A Gathering of Artists and Craftspeople

PPARENTLY NOT ONLY MISERY loves company. Judging from the number of members in the Eldorado Arts and Crafts Association – 170 – so do many of the artists and crafts people in this dusty, peaceful, mostly sunny and friendly community.

ELDORADO

"It started as a social venue for artists, then crafts people," Arlene Siegel, an artist and gallery owner who lives in La Paz, said of the EACA. She moved here from Chicago and planted the seed in 1991 that blossomed into the EACA. She was its president for 13 years.

The goal in creating the EACA was to organize artists and crafts people so they could stage shows and learn from each other with workshops and lectures. The EACA since has evolved into a 501(c)4 not-for-profit that, among other benefits, exempts the group from taxation and gives it a break on newspaper ad rates.

The EACA is "very helpful, especially if you're a new person in town," said George Henke, a Bronxborn photographer and the group's treasurer.

"The larger Santa Fe art community respects Eldorado artists and their association," said Ms. Siegel, whose gallery in her name is a block from the Plaza. Gallery owners have come to the Eldorado art scene to scout for new talent.

EACA members meet formally at the main firehouse the last Thursday of each month and get together weekly for life figure modeling and plein air landscape outings. They gather monthly at coffee socials at which an artist will open his or her studio for informal chats.

"Up to 30 people at a time have shown up for the chat sessions over the past 10 years," said Janet Amtmann, a pastel landscape artist from San Diego, California, who is past president and now secretary of the EACA.

"There's a very, very rich art community here," she said.

"I made some wonderful friends," Ms. Amtmann said. "I enjoy the meetings - mostly learning about other artists' techniques. Anyone can join." Dues are \$15 a year.

"It's like a cooperative in which everyone helps each other," said Jean Peterson, the group's vice president.

> "The average age of the members is 55 - there are many retired people in the association - but they have been working as artists for years," said Joretha Hall, the EACA's current president. Here from Huntington Beach, California, she works in clay figure modeling.

> > "Having a variety of artists is

the best way to broaden your horizons and learn what somebody else does," she said.

The EACA's biggest event of the year comes in May, when members open their studios to the public for the Eldorado Open Studio Tour. The tour drew 98 artists and crafts people last year and, Mr. Henke said, sold about \$100,000 worth of arts and crafts for each of the past two years. "It is the biggest studio tour in New Mexico," Ms. Hall said.

Artists pay \$75 to participate in the show and must contribute 5 percent of their sales, up to \$1,500, for such causes in Eldorado as art education at the elementary school, El Dorado Fire and Rescue and the library. Mr. Henke said \$3,500 in contributions was generated last year and over \$1,300 in the smaller show in November.


"We're a very important part of the community," Ms. Hall said. "It just gets better and better."

On Patrol

ERIODICALLY, I RECEIVE phone calls asking me about the security company contracted to patrol Eldorado and its responsibility within the community.

Associated Security Industries (ASI) is a private company run by Mark Archuleta and Micah Johnson. Eldorado uses guards from ASI who have been level 4 trained with batons, mace, handcuffs and firearms as well as basic unarmed defense tactics such as verbal judo.

The type of Eldorado calls that ASI receives are anything from barking dogs, loose dogs, ATVs in unauthorized areas, and suspicious people. They will stop and talk to suspicious people and determine whether or not they need to call in law enforcement.

Besides being a visual deterrent, security has had success catching vandals and helping with motor vehicle accidents. They even have helped with traffic control for Eldorado's 4th of July parade.

They continuously check the Community Center and grounds and Compadres Park and other public areas for graffiti and vandalism to community property. They report all incidents to the Eldorado Community Improvement Association offices. They are the eyes and ears of the community, even calling Santa Fe County Public Works if they see a street sign down or damaged.

Recently, one of our weekend security guards, Sgt. Charles Chipman, was alerted to the El Dorado Elementary School by silent alarms going off in many different areas of the building. Sargeant Chipman notified the County Sheriff's Department, the state police and even the Mounted Patrol, and then went to the school to begin searching the building and surrounding areas for intruders. Sheriff's deputies and the state police relieved him from his search and he was able to get back to his regular patrols.

Sargeant Chipman is just one of the guards who is out there patrolling, checking and working with the local law enforcement authorities so that our families can rest easy.

FRIENDLY REMINDER from your Eldorado Community Improvement Association Compliance Representative regarding any projects you are planning. Please contact us. We are here to assist you in any way we can to make sure that your project, addition, RV screening, etc., goes smoothly and efficiently. We want to ensure that we answer any and all questions you may have. We want to review with you the intent of our community's covenants and together work to ensure your project meets all the necessary requirements of the covenants before you begin.

Also, before you start your project, you may want to review our Guidelines for Protective Covenants and Building Restrictions for Eldorado. If you have misplaced your copy, you can either get it online at our website (www.eldoradocommunity.org) or call and we will send one to you. Here is one policy that you may want to familiarize yourself with:

Placement of accessory buildings, i.e., large buildings greater than 120 sq. ft. or 800 sq. ft. or less.

- ▼ They must be no farther than 15 ft. from existing dwelling.
- ▼ They must be the same or similar design that currently exists for the dwellling.
- ▼ They shall be linked to the dwelling—see Policies.

LA PAZ

If you regularly travel Avenida Eldorado, you may have noticed the "No Trespassing" signs posted on the entry points to La Paz at Eldorado. I have spoken to Jack Boylan, president of their home association, and he has assured me that Eldorado residents have permission to walk/bike on the roads and walkers are welcomed in the arroyos. Their association covenants state that dogs must be leashed and picked up after. They assess a \$50 fine when dogs are unleashed. If you walk or bike in La Paz, be a good neighbor and abide by its rules.

- ▼ They must be the same color as the dwelling.
- ▼ They must be in compliance with setbacks.
- ▼ They must not exceed 800 sq. ft.

If your project is less than 120 sq. ft., it is considered a small building, such as storage sheds and greenhouses. These need to be located to minimize their visual impact and, in some cases, may need screening (e.g., next to the dwelling, fencing and/or plantings).

Don't forget to submit your application (available online or at the office) by the Tuesday before the Wednesday meeting. The Architectural Committee meeting is at 7 pm on the second and fourth Wednesday at the Community Center. We look forward to working with you. Have a great summer!



Improvements, Not Just Conservation

TEEING THE ECIA Conservation Committee in action is an exciting experience these days. The volunteers who help protect our 4,000 acre Wilderness Preserve and the greenbelts that wind through the terrain we live on are supporting a series of cooperative projects that will not only conserve but improve the Eldorado environment.

The meeting on April 3 was, in the opinion of many of those in attendance, one of the most factand opportunity-filled in the committee's recent history. Bill Donohue, General Manager of the ECIA, reported that the Association was improving the patio behind the Community Center and would be installing extensive recycling and water-harvesting devices that will save thousands of gallons of water.

Steve Vrooman of Restoration Ecology, a Santa Fe ecological restoration firm, briefed the committee on his grant-supported project that will improve and restore a wetland of the Galisteo River watershed, a major portion of which lies within the Eldorado Wilderness Preserve. Taking care to use the "greenest" means possible, Mr. Vrooman's company will install rock dams and stabilizing structures called gabions in the watershed to reintroduce lost sediment and moisture. The retained moisture will permit the reintroduction of native plant and animal species that disappeared when the wetland was damaged by what environmentalists refer to as "hardscape" roads, bridges and highways that negatively affect the natural balance of the area over the years.

Salt Cedar, a tree introduced into the United States in the early 19th century, will be removed

from the watershed. It is now designated a noxious weed because of its tendencies to crowd out native plants and take up so much water that it inhibits or destroys stream flow. Mr. Vrooman said the offending species would be prevented from coming back with applications of environmentally safe substances such as vinegar. He asked for community volunteers to participate in a native plant reintroduction effort

> that will begin when the rock dams have had their desired effect.

Dana Richards of the Earth Works Institute of Santa Fe described the work of his company with El Dorado Elementary School. Working together with administrators and teachers, the institute is fostering environmental awareness among students at the school. It will develop school-wide water harvesting, recycling projects and install electric power saving devices using photo-voltaic cells. Mr. Richards is also a member of the school's PTA and has that organization's full support for the project.

Working together with the ECIA's Conservation Committee and such firms as Restoration Ecology and Earth Works Institute, the school will be encouraged to sponsor field trips in

which students will assist in replanting native plant species in the Wilderness Preserve.

The preserve is a blessing, with a major string attached. It was deeded to the ECIA by AMREP, the developer of Eldorado, with the condition that "as long as the property remains in its undeveloped state and only for as long as the property is used for recreational purposes for the members of the ECIA." Legal opinion sought by the ECIA over the years repeatedly makes it clear that if non-recreational activities are allowed or non-Eldorado residents are admitted, the property could revert to AMREP.

"The Wilderness Preserve belongs to all of us and is a unique and valuable resource," Conservation Committee Co-Chair John Parker told the meeting. "It is very important for all of us who live here to both make use of it and help protect it."

The Conservation Committee meets the first Tuesday of every other month in the Community Center's living room. Its co-chairs, John Parker and E.J. Evangelos urge residents interested in improving the beauty and utility of the Eldorado environment to attend a meeting and consider becoming members.

The GMC Pickup

LL IT TAKES IS 4,000 HOURS, skills that appear from nowhere, space to work and some extra spending money.

Dan McCullom had all of that and used it to restore a 1942 GMC pickup with lots of dents to better-than-pristine condition, converting a clunker into a sleek, souped-up, sparkling white freeway machine with a small block Chevy 305 cubic inch engine, power steering and front power disc brakes.

His is one of five still in running condition nationwide "that I know of," Dan said from his dining room table in the Eldorado home where he's lived for about three years with his wife, Judy, a Santa Fe native.

Dan plans to show his gleaming white truck at the Eldorado Car Show May 5.

The General Motors Truck Co. built an estimated 830 of the pickups in 1942 before production stopped because steel was redirected to the effort to fight World War II. The GMC badge first appeared at the New York Auto Show in 1912 and production started at a Pontiac plant in 1913, said the April 2000 edition of Cars & Parts magazine.

Dan bought the vehicle in 1998 for \$3,500 in Seattle, where he lived for 40 years. He also lived for a while in Santa Fe, where his dad owned an interior design company, McCollum Custom Interiors. One client was the Simpsons, owner of the ranch that is today's Eldorado. Dan went more than once to the ranch house that is now the ECIA Community Center.

After retirement, it took Dan 4,000 hours over three years and \$22,000 complete the frame-up restoration. But a vehicle whose original speedometer topped out at "60" now can get up to 90

mph on 22 to 24 miles per gallon, Dan said.

"He always wanted to build a car," Judy said. "He had a '39 Chevy that he had fixed up as a kid, and he always wanted to do it again."

Why the GMC pickup?

"It was a rare vehicle, and I knew it," Dan replied. "It had possibilities."

He admits he babies the vehicle, which has wracked up a mere 3,000 miles since it's been restored - "it is a baby" - and seems proud that the truck is not a garage queen.

"If it were perfect, you couldn't drive it," Dan said. "I want to be able to drive it."
