
20th Anniversary Studio Tour

The Eldorado Arts and Crafts Association holds its Twentieth Anniversary Studio Tour May 14-15. With 110 artists displaying their work in 73 studios, the Studio Tour promises to be a spectacular celebration of genres: painting, sculpture, photography, digital collage, ceramics, jewelry, fiber arts, and glass art, among others.

The weekend begins with a gala Opening Night at the Preview Gallery, held this year at La Tienda, from 5 to 7:30 pm on May 13. (La Tienda is located just off Vista Grande on Caliente Rd.) At the opening night event, master classical guitarist David Wescott Yard and keyboardist Doug Frantz will play jazz medleys. Artists, sponsors, and guests will also enjoy refreshments donated by Whole Foods Market of Santa Fe and Eldorado Supermart.

The Preview Gallery will also be open on Saturday and Sunday from 9 am to 5 pm so visitors can drop in to view an example of each participant's artwork. Brochures, with a tour map, will also be available





Every year participating artists contribute a portion of their sales to a group of Eldorado organizations. Since 2003, local artists have donated over \$38,000. This year's donations will go to El Dorado Fire and Rescue, the El Dorado Community School, the Ken and Patty Adam Senior Center, Vista Grande Public Library, and La Tienda Exhibit Space. The Eldorado Arts and Crafts Association is a 501(c)4 nonprofit organization.

Mission Statement

The mission of Vistas, the monthly newsletter of the ECIA, is to inform the Eldorado community about issues before the ECIA Board and the membership at large. By so doing, the publication seeks to foster increased neighborhood pride and community participation in the decision making process.

The first residents to move to Eldorado in the early 1970s were promised a pool as one of the community amenities. And they got one: a kidney-shaped pool that is shown in the original architectural plans by William Lumpkins, for Mr. and Mrs. Frank Teal, builders of the ranch house that is now our Community Center. By 1976, that pool was closed down, as authorities deemed it unsuitable for a "public pool"; talks then began with the ECIA (then still AMREP) for a new pool. In 1978, the new pool and pool house were opened.

This spring, the ECIA pool is being resurfaced during a month-long project, getting new white plaster and beautiful new blue tiling. New steps into the pool are being built in the southeast corner. The work will be completed for the opening on Saturday of Memorial Day weekend.

Residents in good standing (meaning that no money is owed to the Association) can obtain a photo-ID pool pass for a fee of \$2 in the ECIA office. Anyone who has a picture pass from last year can get a 2011 sticker to put on last year's pass. Renters need to bring their rental agreement to the ECIA office, and the lot owner must be a resident in good standing.

Dan VanWyck will be the Pool Manager again this year, with Julie White as Assistant Manager. All children under 12 years of age must be accompanied by an adult. A resident may bring two guests to the pool. Later in the season, adults who are certified will be needed for lifeguards.

Garden Enclosures and Fencing

7ith spring now upon us, many Eldorado residents are looking forward to planting gardens around their homes. The Guidelines for Protective Covenants and Building Restrictions for Eldorado address garden fencing on page 13, Section 15. These are detailed as follows:

GARDEN FENCES:

A blanket approval is given to these types of enclosures, provided they meet the following requirements:

- 1. Garden enclosures are not to be higher than 3 feet, enclosing only the garden area.
- 2. Garden enclosures are not to exceed 1,000 square
- 3. Garden enclosures are considered to be temporary in nature.
- 4. Materials shall be wood post and wire.
- 5. All property line setbacks specified in the covenants shall be observed for fences and walls. The exceptions include trees, hedges, or other plantings on or near the property line.

One topic that the guidelines do not address is raised beds and hoop-houses. In the absence of guidance in regard to these structures, we ask that residents who want to build such structures come to the ECIA and review their plans with me, the Covenants Compliance Representative.

While we want to encourage gardening and food self-sustainability in Eldorado, we also want to ensure that all property lines, rights-of-way, and easements are being respected. We also want to ensure that if the structure is going to be permanent in design, it adheres to either the large or small accessory building section of the guidelines, in terms of its location on the lot, height, materials, and design. Should the structure be of a permanent design, it will have to be reviewed by the ECIA Architectural Committee. Recent Major Board Expenditures

The ECIA Board has recently approved the following from the Repair/Replacement and Capital Improvement funds:

In December, Repair/Replacement funds not to exceed (NTE) \$6,000 were approved to repair/rebuild the Association's landscaping tractor. This is in lieu of a complete replacement, which had been budgeted in 2010, and is projected to extend the life of the tractor until 2017. The tractor's replacement cost is estimated at \$24,000 (in 2017 dollars); it is used for landscaping, snow plowing, general hauling, and arena maintenance at the Stables amenity.

In January, Repair/Replacement funds NTE \$66,000 were approved to replace and upgrade the water distribution system for the Stables amenity, which was a relic from the AMREP era. Individual barn owners will reimburse 39% of this cost over the next two years. Despite difficulties of extreme cold weather, the project was completed on time and on budget in March.

Also in January, Capital Improvement funds for two phases of a Community Center landscaping improvement plan were approved NTE \$24,000. This includes two areas: (1) between the Community Center building and the playgrounds, which will be treated to new trees and shrubs, benches, mulch, path improvements, and trash receptacles; and (2) the front entry, which will receive cleaning, grading, sign-

age, benches, trash/recycling bins, trees, and shrubs. In April, a third phase was scheduled for approval for the arrival loop area (NTE \$6,000), which will include new trees, shrubs, barn fencing, and some tree removal. Professional landscape architect David Lovro volunteered his time with the Facilities and Grounds Committee to draw up the plan. Facilities and Grounds recommends additional future investment in this area.

In March, Capital Improvement funds NTE \$35,000 were approved for renovation of the rental house just north of the Community Center. This will bring the property, which has been vacant since January 2010, up to residential rental standards and allow the Association to again receive rental income from it. A Finance Committee report estimates a 15% return on funds expended and a payback period of seven years, after allowance for vacancies, maintenance, and depreciation,.

Also in March, Capital Improvement funds NTE \$3,000 were approved for a water spigot at the Dog Park amenity. Most of the cost involves bringing water service underground several hundred feet from the Community Center.

Maintaining sustainable reserves for growing repair/replacement needs is an ongoing concern of the Finance Committee.

Prepare Now, Survive Later

iving in Eldorado, we tend to think we are immune from the natural and man-made disasters we see reported virtually every time we turn on our TV. We are not. Wildland fire starting up in our greenbelts and burning us out is a real and present danger in the dry and windy season we are now experiencing. Some of us think the dry plant growth surrounding and, in some cases, brushing the windows of our homes looks both natural and nice. Members of our volunteer fire department, the EFRS, will tell you that fire is natural too. They will also tell you that if your home has no "defensible space"—a place where weeds and other burnable vegetation have been cut down close to your house—they may have to bypass your home for those that can be defended.

We have regularly "dodged the disaster bullet" in Eldorado, but we may not be so lucky forever. Few of us know how close we came to suffering the same fate that befell Española and Taos during last winter's gas crisis. As pressure levels fell under the onslaught of below-zero temperatures, Eldorado was next on the list to have its gas supply cut off.

We are more vulnerable than we think we are.

A flex-fuel engine can use any blend of gasoline and ethanol. Ethanol offers three advantages. It produces 25% to 85% fewer emissions than regular gas, it can improve your engine's performance, and it can have a cleaning effect on your engine. While it is somewhat more expensive than regular gas, the savings in maintenance costs and carbon emissions make it a good investment. Ethanol can be purchased at two Giant stations at 1229 and 4359 Cerrillos.

MAY 4-7: Eta Aquarids Meteor Shower. The Eta Aquarids

are a light shower, usually producing about 10 meteors per hour at their peak. The shower's peak is expected on May 5-6, but viewing should be good on any morning May 4-7. A thin, crescent moon will set early in the evening, leaving dark skies for what could be a good show. The radiant point for this shower will be in the constellation Aquarius. Best viewing is usually to the east after midnight, far from city lights.

MAY 16: Full Moon Hike at White Sands, 7.30 pm. Take a trip down to White Sands National Monument in Tularosa Basin, 15 miles southwest of Alamogordo, and see one of the world's great natural wonders, the world's largest gypsum dunefield, under the glow of the moon.

Wildfire Danger in Eldorado

t has been five years since we have seen such a dry winter, and the vegetation around our homes reflects the scant precipitation. The Eldorado area is in the wildland/urban interface which is where wildland vegetation and houses coincide. This, coupled with the spring winds, increases the likelihood of wildfires. To keep our homes safer, El Dorado Fire Chiefs Steve Tapke and Glenn Saums suggest residents implement the following precautionary measures:

- ▶ Defensible space is the single most important preventive measure you can take to protect your home. Clear all vegetation around your house to a perimeter 30 to 70 feet from the structure.
- Keep trees trimmed a minimum of 10 feet away from your home.*
- ▶ Summer is grilling season. If you have a gas grill, check all the connections to ensure there are no leaks. If you prefer a traditional barbeque, keep a connected water hose nearby. Store briquettes in a metal bucket until cold.
- Store firewood and other outdoor combustibles away from the house.
- ▶ Keep your chimney clean and make sure a spark arrestor is in place.
- Fireworks and outdoor burning are significant causes of wildland fires.

- ▶ Be aware of your surroundings. Report smoke plumes at once. Call 911.
- If you are asked to evacuate, do so and follow the instructions of emergency response personnel.
- Finally, have an escape plan. Discuss with your family how to exit from various points around the house and where you will meet so you can count heads.

FIREWISE COMMUNTIES RECOMMENDS:

Keep the first 3 to 5 feet from your house clear of plantings, unless you have noncombustible siding; and in that case, plant only widely spaced foundation plantings of growing shrubs or other Firewise plants.Do not plant directly beneath windows or next to foundation vents. Be sure there are no areas of continuous grass adjacent to plantings in this area. Frequently prune and maintain plants in this zone to ensure vigorous growth and low-growth habits. Its construction was a collaborative effort by students from Pojoaque High School's horticulture class and their teacher Joe Matteson. The hoop-house allows the garden to begin producing herbs and vegetables earlier in the growing season as well as after the early frosts. Raised beds were first introduced here last summer and produced well through the summer, delivering great veggies for our daily lunch menu.

he Santa Fe Performance Exchange in La Tienda is a non-profit venue for live music, performing arts, community-based events, and educational programs that support the arts and artists, and promote community.

The newly formed non-profit carries on the vision of Mike Engledinger's "Mike's Music Exchange," and the transformation was supported by the owners of La Tienda. Since its transition to non-profit status, the Exchange has held a number of fundraising campaigns which have received tremendous response. Musicians donated their time and talent during the Exchange's 10-day Winter Fiesta in February. Many local residents and businesses came forward as founders, sponsors, and volunteers, and the Exchange successfully staged over 20 concerts and community events, drawing over 1,000 audience members since the opening on February 1, 2011.

A "Student Salon" program is being developed to provide performance opportunities for local music
