Enjoying and Maintaining Our Amenities

rom miles of hike/bike paths to horseshoe pits, the pool to the basketball court, children's playgrounds to 4,000 acres of wilderness preserve, Eldorado is blessed with a variety of amenities. Some residents think the tennis courts alone or access to the stables is worth their annual assessment; some use the dog park daily. Others rarely use our facilities but understand the value they add to the community. Well-maintained amenities support strong property values and help create a desirable community.

Recently, Su Anne Armstrong lent new support for David Lovro's landscape plan and designed a multi-year plan to rejuvenate the Community Center grounds. Aging landscape and extreme drought have taken a toll on the 28-acre property. The landscape recovery plan takes into account the difficulty of maintaining a heavy-usage, high-desert environment during a prolonged drought and includes rainwater harvesting and mulching as well as educating

he Eldorado Community Improvement Association is pleased to sponsor a communitywide Earth Day Cleanup Day on Saturday, April 20, from 9 AM to noon. our dedicated grounds staff in good xeriscaping practices and tree care.

This year the plan concentrates on the trees. Jim Freeman, a long-term Eldorado resident and professional forester and arborist, is assessing the condition of the trees and training the grounds staff. Much of what they will be doing is applicable to your home landscape as well. (See article, below.)

Other Eldorado amenities are due for facelifts this year as well. The Board has approved a major renovation of the tennis courts and is currently negotiating with potential contractors. The adjacent basketball court will be resurfaced, and work will continue on improving the athletic field. These projects and others will help ensure that Eldorado remains an attractive and active community.

Xeriscaping Tips

ere are some xeriscaping ideas to keep the trees and shrubs around your house healthy.

- Mulch your trees and shrubs with organic mulch to a depth of at least 3 to 4 inches. Leave the area within 1 foot of the trunk bare of mulch, but extend it beyond the drip line. This is where the feeder roots are, the ones that absorb water and nutrients.
- Test to see if you need to water by inserting a rod (rebar size) in the soil. It should penetrate fairly easily in moist soil.
- Water trees to a depth of 2 to 3 feet at the drip line and a bit beyond, not near the trunk.
- V Create a berm outside the drip line to keep the water where the tree needs it.
- Apply water slowly so it penetrates deeply without wasteful runoff.
- Water established trees once a month in winter and twice a month in summer when rains or snows don't get the job done.

The New Mexico State Engineer's office (Bataan Building on Galisteo across from the Capitol) has excellent free brochures on water use and conservation or online at http://www.ose.state.nm.us/publications_brochures.html. Particularly helpful are "Water Wise Guide to Trees" and "Rainwater Harvesting."

Trees and shrubs are the foundation of a landscape and take a long time to reestablish if lost. Do what you can to keep them healthy while being conscious of the need to conserve water in our high-desert environment.

Bylaws Changes Proposed

roposed ECIA Bylaws changes are included in your 2012 Annual Report packet: a ballot has been added to either approve or disapprove of the changes. Read the proposed changes carefully and mark the ballot. Adoption of Bylaws requires 60% of those Association members voting.

The changes are shown in strikeout/underline format, to make identification of changes easy. In addition to corrections of typos, formatting and grammatical errors, there are changes in the following areas:

- 1. A requirement that Lot Owner shall mean and refer to the owner or owners of record of a fee-simple title to any lot situated upon The Properties.
- 2. Changes in the terms of Board members appointed and elected, so as to achieve and retain a 2-3-2 rotation.
- 3. A change in obtaining the written approval of Board members for emergency actions taken without a meeting.

- 4. An additional cause for removal of a Director by the Board for a Director derelict in committee and liaison assignments.
- A requirement for each Board officer to adhere to Covenants, Articles of Incorporation, and Bylaws.
- 6. A requirement for all committee appointees to be and remain Members in Good Standing.
- A requirement that examination of Books and Records be for Association and/ or noncommercial use.
- 8. 8. Changes made in format for clarity and ease of reading.
- 9. A Table of Contents was added..

The existing Bylaws require review every two years, and whenever this review identifies a need, changes are proposed. The present revisions are the first proposed in over a decade.

Recent Board Actions

he ECIA Board held its regular meeting on February 21, with Board members present: Ed Moreno (President and Chair), Jeanne Calzada (Vice-President), Nolan Zisman (Secretary), Todd Handy (Treasurer), Dag Ryen and Jan Pietrzak. Paul Jacobs's absence was excused. The following formal actions were taken unanimously, without the Chair voting:

- The Bylaws Committee arranged a March 11 public hearing for review of proposed Bylaws changes.
- ▼ The report of the Election Committee regarding the formal tally for the Household Pets Covenant vote in August/September 2012 was accepted.
- ▼ The Board certified the results of the Household Pets Covenant vote.
- ▼ Funds spent in 2012 from the 2013 Replacement Reserve Schedule for the recreation field were re-

- moved from the 2013 Replacement Reserve budget.
- Ed Moreno, Jeanne Calzada, Todd Handy, and Bill Donohue were authorized as check signers for the Association's account at the First National Bank of Santa Fe.
- A variance was approved for 3 Antigua Lane for a small accessory building (child playhouse) to be placed 75 feet from the dwelling, where 15 feet is the Guideline distance, because of screening by existing vegetation, with conditions.

Regular Board meetings are scheduled on the third Thursday of each month at 7 PM at the Community Center and are open to the public. An open forum, community announcements, and reports from ECIA committees are normally included. Spring is Here!

las, we have so little space in this issue and so much to cover! A few quick reminders and, then, on to gophers.

- Begin to rabbitize your gardens by putting protective coverings around them, either netting or fencing.
- No see'um time is approaching. While they may not bother some of us, others are highly allergic, especially with numerous bites that may be infected. Please douse yourselves with Skin So Soft (Avon and not a commercial plug) and wear protective clothing. We know of at least one of our new residents who was hospitalized last year due to numerous bites.
- ▼ Our serpent friends will begin to emerge from hibernation.

Gophers are on the move. For our newcomers, we have pocket gophers in Eldorado in varying degrees of abundance. You likely will never actually see one but will notice mounds of dirt appearing in your yards, and then, perhaps, your rose bush will fall over one day for lack of a root system. Entire heads of lettuce may totally disappear from your garden: pocket gophers!

These are small, subterranean rodents who rely mostly on roots of plants for water and food. They are territorial and primarily solitary, except for annual mating.

Controlling pocket gophers is difficult, and methods often conflict with one's morality or may threaten other burrow-sharing critters. Gophers can be live-trapped and released elsewhere (good luck with that!), poisoned (either do-ityourself or hire a professional), which may lead to the possible poisoning of beneficial snakes and burrowing owls (not to mention residents' pets). For a gentler precautionary way to gopher-proof one's garden, plant tons of daffodils and frittilaria, as the bulbs repel rodents. Place fine-mesh wire in the bottom of raised beds to protect the roots of your vegetable crop: gophers do not like the feel of metal on their teeth (of course, this does nothing for the aboveground assault from rabbits and other grazers, but that's another discussion.)
