Care for Your Eldorado Garden

REETINGS TO ALL OF YOU weather-challenged gardeners in Eldorado! It seems that each season brings its own nemesis: if it's not heat or cold, it's wind or lack of moisture. We won't even mention the rabbits now—more on that in the near future.

All of us constantly get gardening tips from nursery staff, neighbors, newspapers, etc. Many of these tips, I would imagine, are valid; however, I have two for you that if taken will definitely improve your gardening or landscaping. The first is **winter watering** and the second is **mulching**.

Whenever I mention winter watering, the first thing to come up is snow. An interesting fact is that 10 gallons of snow is equal to only one gallon of water. That's not a whole lot of moisture, considering that part of it evaporates. The next concern is that those of us lucky enough to have a drip system can't use it for at least four months, from November through February. What this means is that we must water by hand. It has been so dry of late that I've been watering my Eldorado garden about every 10 days. Remember that the ground doesn't freeze very

deep and roots continue to grow most of the winter. A plant with well-developed roots has an easier time of it in March and April when the wind kicks in. So hang your hose in the garage so it won't be frozen when you need it. Slow, deep watering is the way to go, and believe me, you'll enjoy those 50 degree days we get blessed with even more.


The second great gardening tip has to do with mulching. So much of our moisture goes up into the air instead of into the plant. Our winter sun is so powerful that evaporation starts just minutes after watering. In addition to the sun, the wind also takes its toll, drying up any water. By mulching two to four inches around the root zone, we can save not only water, but also

"shrinkage" of established plants. The mulch holds in the moisture and protects the roots, topsoil, microorganisms and beneficial insects.

There are many types of mulch, ranging from those that disintegrate and turn into topsoil to those that are almost indestructible. Cotton burr compost—commercially called Back-to-Earth—is my favorite. It's inexpensive, readily available around town, comes in an easy-to-handle bag (or in bulk), turns into great soil, and is labeled organic. Other mulches include newspaper, grass clippings, compost, cardboard, gravel, plastic and other plants (live mulch). All of these have varying degrees of effectiveness. A good reference book on mulch is *Gardening the Southwest*, written by **Carole Tashel**, an Eldorado resident!

So you want a great landscape? Start watering and mulching NOW! I will be offering free gardening classes on Saturdays at 11:00 am at Tropic of Capricorn starting on March 6.

- Each candidate must file a résumé and position statement with the ECIA office by March 8, 2004. This information is included in the ballot package sent to all Members in Good Standing.
- ▼ The Election Committee will validate each candidate's petition by March 12, 2004.
- Election packets and the notice of the Annual Meeting of the Members will be mailed to each Member in Good Standing by March 31, 2004.



Calling for Help: Eldorado's Emergency Communications

HANKS TO A FEDERAL GRANT administered by the state of New Mexico, the Eldorado Community has received two "Dual Band" radios for use in emergencies. The amateur radio group of the larger Eldorado Community, headed by one of their local members and resident, Nick Frost, received the radios and their associated power supplies and antennas during the first week in February and the first one is up at the main fire station, thanks to Eldorado resident, Olin van Dyck who did a lot of work on this

One radio will be installed in the Eldorado Main Fire Station on Avenida Vista Grande and the other in the ECIA Community Center. "We have had several communications disruptions since I have lived here" stated Frost. "In one of them the 9-1-1 emergency communications system was disrupted for a 12-hour period. The radios should ensure that residents dealing with emergency situations can get their calls for help to the proper emergency responders if regular communications are not functioning."

Using Homeland Security grants, Santa Fe County officials hope to install Dual Band radios at every main fire station in the county. "We are a very large county—the size of the state of Delaware, over 2000 square miles," says James Leach, the county's Director of Emergency Management. "Having backup communications is not a luxury."







VISTA GRANDE PUBLIC LIBRARY TO OFFER EVENING **HOURS**

Thanks to the continued support of volunteers, the Vista Grande Public Library (VGPL) will be able to stay open until 9:00 pm on Wednesdays beginning February 4, extending the usual closing time by three hours. Currently the facility's hours are 1:00 to 6:00 pm, Tuesday through Thursday, and noon to 5:00 pm on Friday and Saturday. The library is closed on Sundays and Mondays.

Concurrently, the library's Academic Center for Teens (ACT!), which provides tutoring for teens, will revise its hours from 3:00 - 6:00 pm to 4:00 - 8:30 pm, also on Wednesdays. ACT!, established in October 2003, offers homework assistance for any teen who wants extra help in literature, reading, writing, social studies, geography, history, mathematics, project skills (conceptualization, follow-through to completion and presentation) and study skills (organization and time management). The free tutoring is provided solely by VGPL volunteers.

The Vista Grande Public Library, a nonprofit facility, was established in 2002 for the residents of the southeastern area

of Santa Fe County, on whom it depends for financial survival. Virtually 100 percent of VGPL's annual operating budget is funded by donations, not government funds or tax dollars. WE'RE JUST GIVING IT AWAY!

Organic horse manure from Eldorado Stables makes glorious rich compost, and now is a great time to start a compost pile to use in your summer gardens. Saturday, April 3rd, from 9:00 am until noon we will load your pickup for free!

Composting is easy. Make a big pile (3' by 3' is a good size), thoroughly moisten and cover (plastic tarp works well) to hold in the moisture and heat. Turn the pile occasionally and keep it moist. In a couple of months when it no longer

Eating & Drinking, Soviet-Style

OLFE GLEITSMAN, the son of Wayne and Gretel Underwood, was a lifelong resident of Eldorado until he attended college in New York. He is now 23 years old and studying Russian at the State University of St. Petersburg, Russia. These are excerpts from letters written to his family here in Eldorado.


- ▼ OCTOBER 2, 2003–I just read an article in an English language newspaper discussing "Health Beverages". These beverages include Kvas, which is a beer made from bread. Kvas is apparently only good if it is fresh from a barrel on the street, where they sell it in the summer. (I know, sounds sanitary, right?) Water (which you cannot drink from the tap in Russia) was literally said to have "magical powers".
- OCTOBER 30, 2003-We decided to give my friend Kristin (a fellow American student), a birthday party. We went to work cooking most of the day. Kristin made some salsa (not too spicy, as Russians are huge wimps about spicy food) and I made our version of tortilla chips. There's a kind of flatbread here called lavash that closely resembles flour tortillas, only much thinner. Still, when you fry 'em up, they make damn good tortilla chips. These surrogate tortillas are one of the reasons I am still functional here. The Russians

were confused by some aspects of our party, but pretty interested in the food, especially the chips and salsa, as they had no idea how we made them. They loved them apparently; all the chips were gobbled up pretty quickly. Oh, and the Russian Happy Birthday song makes the American one sound like a used car jingle. It's awesome.

- NOVEMBER 24, 2003-I've been sampling a number of local offerings, and have found out that you should never eat the little rolls in the shape of pigs' heads. Sure they look cute, what with their little dough ears and nose, but they're full of what was recently identified as pigs' livers and are pretty gross. Little bread rolls filled with various fruits/veggies/ meats are pretty common, so avoiding the pig rolls is thankfully easy. But that first time when I ordered two at once.....
- ONE OF THE STAPLES of Russians' diet (aside from beer) is ice cream. It is available everywhere, has a slightly smoother texture than

- American ice cream, and is super cheap. A popular breakfast food for kids is a cross between ice cream and cheesecake. Somehow though, obesity is not as big a problem here as it is in the United States—go figure.
- NOVEMBER 25, 2003-Most grocery stores here are still "Soviet-style". The way these stores "work" is that all products are kept behind counters, or on display in cases. You stand in line to get to the counter, then ask for what you want from the person behind the counter. (All I could do was point a lot.) After you have told them what you want, they give you a receipt to take to the cashier in another part of the store. So you stand in that line, pay, then go stand in line at the original counter again to pick up what you have bought. Each counter has different products and a different person to deal with, and they NEVER overlap. You also have to stand in multiple lines to pick up your stuff. I've been trying to figure out what the potential advantages of this system may be, and I'm pretty sure they don't exist.
- THE TRICK IS TO FIND "Western-style" grocery stores, which are starting to take hold here. You have no idea what a luxury it is to pick your own food off the shelf, then pay all at once.

A Winner for Wildlife...and Us

THE PERSISTENT DROUGHT has major impacts on wildlife as well as on people. After foraging for seeds, dry grass, or crackling twigs, you would be thirsty too.

Eldorado's Community Preserve now boasts a large reservoir of stored water for a variety of animals, including deer, elk, bear, fox, and coyote. Since the preserve has no natural permanent water, the Conservation Committee researched the idea of a water catchment structure (guzzler) to enhance wildlife habitat. Last November a guzzler was delivered and installed in a remote location in the 4.000 acre preserve.

The committee learned about guzzlers when it applied to participate in a program called the Stewardship Incentive Plan (SIP) in 1998. Eldorado resident Craig Conley of Bionomics Southwest wrote the conservation management document that qualified us to receive government funding for habitat improvement projects. The program changed names, and is now the Wildlife Habitat Improvement Plan (WHIP), funded through the Department of Agriculture. The guzzler cost \$4,000 and we received \$2.097 in reimbursement.

What is a guzzler and how does it work? A guzzler provides a permanent water source for wildlife. It consists of two parts: one to collect water and the other to provide water. The collection part holds 2,200 gallons. A concave cover 12 ft. in diameter collects rainwater, then holes allow it to flow into the tank. (Picture a cup with a saucer on top.) The tank is buried about two feet to protect from freezing, and screened by trees to lessen the visual impact to wildlife.

Animals drink from a ground level container located on a slight downslope about 60 feet from the tank and connected to it by an underground hose. The entire system is designed to be nearly mainte-

The Eldorado Fire and Rescue Service, headed by Guy Monroe, filled the guzzler with their wildland brush truck. Thereafter, natural rainfall should keep it operating, and the stored water would be available to fight wildfires.

A Short Rundown of the Eldorado Stables

THE AMREP CORPORATION began developing the Simpson Ranch into Eldorado at Santa Fe in 1973. Entering Eldorado at that time one would have seen signs advertising amenities including corral space, bridle paths and endless open riding space. Stable space was initially provided in existing Simpson Ranch corrals. And though AMREP liked advertising the availability of corral space, horse owners had to struggle to maintain that space, which was eventually reduced from 82 acres to the current 12. The stables were then self-governing and hidden away with access by a winding dirt road from Vista Grande.

In 1993 AMREP deeded the current stable property to the ECIA as an amenity for the perpetual use of the horse owners, and a set of rules and regulations for proper care of horses, corrals, stables and common property were written and agreed upon by the horse owners and the ECIA.

Today we have 32 individual stable/corral units, 2 arenas and 2 round pens. We are completely surrounded by homes, heavily traveled roads and fences. We have our fabulous wilderness area, and an excellent system of trails still exists, but the days of gallops across wide-open spaces are gone. Several of our members are working with the county to map

and preserve some of the trails that weave their way through arroyos and easements. Riding is permitted in green belts, on the rail trail and on the bridle path easement that runs along Eldorado's west fence line.

The ECIA owns the property on which the stables sit but each corral and barn is individually owned. Our stable is completely self-service. Each barn owner is responsible for the twice-daily feeding, care, cleaning and maintenance of their

horses and barn. Horse owners pay all fees for water and manure removal and provide liability insurance to cover their horses and the ECIA. The ECIA maintains the common areas and roads and keeps the manure pile tidy. Volunteer horse owners share duties with the ECIA maintenance staff in keeping the arenas harrowed.
