We Are So Smart

ith a third of its residents holding graduate degrees, Eldorado ranks as the second "smartest" community in the state.

DORADO

Defining "smart" solely in terms of academic attainment, the *New Mexico Business Weekly* ranks Eldorado just behind White Rock, New Mexico, in the brainpower sweepstakes. Some 40% of the people of White Rock have graduate degrees, whereas 33% of Eldorado's residents have reached similar attainments.

The highest "we're smart" ranking in the country went to Chevy Chase, Maryland, close by the scientific think tanks that surround our national capital. Two-thirds of its residents have advanced degrees.

A question arises from this news report. What does such a ranking mean? How can it help our individual and collective lives here? Eldorado is an unusual community in many ways. As noted above, it has a high brainpower quotient. It also depends on volunteers for meeting the needs of its residents, perhaps more so than any community in the state. ECIA's volunteers, by serving on its several committees, take care of our security, manage our greenbelts and wilderness preserve, oversee the maintenance of our buildings and grounds, prepare our budgets, and ensure that what we build and remodel follows the rules we have agreed to abide by. Even as they are stretched, often to their individual and personal limits, ECIA volunteers keep our yearly assessments low, lower than other local communities offering many fewer life-enhancing amenities than we enjoy. They keep our community looking good, feeling good, safe, secure, and financially in the black.

A maxim, based on common experience, is "If you really want something done, ask a busy person to do it." People who say they "don't have the time" to volunteer are making an excuse that the many busy people who do volunteer don't make. So, rather than ask people to volunteer, perhaps a better question to ask would be, how do you rank the priorities in your life, and where does volunteerism/civic engagement fall?

The following quotation may be from one of the most action-oriented, volunteer-dependent leaders in

history, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.: "Everybody can be great because anybody can serve. You don't have to have a college degree to

serve. You don't have to make your subject and your verb agree to serve. You only need a heart full of grace and a soul generated by love."

Hens and Goats

hould the Eldorado Community Improvement Association (ECIA) allow residents to keep animals such as hens and goats as pets on their property? The Board of Directors of the ECIA has established a process to consider this issue and ensure community participation.

First, the Board has asked the Sustainability, Planning and Education Committee to:

- ► Study and discuss the question.
- ▶ Allow time during the subcommittee's deliberations to hear from any residents who want to share their views. The Board wants to hear the widest range of perspectives throughout this process.
- Summarize the research and deliberations, and provide an unbiased examination of the pros and cons on the question, including food self-sufficiency, educational benefits, neighborliness, health, noise, odors, social impact, and any legal precedents that may pertain to the question.
- ▶ Identify a broad range of potential restrictions or conditions that would be applicable to the regulation of barnyard animals as household pets.

Second, the Board will post committee minutes, related information (or links), and the final report

Garage Requirements in the ECIA Covenants

ver the past year, the ECIA has had to deal with several, often long-standing covenant violations in which a home lacks actual, usable garage space for at least one car. Eldorado Covenants Article II, Section 4, addresses this garage requirement:

"There shall be provided garage space sufficient for the parking of at least one car for each residential unit."

In most covenant violations of this requirement, the homeowner has converted the garage into extra living space while leaving the garage door in place so that it appears from the road to be a functional garage. Of course, lacking space for one car to park in the garage is a violation of the covenants, regardless of appearances.

Recent Board Actions

The ECIA Board held its regular meeting on November 17 and took the following formal

- ▶ A variance was approved at 74 Moya Road for a small accessory building to be located more than 15 feet from the house.
- A variance was approved with conditions at 7 Lauro Road for a new portal 24 feet long, greater than the 20% Guideline maximum per facade for a minor architectural style.
- A variance was approved at 1 Cerrado Road for a 7-foot-tall screening fence 87 feet long, where the Guideline limit is 6 feet tall and 50 feet long.
- ► A variance was approved at 6 Monte Alto Way for a garage more than 15 feet from the primary residence.
- ▶ A permit was approved at 4 Duende Road for a split rail fence within the 50-foot front setback under a Guideline provision for driveway fences.
- ▶ The 2012 Operating Budget for the Association, including a \$340 annual assessment, was approved as recommended by the Finance Committee.
- A semiannual payment plan for assessments was approved, with an option for payment by credit card for either annual or semiannual payments. A small fee will be charged for both semiannual and credit card payments.
- Transfer of funds previously designated on the Balance Sheet as "Designated for Contingency"

If left unresolved, violations such as this can slow down or actually prevent the closing of a home sale. Therefore, the ECIA encourages all residents to come into covenant compliance by ensuring that their garage allows for the parking of at least one car. While the lengths of existing garages in Eldorado vary, the Architectural Graphics Standards established by the American Institute of Architects recommend that the minimum interior dimensions for a one-car garage be 20 feet deep and 12 foot 8 inches wide.

Residents who would like to retain their converted garages as living space can do so, provided they receive approval from the ECIA Architectural Committee for at least a one-car garage, and then build this required structure per the approved plans. was approved to the Replacement Reserve Fund.

- ▶ The Association's auditors were instructed to transfer any 2011 Operating Budget surplus at the end of the year to the Replacement Reserve Fund.
- ► A Replacement Reserve expenditure budget not to exceed \$318,656 was approved.

Board meetings are scheduled on the third Thursday of each month at 7 pm at the Community Center and are open to the public. Two ECIA Board Seats Open This Year

The Eldorado Community Improvement Association Board of Directors consists of seven members, and two of those positions will be open in 2012. The current members in those positions are Greg Bundrick and Lynn Mortensen.

Every Association member is eligible to run for a position on the Board as long as his or her assessments have been paid. Directors' terms are three years and there is no term limit.

Board members will be elected through the voting process that begins in January and culminates at the ECIA Annual Meeting in May 2012.

On January 2, interested ECIA members can pick up a nomination form, gather at least 25 valid signatures, submit them along with a 250-word resume (and optional photo), by March 1, and they will be listed on the ballot.

Ballots will be included in the Annual Report packets that all members in good standing will receive by mail (by March 31). The votes, collected by mail or delivered directly to the ECIA office by April 26,

will be tabulated and announced at the annual meeting on May 7.

The Board of Directors is responsible for the affairs of the Association, which includes supervising the general manager, who manages a half-dozen fulland part-time employees. The Board also oversees the management of the finances and amenities of the Association, and enforces the covenants that give Eldorado its character.

The direct work of the Board includes attending two Board meetings per month, attending meetings of one or more of the committees to which the member serves as a liaison, and participating in other activities and functions that are supported by the

The Board also oversees the work of 10 committees: Architectural Advisory, Conservation, Election, Facilities and Grounds, Finance, Information, Neighborhood Watch, Road, SPE (Sustainability, Planning and Education), and Stable.

Third, when the final report is prepared and posted, the Board will schedule a public forum (town hall meeting) to listen to and record comments and residents can hear out their neighbors.

Lastly, the Board of Directors will hold a public Board meeting, with opportunity for more community input, and will then vote yea or nay on a final motion on the matter.

Within this deliberation process, the Sustainability, Planning and Education Committee met at its regular meeting on December 8, 2011, and detailed some pros and cons regarding the keeping of hens and

developed some restrictions that might apply. The minutes from this meeting can be found on the Eldorado website, www.eldoradosf.org.

The regular meeting of the Sustainability, Planning and Education Committee (SPEC) is held on the second Thursday of each month at the Community Center at 7 pm, led by Dana Richards, chair of the committee. SPEC would like to receive input from residents on this

topic, as the committee continues to work through its deliberations.

Paul Harvey said that "in times like these it is good to remember that there have always been times like these." Eldorado has a proud history of people coming together, hearing each other out, and reaching a consensus about a pressing

community issue. This is one of those times where we have an opportunity to express values that support a fair and open debate and avoid polarization.

ASTRONOMY CORNER January 2012

Ominous predictions about 2012 abound. Some concern the Earth's polar magnetism, said to be shifting and causing strange phenomena like the Aurora Borealis being seen in the American South. NASA assures us, however, "that there is nothing in the millions of years of geologic record to suggest that any of the 2012 doomsday scenarios connected to a pole reversal should be taken seriously."

Earth's magnetic field has actually flipped its polarity many times over the millennia, in a pattern of pole reversal about every 200,000-300,000 yearsalthough it has been 780,000 years since the last major reversal. Over the course of hundreds or thousands of years, magnetic fields morph and push and pull at one another, with multiple poles emerging at odd latitudes in the process. Scientists estimate reversals have occurred hundreds of times over the past 3 billion years.

The fossil record shows no drastic changes in plant or animal life from the last reversal. Deep ocean sediment cores from this period also indicate no changes in glacial activity. This proves that a polarity reversal would not affect the rotation axis of Earth, as the planet's rotation axis tilt has a significant effect on climate and glaciation, and any change would be evident in the glacial record.

That said, the magnetic north pole has been moving northward – by more than 600 miles – since the early 19th century, when explorers first located it precisely. And it is moving even faster now, as scientists estimate the pole is migrating northward about 40 miles per year, as opposed to about 10 miles per year in the early 20th century.

American Kestrel (AK)

am always on the lookout for new birds in Eldorado but have now exhausted my list. Biologist **Dale Stahlecker** has shared his list and some specific bird information.

The American Kestrel (AK) is a lovely, small bird of prey, a falcon, about 9 inches long, with a wingspan of 22 inches. The adult male has gray (almost slate blue) on top of the head, a white collar with two black stripes running vertically from eye to neck and from the side of the head to the neck (sometimes

called a mustache and sideburn). His back, wings, and upper tail are a rufous brown with black bars. The underside is pale rufous with darker rufous spotting running along the belly. The female has gray wings, a distinct black edge of her tail and darker spots on the underside. The tail and wings are relatively long on this small raptor. AKs perch on wires or poles and can even hover as they search for food. They live in open or lightly treed areas.

Most prey is snatched from the ground, including insects, mice, voles, small invertebrates, and birds. Small snakes, lizards, and frogs may also be eaten anything small enough for the AK to kill.

The AKs are found throughout the U.S. and in many parts of Central and South America. They are permanent residents here, although many shift their territories to southern locations during winter. Nests are high, with little nesting material, and are located in a cavity. AKs take readily to nest boxes. Dale has had several pairs of AKs using nest boxes near his home and has banded at least one female who has unusual gray wing feathers. Two broods may be produced in a single year. Males during courtship flap, flutter, quiver their wings, and bow, while females bow and call. Promiscuous matings may happen before monogamous pair bonds are developed. Four or five eggs hatch in 29 to 31 days, and the semi-altricial, mostly helpless young fledge in 30 to 31 days.

The AK is the most common American falcon, but numbers are declining in some areas due to habitat loss, fewer insects due to use of insecticide, and insufficient cavities for nesting.

Household Emergency Preparation - FROM NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

The New Year is a good time to begin to ensure your household is ready for everythinggood or bad—that may come your way. Since most of us are ill prepared to survive a real emergency, here are some suggestions to help you cope.

Begin by assembling and maintaining a disaster supply kit with food, water, medications, fuel, and personal items adequate for at least three days and up to two weeks-the more the better. Consider your own needs, the needs of your children, any with poor health or disabilities and . . . your pets. Keep the kit in a designated place and be ready to "grab and go" in case you have to leave your home quickly. Make sure all household members know where the kit is kept.

Highest on your list should be water reserves. Drinking water in emergency situations should never be rationed. Therefore, it is critical to store adequate amounts of water for your household. The minimum recommended amount is one gallon per person per day. Seal water containers tightly, label them, and store them in a cool, dark place. It is important to change stored water every six months.

Foods that keep best include rice, dried beans, and canned goods (and, for pets, a supply of kibble). These, like water, should be changed semiannually. With reduced activity, healthy people can survive on half their usual food intake for an extended period or

without any food for many days. Food, unlike water, may be rationed safely, except for children and pregnant women.

A butane or propane gas stove—either a camp stove or gas grill—is ideal for food preparation, since utilities may be down. Under those circumstances, oil lamps, candles, and flashlights are essential, as are battery-powered radios and—if within your budget—a gasoline-powered generator. Needless to say, keep extra wheelchair batteries, oxygen, catheters, medication, or other items your household might need.

Set aside one complete change of clothing and footwear for each household member. Shoes should be sturdy work shoes or boots. Also consider including rain gear, hats, and gloves, extra socks, extra underwear, thermal underwear, and sunglasses in "grab and go" kits. Blankets or sleeping bags are also essential and often forgotten.

Consider keeping a small set of emergency supplies stored in your car at all times, including food and water, flares, jumper cables, and seasonal supplies, since you may be caught away from home.

Finally, keep a list of emergency contacts and phone numbers in your kit, a list of the type and serial numbers of any medical devices you need, and a map of the area and places you can go if you must evacuate.


