Hike/Bike Path Etiquette

any Eldoradoans use our hike/bike paths: dog walkers, joggers, and kids of all ages and abilities on bikes, trikes, and other wheeled gizmos. That's a good thing: these are people unplugged from the television and other screens; they are moving their bodies, which improves their fitness and consequentially their spirits; and they are often doing so with a friend or family member.

With so many users of this same path, courtesy is imperative—and easy. Recently, while riding to work on the path one morning, I announced my intention to pass a gentleman walking ahead of me with his dog. I simply called out, "Bike will be passing on your left." Announcing my approach was safer for all: he could have stepped to the left and been immediately in front of me; or his dog could have veered into my path; either scenario would have been potentially very unpleasant for all three of us. All it took to avoid that was simply to announce, with sufficient time for him to respond, that I was approaching behind him.

We can all increase our enjoyment of our hike/bike paths by extending these basic courtesies to one another. Communication of your intention is key. Here are some simple guidelines:

- ▶ Bicycles traveling faster than 10 mph should be on the road, not the path.
- ➤ Traffic flow should be modeled after road traffic; travel on the right side of the path in both directions, and pass on the left. This applies to all users of multi-use paths and trails.
- Announce your arrival and intention to pass someone with adequate time for them to process the fact that you are there and respond appropriately. This should be the case regardless of your mode of transportation: joggers are faster than walkers, cyclists are faster than everyone else. Bear in mind that many solo path users are listening to headphones, and you need to speak loudly and clearly for them to hear you.
- ► Always leave one ear open when using an iPod or MP3 player.

- Slow down in passing, particularly on a bike, and pass with caution, especially when small children are present. Their actions are often unpredictable.
- ▶ Dogs should be on short standard leashes. And YES, they must be on leashes. Retractable leashes are not recommended for path use, as they are often misused.
- Remember that the path is for use by all and for multiple types of activities. Enhance your own, and everyone else's experience, by sharing this lovely community resource.

Reminder for automobile drivers: You are in essence crossing *two* intersections when you turn: the path, then the road. Please check carefully for path

Responsible Dog Ownership Practices

s the temperature begins to rise this spring, many Eldorado residents will start allowing their dogs to stay outside, in fenced enclosures, for longer periods of time during the day. While this isn't necessarily problematic, without proper supervision many dogs will bark and howl for more than 15 to 20 minutes and, as such, will be in violation of both the Eldorado Covenants and Santa Fe County Animal Control Ordinance No. 1991-6:

5-5 ANIMAL DISTURBING THE PEACE

A. It is unlawful for any owner to allow any of his animals to persistently or continuously bark, howl or make noise common to their species or otherwise disturb the peace and quiet of the inhabitants of the County, or to keep or maintain on his premises any animal in such a manner as to disturb others by noxious or offensive odors, or otherwise endanger the health, safety, and welfare of the inhabitants of the County.

Out of respect for neighbors, all dog owners should keep this ordinance in mind when they let their dogs outside, and be vigilant in preventing their dogs from barking excessively at any time of day.

On another dog-related matter, the problem of dog owners not picking up their dog's solid waste is all too common in Eldorado, especially during the springtime. Such irresponsible dog ownership is a violation of both the Eldorado Responsible Dog Ownership Policy and Section 5-6 of the Santa Fe Animal Control Ordinance. This ordinance details the county's policies regarding animal nuisances on sidewalks, public parks, and other open spaces. Relevant portions of this ordinance read as follows:

It is unlawful for the owners of any animal to permit, either willfully or through failure to exercise due care or control, any such animal to commit any nuisance upon a sidewalk or in a public park ... or upon any private property other than that of the animal owner. When an animal defecates in a public place, the owner must remove the feces and dispose of it in a sanitary manner.

Eldorado residents should be considerate of others when walking their dogs, and remember to bring a plastic bag for proper pickup and disposal of animal wastes. This is especially important in public areas such as the ECIA grounds and Compadres Park, which are heavily used by dog owners and children alike. Cleaning up after your pet is part of being a good neighbor and will help to keep Eldorado a beautiful and enjoyable place to live.

rompted by a variance request, the ECIA is looking into the possibility of allowing residents to keep hens and/or goats in small nuisance-free numbers. In the past, variance requests to keep both hens and goats have been considered, and most of those were approved by previous Boards. This Board has spent considerable time studying the general proposition and deciding how to proceed.

As news of the proposal has spread, I and other Board members have received many calls and emails from residents. We found that many are in favor, many are opposed, and all are passionate. As a 22year resident, I have seen Eldorado work through difficulties through dialogue. I believe we would be missing a terrific opportunity to air the issue and gather useful information if we didn't give people in the community a chance to talk about it.

The Board will convene two forums and an online survey before deciding how to proceed. We want to hear the pros and cons and assess the options. No options are off the table, and the Board wants to keep the door open to any possible solutions that could be revealed through the public dialogue.

The first forum is set for Saturday, March 10, at 10 am in the Performance Space at La Tienda. The second forum will be at 7 pm on April 4, in the same La Tienda venue. In April or May, we will activate an online survey to further gauge community sentiments based on information that emerges in the forums. Draft ballot language will be produced after all the input is received and analyzed, sometime in June and

I want to assure everyone that the Board as a whole has not made up its mind on this issue, except to pursue this process. I hope that Eldoradoans will take the time to attend the forums and participate in the survey. It will help inform the best possible decision.



Water, Water Not Everywhere

Idorado residents have been hearing for years that Santa Fe County is planning to construct a water pipeline that would connect our system (The Eldorado Water and Sanitation District) with theirs, forging a very important link in case of an emergency caused by a local water shortage. Thus far, the talk has vastly exceeded any progress in constructing such a pipeline. According to Mr. David Denig-Chakroff, EAWSD's General Manager, having a reliable alternative source to back up our local water resources is good insurance for Eldorado customers, provided that the price, availability, and quality of water that comes to us from the proposed pipeline meets the highest standards of design and engineering. If construction plans for a connecting pipeline are finalized, the EAWSD will do all in its legal power to ensure that interests of its customers are satisfied in both the near and long term.

Our water district is dependent on a complex set of aquifers beneath us accessed using 18 wells, and includes an extensive underground water delivery network and several major water tanks to provide the all-important hydrant pressure needed by our Fire Department. The most critical, and recently the most problematic, source of our water supply is gifted with a name considered beautiful by some: the Galisteo Creek Alluvium. This portion of the EAWSD system is provided by two relatively shallow wells that are dependent on runoff from the high mountains that surround Santa Fe. The water produced by these wells

represents over a fifth of the district's total water pumping capacity. The top producing areas of the aquifer we depend on are the two active wells that



Spring and summer will be with us before long, and if we are not careful with our precious water resource, we may be facing another water shortage emergency. Our water company, the EAWSD, is our own. Its workers keep the miracle of a clean, ready water supply going 24/7/365. We have a clean water advantage that most people on this planet do not share. Conserving our water means being and staying conscious of how limited it really is.

The EAWSD holds its board meetings on every first and third Thursday of the month in the Railroad Building of the ECIA at 7 pm. The public is invited to attend and participate. Horses in Eldorado

here 285 intersects Avenida Eldorado lies a little slice of heaven for a group of your neighbors. The Stable amenity, 35 privately owned barns housing 80 or so horses, was intentionally deeded into the subdivision charter some 30 years ago to honor its original ranch tradition and the importance of the horse to settlement of the West.

Unlike all other amenities at Eldorado, horseowners reimburse the ECIA for expenses. The community is reimbursed for electricity and manure removal. Horseowners are billed for water usage.

Additionally, we have chosen to underwrite an aggressive fly predator program to mitigate the number of flies in the summer months. Professional horsemen from around the Southwest who visit our amenity never fail to comment on the success of our (reduced) fly-zone to the benefit of the at-large Eldorado com-

We very much enjoy participating in each year's July 4th parade, and we organize an annual community outreach program. Unfortunately, this year's sponsor canceled the scheduled event, which would have supported young New Mexican riders in national competitions.

In years past, we organized local vets and trainers for a day devoted to local artists wanting to study equine anatomy and movement. We hosted pony rides and horse education programs for area youth. Eldorado gardeners greatly appreciate our Grade A manure, free of charge, to fertilize their flower and vegetable beds. The ECIA tractor is at the stable Thursday mornings and is available to help load your truck bed. Call the office to confirm a time.

Community members and their children enjoy walking through our amenity to see our beautiful horses. We have forged friendships and relationships with more than a few of our neighbors who enjoy strolling down the main road and addressing our horses by name.

The stable amenity is a community asset. It invites people to interact and, in doing so, enhances the opportunities to be a community.

On a more pragmatic level, it is safe to say that every stable owner chose to purchase a home in Eldorado because of this vibrant horse amenity. You never know, when you want to sell, where your buyer will come from. The stables are a talking point that just may tip the discussion to your favor.

At the Crossroads

ROUGHT OR NOT . . . Is the area around your mailbox, or even the area where your driveway meets the road, a moon landscape look-alike after it gets really wet? If so, you may wish to take a bit of pity on your mail and newspaper carriers who have to negotiate through the muck and mire to provide you an essential service. One way is to resurface the area immediately in front of the mailbox or driveway entrance with a layer of base course and 1-inch gravel. It doesn't require all that much material because you don't want to put any in the roadway where the grader would abscond with it. To minimize your costs, you might consider going in with your neighbors to get a small load of the materials and hire a day laborer to spread the material. Your carriers, most of whom use their own vehicles to deliver the goodies, will be most appreciative of this effort. -Nolan Zisman, Chair, Road Committee

Vigilance

n the past, Vistas has published articles about caring for pets in evacuation circumstance, preparedness in case of fires . . . basically, all sorts of articles about what to do in dire circumstances. I've written about how safe a community we have proven to be, largely because of Neighborhood Watch. We are still a very safe community, but, safety, and the security blanket nestled around our shoulders, does not mean we can afford to be less vigilant regarding potential crime opportunities.

Recently, one of our neighbors had a most unfortunate occurrence at the Agora: her purse was snatched as she walked to her car. The incident occurred at around 3:30 in the afternoon, when, for whatever reason, the Agora parking lot was crammed and she found herself parking in one of the far reaches of the lot. A diminutive woman with a prominent handbag on her shoulder, she proved to be the perfect mark for a young man watching for a victim.

Four years ago, I was that same victim but in seemingly very different, but similar, circumstances. Although I was just yards from the Miracle Mile in Chicago, the area was fairly deserted and a young man came up behind me and very deftly invaded my back-

pack, taking my wallet. He had an accomplice, and I didn't realize the wallet was gone until the next morning. Generally, I am very aware of my environment. Never thinking it could happen to me, I let my guard down, taking a more deserted route back to the hotel.

The facts regarding purse snatching, and its prevention, are the following:

- Purse snatching is a crime of opportunity.
- Women are more vulnerable, especially smaller, older women.
- Be aware of what is going on around you, especially of people, especially young males, who seem to be out of place.
- Carry cash, credit cards, and IDs in an inside pocket, not in an obvious handbag, or wear your handbag inside a coat or jacket;
- Make copies of important documents, such as the above, and keep them at home in a safe place.
- Shop with a friend.
- At night, park in well-lighted areas, closer to your destination.

Reel New Mexico Independent Film Series

eel New Mexico, an ongoing monthly series showcasing independent films with a New Mexico connection, debuts Thursday, March 8, at 7 pm at La Tienda. The first program will feature four short films.

Surreal Estate, by Lori Romero, which won the Audience Choice award at the Santa Fe Independent Film Festival, takes a comedic and surrealistic look at one man's struggle to rent a house. Paul Marcus's mistersky is a visual homage to Detroit that showed at the 2011 "Currents" exhibition in the Santa Fe Railyard. Una Causa Noble, by M/K Productions, a short feature, tells the story of a young Mexican who enlists in the U.S. Army to obtain citizenship. Praised by noted Greek filmmaker Costa-Gavras, it was a selection of the Santa Fe Film Festival. *Take My Hand* and Walk with Me, by Marga Matakovich, is a Ken Burns-style documentary that interviews a 93-yearold Lakota woman who served as an Army nurse in World War II. Reel New Mexico is premiering this film. By coincidence, Romero, Marcus and Matakovich all live in Eldorado.

Filmmakers representing each film will discuss and answer questions about their work after the screenings.

Reel New Mexico has no entry fee and gives no awards. Proceeds from the \$5 suggested audience donations will be split among participating filmmakers after expenses are met.



- ► SOLAR THERMAL (led by **Peter Page**, co-founder of AMEnergy, who conducts project consultations, system design and selection, and installation of equipment for thermal energy systems)

- ▶ SOLAR FINANCING AND COST BENEFITS (three segments, led by Rob Lochner, Homewise loan agent; Craig O'Hare, Santa Fe County Energy Programs Specialist, Public Utilities Division; and Kathy Holian, Santa Fe County Commissioner)
- CONSERVATION AND USAGE (led by Jan Deligans and Amy **Bertelli**, local energy conservation experts)

Each workshop will run for 45 minutes. After the workshops, the workshop leaders will participate on a panel where they will answers questions from the audience.

The solar home tour will give everyone a chance to see a wide variety of solar solutions and talk with the homeowners about the process of integrating solar energy into their homes. The homes have been chosen as examples of sustainable living and also feature energy savings through creative water catchment, window insulation, food gardens, passive solar use, and much more. There are 9 homes on the tour.
