ECIA Road Committee

Looking Around, Looking Ahead to Improve Eldorado's Roads

OST OF US WOULD NOT describe road maintenance oversight as a particularly exciting activity, but members of ECIA's Road Committee apparently do. They meet regularly at the Community Center to review how the responsible governmental agency, Santa Fe County, is maintaining and improving the roads in our area and how the ECIA can best assist in that process.

ELDORADO

Eldorado has 81 miles of roads, 55 of them unimproved, with varying degrees of grading for safety and drainage. In recent years, the Road Committee, working with the Santa Fe County government, persuaded the state legislature to budget funds that have provided a limited amount of paving and base-coursing (compacted gravel surfacing) for the roads most in need of improvement.

Under its chairman, Nolan Zisman, the Road Committee has become much more than a simple, informational link with the County Public Works Department. The present committee has divided up the ECIA area into zones and assigned its members the task of regularly inspecting roadways for erosion, washboarding, drainage, and sign maintenance problems. In addition, the committee is developing a community preference survey, which it will conduct by means of our web page (www.eldoradocommunity.org) and Vistas. The survey will determine what the majority of ECIA members want the County to do in the long run—pave our roads, base-course them, or keep them unimproved—except for some basic grading for safety and proper drainage. Dirt roads, many of us know, have special problems. In windy weather, they create a great deal of dust that settles on our furniture and in our lungs. Paved roads have their own problems, too; speeding cars that create a constituency for speed bumps is one of them.

Planning for Eldorado's road future is difficult in an age of budget shortfalls but one that the Road Committee does not flinch at. When Eldorado was being laid out by its original development company,

AMREP, the roads may have been base-coursed, but years of deferred maintenance since that time, combined with a lack of long-term planning or budget expenditures to support it, have resulted in a situation in which the ECIA Road Committee can only work to recommend improvements of the worst roads, hoping for the best.

In past years, ECIA members voted to impose a temporary increase in their dues for several years in

order to build up a road fund and assist the County road improvement effort. Avenidas Eldorado, Monte Alto and Caliente Road are successful examples of fiscal cooperation between the ECIA and Santa Fe County. With the last expenditure of such funds, however, such cofunding of road improvement projects has ended.

It is probably good to remind ourselves that, by our own choice, we are not living in a heavily infrastructured urban area where municipal services are plentiful and at the ready. Our lots are large and our neighbors a wholesome distance away. In our earlier lives, many of us traveled on roads that were paved and manicured, in comparison with those we ride on here. Plowing us out following a blizzard was a matter of hours, not days. But here, our homes "live lightly on the land," and the land—and many of our roads-can be well described as "untamed." Our Road Committee and its hard-working volunteers, Chairman Nolan Zisman and members Fred Raznick, Paul Wilkens, Bob Burdette, John Mifflin, Sherman Frankston, Lea Williams, and Dale **Knapp**, are doing their best for us and our roads. If you see any of them, thank them for their work. It's called "volunteer pay."

For road problems, including roadway conditions, signs down or defaced, or drainage problems, call 992-3010, Santa Fe County Public Works Depart-

Neighborhood Watch Is Also . . .

HELPING NEIGHBORS IN EMERGENCIES

T'S OUR WAY, from colonial days to the present. When there is a situation to be dealt with in a community, a need unresolved, or a clear and present danger—such as crime affecting an area— Americans give their time and effort to resolve it . . . together.

The County Sheriff and our local State Police Captain would agree. Eldorado's Neighborhood Watch, with nearly a thousand members, is an ongoing success. While crime is up everywhere else in Santa Fe County and the State of New Mexico, it's relatively down in Eldorado.

All who join Neighborhood Watch get "hot-sheet" alerts from law enforcement but also get email notices from their fellow members regarding suspicious people, vehicles and activities in and around their immediate neighborhoods.

Marilyn Walker, chair of the Eldorado Neighborhood Watch Committee, says that more can be done to tap into the volunteer power inherent in our community, however. Having lived in California where earthquakes and other natural disasters are more frequent and widespread than in New Mexico, she would like to see our Neighborhood Watch groups also improve our readiness for major natural and man-made emergencies.

Linking Neighborhood Watch with emergency preparedness is happening in many parts of the country. The Neighborhood Watch in Rancho Palos Verdes, California, has received positive recognition for getting its members to take simple, inexpensive steps that will protect lives and property when the 911 system is out of action, or when fire, police and emergency medical services cannot receive calls or have all of their assets occupied elsewhere.

Eldorado residents may well remember the major snowstorm we had three holiday periods ago, which blocked driveways, shut down roads and left shopping center shelves bare. Our Fire Chief, Guy Monroe, recounts many stories of his firefighters braving slick, snow-blocked roads to bring prescription medications to residents who had run out of the drugs they needed to survive.

Marilyn Walker says it well. "Getting ready for emergencies that affect us all is something best done by neighbors helping neighbors—not only during, but before an emergency occurs. Neighborhood Watch is about more than watching; it's about getting involved and doing something-together."



ASTRONOMY CORNER January 2010

What Is the Large Hadron Collider (LHC)?

Some have feared the LHC is a doomsday machine that will create black holes and cause the earth to disappear into one. But mainstream scientists are convinced the collider is safe. Basically the collider is a large donut-shaped machine, 17 miles around, about 500 feet underground near Geneva, Switzerland, in which beams of protons, suspended within giant magnets, are accelerated in two directions at nearly the speed of light to cause extremely small collisions which expel even smaller particles, leading to a better understanding of the physics and nature of the universe. After an initial glitch in September 2008, which shut down the collider for almost a year, the unit has recently been setting new records for particle collision energy. One of the many objectives of LHC is to create mini-black holes so they can be studied here on earth, as opposed to the large ones which are many lightyears away. Instead of swallowing the earth whole, these microscopic black holes are expected to dissipate within milliseconds. When the real science begins in 2010, the collider should yield critical new insights into the origin of the universe, which may require scientists to rewrite the physics textbooks.

White-winged Dove (WwD)

HAVE ONLY ONCE SPOTTED the white winged dove (WwD) at my house in the far western section of Eldorado, but this lovely bird can be easily found in spring and summer around the ECIA buildings and grounds. At first glance, the

> WwD is very similar to our Mourning Dove. Its body is 11.5 inches long

> > and its wing span is 19 inches. The color is a dull brownish gray, changing to light gray on the belly and under tail coverts.

Most notable are large white areas on the upper side of the wing contrasting with

very dark outer wings. When perched, the outer edge of the wing appears to be lined with white. The WwD's wings produce a slight whistle on takeoff and while flying, but the noise is much less pronounced than the Mourning Dove's distinctive whistling wings. The WwD has a very small range in the United States, and birds migrate to Central America

as far south as Costa Rica.

WwDs are found in thickets in arid areas. They perch high in trees but are found feeding on the ground, consuming grain, cactus fruit, berries and acorns. Food is stored in a

"crop" and is later ground up with grit in the gizzard to a digestible size. The male courts by bending low, spreading his tail and wings

to show off the white area. Pairs are monogamous during the breeding season. Females select the nest site and construct a flimsy nest of materials brought by the male. Nests are usually off the ground 5 to 20 feet. The female usually lays two eggs and may have multiple broods. The male incubates the eggs during the day, and the female incubates during late afternoon and night. Eggs hatch into helpless chicks in 13 to 14 days, and babies fledge in 13 to 16 days. Both parents feed the young. Young get crop milk followed by seeds as they grow in the nest. Outside of breeding season, WwDs are social and may be found in medium-size colonies. A breeding colony was found in Texas with 200 to 400 nests per acre!
