Eldorado's Unsung Heroes

ver the decades, hundreds of dedicated volunteers contributing immense expertise and energy have benefited Eldorado in untold ways. Such community activists have helped run Eldorado Community Improvement Association (ECIA) for over 40 years. Given Eldorado's sizable and diverse population, and its common buildings and grounds, this has been no mean feat.

Because of its tradition of volunteerism, ECIA recognizes one "Resident of the Year" who has rendered outstanding service to the community. ECIA also sponsors an annual "volunteer appreciation party" for its dozens of committee members. Still, the community-at-large seldom acknowledges many others who enrich this subdivision well beyond ECIA's official purview.

This short list of august community members is but a sampling of those invaluable individuals who may be off your radar screen.

DOLORES BROCK — ELDORADO PIONEER

Dolores Brock and her husband, Bernard, were first drawn to the Santa Fe area in 1974 because of its dry air, wide open spaces, and opera.

Since developers owned the vast majority of lots in Eldorado's infancy, they dominated ECIA policies. To balance that situation, Dolores, along with other residents, founded the Eldorado Residents Association (ERA). "ERA," says Brock, "determined to make this place the greatest place to live."

Dolores considers the creation of the ERA a "great achievement." Yet, in addition to helping "level the playing field" between the residents and the developers, Dolores served on "more committees than I can recall." Among those were fire protection, water, incorporation, the 285 Corridor, and ERA's fall and spring flea market fundraisers.

Dolores also opened the first Children's Center, which she says gave her the most satisfaction, since she's always liked young kiddos. Besides the hard work, Dolores recalls "there were a lot of great parties." Dolores still likes parties and continues to help organize the TGIF social gatherings that are hosted at the Community Center.

Today, Dolores continues her regular volunteering at the Adam Senior Center. For several years she served on its board and presently arranges day trips "that are both fun and educational."

Rightly proud of her contributions to Eldorado over the years, Dolores says, "Looking around today I think, 'Not too bad a job.'"

MARILYN WALKER — SAFETY FIRST

Marilyn Walker and her husband, Eric Wiswell, have lived in Eldorado for 11 years. They came here because Eldorado filled their needs regarding affordability and access to arts and culture and natural beauty. Eric discovered Eldorado while on assignment during a photography workshop.

Nine years ago, Marilyn attended a few Eldorado Neighborhood Watch (NW) meetings. When its then-leader decided to step down, Marilyn decided to step up. Marilyn's goal has been to have NW groups cover all Eldorado. To accomplish that goal, Marilyn has continued to organize, recruit block captains, and create an e-mail alert system. And now, thanks to Marilyn's encouragement, Eldorado Stables has its very own NW.

Marilyn points out that NW has not attained her 100% coverage goal in Eldorado just yet. Still, Eldorado boasts the largest NW group in New Mexico, with its approximately 140 block captains, each covering between 10 and 15 homes. Marilyn's greatest satisfaction in working with NW has been "helping people connect with their neighbors and helping create a sense of community."

JOE EIGNER — ONCE IS NOT ENOUGH

Joe Eigner says it was the open spaces, large lots, and lovely homes that caused him and wife, **Janet**, to move here in 1999.

Eigner's pet project, Eldorado/285 Recycles, is an all-volunteer citizen's group devoted to improving recycling and composting. Eldorado/285 Recycles collects a number of otherwise hard-to-recycle items (at La Tienda). He also installs straw-bale vermicomposting (using worms, bacteria, and fungi to break down organic material) systems in local backyards.

Recent Board Actions

The ECIA Board held its regular meeting on March 17, 2016. Five Board members were present: Dag Ryen (president, presiding), Pam Henline (vice-president), Todd Handy (treasurer), David Yard, and Antone Forneris. Director Greg Colello's absence was excused. The following formal actions were taken by unanimous vote.

- A motion was approved to table a variance request for a wrought iron spiral staircase at 61 Herrada Rd.
- A motion was passed to approve an easement agreement with PNM for the Eldorado Preserve.
- A motion was passed to remove Eddie Marshall from the Facilities and Grounds Committee.
- ▼ A motion was passed to approve a revised Road Committee charter.
- ▼ A motion to appoint **Bob Sandlin** to the Conservation Committee was passed.

- ▼ A variance request for fence encroachment into the setback and a shed at 10 Redondo Court was approved.
- The Board read into the record a letter to the homeowner at 43 Cuesta Road acknowledging the long-time existence of a fence in the utility easement, and stating that the ECIA plans no further action at this time.
- A motion was passed approving an amendment to the HOAMCO management agreement transferring responsibility for all current and future employees to the management company.

Regular Board meetings are scheduled on the third Thursday of each month at 7 PM at the Community Center and are open to the public. An open forum and community announcements are normally included. Complete minutes and meeting agendas are available at the ECIA office and on the website: www.eldoradosf.org.

Given these safety and health issues, the ECIA asks that residents inspect their lots for any dead weeds (especially the tall weeds over the septic field), cut branches, or dead vegetation that might be accumulating around their homes. If you find any such dry brush on your lot, please remove it. These cleanup efforts will help to reduce the chances of a wildfire

Brush Piles and Rodents

ith predictions for a dry summer, and with an abundance of weeds left over from a wet summer in 2015, properties in Eldorado are susceptible to summer wildfires. And while Santa Fe County had not yet issued a burn ban, the ECIA is already receiving calls from concerned residents about their neighbors' dead weeds and debris growing right up to their homes.

The ECIA also receives many calls from residents whose neighbors allegedly have collected dead and downed wood and/or weeds on their lot, leaving them in large brush piles. These piles are not only a visual nuisance (which can be considered a violation of Article II, Section 14 of the Eldorado Covenants/Nuisance Clause), but more importantly, they are a fire hazard for both the resident and the neighborhood.

Just as important is the fact that such piles of dead vegetation can provide homes for many of our local rodents, such as mice and rats, which can carry infectious diseases such as typhus, trichinosis, salmonella, and hantavirus.

Joe's recycling passion was inspired while attending a 2011 workshop held by the now-inactive Sustainable Eldorado Residents Alliance (SERA). Joe ended up cochairing the "solid waste group" which has been meeting monthly ever since.

"Many in Eldorado," Joe points out, "moved here from places where recycling was the norm and recycling rates are high." Improving Eldorado's traditionally low recycling rate in a meaningful way has been a great challenge. For Joe, it has meant using some of his working-life skills (chemistry, hazardous waste legislation), which, he exclaims, has kept him "82years young!"



Reel New Mexico

On April 14, "The Grey Fox" (1982, 100 minutes) will be screened at 7 PM at La Tienda's Performance Space. Long-time New Mexico resident (the late) Richard Farnsworth stars in this gently paced and quietly told turn-of-the-century Western, based on the true story of Canadian train robber, Bill Miner.

The film opens with: "On June 17, 1901, after 33 years in San Quentin Prison, Bill Miner was released into the 20th Century." A former stagecoach robber, Miner, then 60 years old, looks ahead to the life before him, accepting and adapting to his new situation. One day he sees a movie in the local nickelodeon that speaks directly to him: Edwin Porter's "The Great Train Robbery" (1903); and to a professional who "always specializes," the message is clear. Watch what happens!

Rattlesnake Avoidance Clinic for Dogs April 24

The Central New Mexico Brittany Club will again be hosting a Rattlesnake Avoidance Clinics in Eldorado on Sunday, April 24, conducted by Terry and Janet Chandler.

Before the work begins, the snakes are rendered harmless through milking and removing the multiple sets of fangs. This protects both the snake and the dogs. Terry strives to get each dog to achieve the "perfect interaction" with the snake, scenting, hearing, seeing, and touching it. (The "touching" may be just coming in close proximity to the snake.) Upon a "touch," the dog receives a controlled jolt through an e-collar stimulation. Afterward, the dogs are circled back to see the snake, to embed the association of what caused the fright. Several minutes later, the dog is brought back without the ecollar to see if it will approach the snake. The dogs never want anything to do with that rattlesnake.
