers and much of the mechanical equipment needs to be replaced.
- The issues involving the handling of liquid waste are being addressed; the planis to use as much pool "gray water" as we can to irrigate our landscaping.
- Drainage in and around pool needs to be improved.
- ► More bracing support is required for the steel shade structure. We plan to

add more structures and are looking into using solar panels on the roofs to help reduce the use of natural gas for heating.

► Additional new features will include a family changing room, an outdoor rinse shower; outdoor lockers and new storage facilities to pool equipment and accessories.

The plans for the repairs before our scheduled May 25 opening: the men's and women's locker rooms, deck apron/skimmers, drainage, septic system & backwash. After the pool closes in the fall, other repairs will ensue. The Vistas and the ECIA website will provide updates every month on the pool work as



it progresses. Pool plans have been submitted for permits. *Names of companies doing studies are available at the ECIA office.



Facilities & Grounds Town Hall

Facilities and Grounds Community Forum was held on January 10. The forum was led by Nolan Zisman, the Facilities & Grounds Committee Chair. 35 facilities and grounds enthusiasts attended. They learned about current facility plans and added their input on current and future amenities.

County Commissioner Ed Moreno, District 5, representing Eldorado, attended and reported that improvements for the Rail Trail are scheduled. Work to reinforce the bridge on Ave Vista Grande just west of the 285 traffic light is planned.

A significant concern is the status of the swimming pool, the changes needed and the opening on May 25.

The F&G is working from a 5-year plan. Some of the proposed work for 2019 includes installation of strategically placed security cameras, working on establishing dedicated pickleball courts, new play equipment at the ECIA Community Center, improvement of the Hike/Bike trail on Ave Compadres, and ball field improvements. More information is available from the committee.

All attendees spoke of their ideas about use, improvements, and additions to ECIA amenities. Many ideas were expressed, and the meeting concluded with lots of enthusiasm about the future. A partial list of audience comments follows:

Legislative Town Hall

n **January 8**, 75-80 people attended a Town Hall Forum hosted by State Senator *Peter Wirth* (D-25), and State Representative *Matthew McQueen* (D-50) at the La Tienda Performance Space. They are hopeful for a productive 60-day legislative session working with the new NM Governor D- *Michelle Lujan Grisham*. Both are sensing a new cooperative spirit, which could include more non-partisan legislation. A large number of bills have been pre-filed.

Some tasks to be addressed include:

- ► Education, especially funding for early childhood development and preschools.
- A gradual increase in the minimum wage.
- Outlawing the coyote killing contest and a ban on trapping.
- Tax reform C (i.e., GRT, gas, automobiles, homes, and property, etc.).

- ► Water issues are being handled, especially in light of the ongoing lawsuit with Texas.
- Energy Policy which encourages solar and wind development and does not depend on the \$1.1 billion temporary surplus from oil and gas.
- Promote tourism for NM.

Some concerns from the audience were:

Sale of Tesla cars in NM, gun control, should NM consider having a State Bank, status and provisions of the Health Security Act, concern over citizenship question on 2020 US Census, what is NM doing about global warming, and domestic violence handling and background checks for the safety of everyone.

Guy Monroe came to my place in Eldorado for a chat about his longtime residency in Eldorado, being a Fire Chief for the EL DO-RADO FIRE AND RESCUE Volunteer Fire Department, and being an owner of a passive solar home in our community. One of the first things he said to me was, "I don't want this to be about me."

He came to Eldorado in 1989 and moved into his south-facing adobe home.

Guy was a Fire Chief in Eldorado for 21 years and taught at the for the Indian School in Santa Fe. He was Principal for two and was their Safety Officer for 18 years. Now he enjoys spending time with his dog and volunteering at the dog park. He also enjoys old motorcycles and old trucks, and owns the 1949 Ford truck.

His pagers were on 24/7, and he could be headed to an accident with his fire department crew or responding to an emergency at the school at all hours. His trusty Harley Davidson motorcycle with flashing lights and siren took him there. He could leave work at any time to respond to emergencies in Eldorado due to the flexibility of the school administration and their critical value towards their home community. He respects and admires the ethics of his Native associates for their understanding and humanitarian priorities.

Teaching at the Indian school was an education for Guy. He had a student who was very bright, and Guy thought the student should go to college on a scholarship.

When he spoke to the young Pueblo student about it, the boy responded that he couldn't leave his home for that long. Guy explained that in his culture, the community comes first, family comes second, and the individual comes third. If he went away for years and came back to his Pueblo, it would be hard for the community to accept him because he would have been gone too long. In modern America, this would not be the case, but it provides an insight into how an ancient way of life has survived into the 21st century in New Mexico.

Guy is a thoughtful observer of life. He offers this bit of wisdom,"It is a wise person who looks beyond his own private life at the greater world, a wiser person who identifies problems that need to be addressed, and a humble person to become part of the solution." Guy offers his time and skills to Eldorado now as he has for all his years here.

Tree Samaritans

he Tree Samaritans started in 2015 with two trees on Avenida Eldorado. The next year it grew to include all the paved roads in Eldorado, (25 miles and almost 700 trees). The Tree Samaritans are committed to highway beautification and safety with a focus on deciduous trees along the roadside. These trees are tough and resilient, even in semi-drought conditions, but they are also messy trees which sometimes block visibility from side roads. The Tree Samaritans try to trim and shape the trees and encourage them to grow straight up. Sometimes they must remove trees that obscure road signs or block the line of sight at corners.

The group works with the Santa Fe County Public Works Department, which owns the roadside right of way. They help the County by identifying problem trees, responding to resident concerns, and saving the County from having to issue work orders. They can often save trees from being cut down, by doing some judicious pruning. The County helps them in turn by instructing mower operators to avoid young trees and by picking up the brush piles from their trimmings. They also work closely with the ECIA Road Committee, which has responsibility for monitoring road conditions.

The group has two seasons of intensive work. The first is from February 1 to April 15. During this time, they do significant pruning before the sap begins to flow. In the fall, they go out again to re-trim the new growth and shape the younger trees. In just a few months the trees can grow three or four feet taller and must be re-trimmed continuously to prevent branches from overhanging the roadway and bike paths.

Their goal is to re-trim all 25 miles of roadside trees every year. They almost made it in 2018 with nine volunteers, but they hope more volunteers will join them to share the work and learn about tree pruning. An excellent place to start is the annual Tree Pruning Workshop given by Tom Dominguez from the Agricultural Extension Office on February 5 from 5:30 to 7 pm at the Max Coll Community Center located at 16 Avenida Torreon.



The Tree Samaritans have grown from just one volunteer in 2015 to nine at the end of 2018, due in part to the Volunteer Fair in November 2018.

For the volunteers, the best part of this project is to see the fruits of their labor - the increasing number of green-leaved trees along the roadside. Best of all has been the support of community members, who often stop to acknowledge them or wave as they go by. They are also indebted to the ECIA Board for providing them with safety vests and cones to protect them on the roadside, and a small budget for tools. Oh No! We Have Mice

re heard them in the still of the night. Small scratching sounds, and scurrying noises, scampering rapidly from one room to another. Gnawing sounds that were remarkably loud. We had mice in the home! We knew mice were destructive - but we had never known how crazymaking their sounds could be.

In the winter months, mice are attracted to the shelter, warmth, and food sources. We had taken what we thought were proper precautions - removing thick shrubs near the door, repairing worn areas around windows, keeping the compost pile a reasonable distance away - but we still had mice in the house.

We tried setting traps, but the mice evaded them. We didn't



want to use poisons, they are dangerous to have in a house especially with pets and children. Also, toxins can take a long time to work and causes the mice to die within the home's walls, creating a horrible smell. Finally, rodenticides pose a significant risk to non-target wildlife;

bobcats, coyotes, hawks, and owls who eat the poisoned mice can bleed to death. It was time to call a professional.

We learned that once mice have discovered how to get into your home, they will "tell" their friends to follow by leaving a trail scented by urine. We learned that if you can stick a #2 pencil through a hole, a mouse can probably get through it and that it's smart to protect our cars because mice can get in them and destroy wires. We also learned that we should always use disposable gloves - maybe even a mask - and use disinfectant when handling dead mice or cleaning mouse droppings.

The best course was to find out where the mice were getting in. With the professional, we thoroughly checked the house for problem areas such as missing screens on vents, worn weather stripping around windows and doors, and tiny holes between vigas. We repaired where needed and thoroughly sealed additional holes with steel wool.

We learned that mice are enticed by food near the house: People food, pet food, bird food, compost, garbage, and even piles of edible materials such as cardboard. We relocated the birdfeeders a good distance from the house. Finally, we could sleep at night.


