Crude Oil in Lamy?

acer Energy Marketing, a Tulsa-based crude oil transportation company, wants to open a transloading facility in Lamy, New Mexico. The company intends to use the site to offload crude oil from trucks and transfer it to railcars. Pacer would lease the track siding from Santa Fe Southern Railway, which once operated the tourist train that ran between Santa Fe and Lamy.

ABOUT PACER

Pacer Energy Marketing is a privately held company with operations in Oklahoma, Wyoming, Kansas, and New Mexico. The company receives oil from approximately 600 wells in the Four Corners region of the state. Most is unloaded at a terminal in Thoreau, New Mexico. Pacer is interested in Lamy as a backup for this location.

LAMY PROJECT

The project involves tanker trucks traveling along Highway 285 and County Road 33 to Lamy's railroad wye (railway tracks arranged in a triangle) where employees would transfer crude oil to railroad tanker cars, using pumps and hoses. It takes 3.5 tanker trucks to fill up a railroad tanker car. A minimum of six trucks would roll into Lamy each day. From there, the oil would travel by rail to refineries south of Albuquerque.

POTENTIAL BENEFITS

Pacer representatives are interested in hiring locals for jobs such as security and rail loading.

POTENTIAL PROBLEMS

Derailment and Explosions: In January, several oil train derailments prompted the chairmen of the Senate Energy and Transportation committees to encourage the Obama administration to address safety issues surrounding the transportation of crude oil via rail. Currently, the rail industry successfully delivers oil without incident 99.99% of the time.

However, roughly 78,000 of the country's 92,000 oil tank railcars were constructed in accordance with safety standards that are outdated. These tank cars have a tendency to split open during derailments.

Recent derailments include a July 2013 event in Quebec that killed 47 people, and a November 2013 derailment and explosion in Alabama, in which 749,000 gallons of oil spilled.

Spills: Lamy's town well is approximately 100 feet away from the proposed terminal. Any water pollution from this project could also impact Galisteo and render one of EAWSD's most productive wells unusable on an indefinite basis.

Emergency Response: County Road 33 is the only means of reaching or evacuating Lamy. Commissioner Kathy Holian commented: "If an accident were to occur that involved an explosion or combustion of the fuel to be transferred, it would be extremely difficult for emergency personnel to effectively deal with it."

According to Mike Neely, assistant chief of operations for the Santa Fe County Fire Department, "an expected response time to the proposed Lamy site would be 12-14 minutes" and "the approximately 1.5 mile road into Lamy may present a challenge in regard to access, egress and evacuation of the area."

Other Concerns: Residents have expressed concern about an increase in noise and light pollution, and the impact that a transloading facility would have on area property values.

ADDRESSING CONCERNS

Safety Measures: According to Thomas Birkett, Rail Asset Manager for Pacer, the company takes measures to prevent the static electricity buildup that can cause fires. These include grounding both trucks and railcars,

and submerging the load. Vapors are gathered during the loading process and returned to the oil fields.

Pacer has a formal spill and containment plan in place. "What little we have spilled, we have cleaned up within hours and replaced the gravel that was sullied with clean material," Birkett wrote in an email to a KOB reporter.

Safety Record: During the past two years, Pacer drivers have been involved in two crashes that resulted in injuries. The Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration's safety profile for Pacer lists reportable crashes, but does not assign responsibility for the incidents. It is more challenging to obtain the safety records for railway operations, because current law allows such information to be exempt from Freedom of Information Act requests.

PERMIT REQUIREMENTS

Pacer applied for an air quality permit from the State Department of the Environment, but the project is too small to necessitate regulation. It is unclear what additional permits the company needs.

INTERACTIONS WITH PACER

The Pacer website states: "we are committed to safety, protecting the environment, and actively engaging with the community we live and serve in." The company sent two representatives (Dan Whitmarsh and Dave Tulk) to meet with Lamy residents at the old Legal Tender Saloon, on January 18, 2014. Tom Birkett has also been in e-mail communication with KOB reporter, Caleb James.

Since then, Senators Tom Udall and Martin Heinrich and Representative Ben Ray Lujan wrote to Pacer, asking for an overview of the project, an outline of infrastructure

Recent Board Actions

he ECIA Board held its regular meeting on February 20, with five Board members present: Karyn Mounsey (Secretary), Todd Handy (Treasurer and Chair), Jeanne Calzada, Pam Henline, and Dave Perlmutter; Dag Ryen (President) and Jan Pietrzak (Vice President) were absent/excused. The following formal actions were taken unanimously, without the Chair voting:

- A variance was approved for 14 Ensenada Drive to allow three accessory buildings built from 1995 to 2004 without a permit to remain along with two cisterns.
- A variance was approved for 2 Raudo Road to permit a ground-mounted solar array more than 15
- ▼ A variance was approved for 2 Cuesta Lane for a screening fence and shed 20 feet from the house.
- ▼ Tom Brimacombe was appointed to the Conservation Committee.
- Karen Murry was appointed to the Facilities and Grounds Committee.
- ▼ Pierre Bovis, John Reynolds, and Felicia Probert were appointed to the Roads Committee.
- ▼ A variance was approved for 3 Manzano Lane for an existing water diversion structure to remain, with conditions.
- ▼ A variance was approved for 102 Jornada Loop to allow an existing small structure and fence to remain.
- A variance was denied for 22 Chusco Road for a 9.5-foot-high metal shade structure because height and materials were not compliant with Architectural Guidelines.

The ECIA Board held a special meeting, with notice of a single agenda item, on Thursday, March 6.

The annual independent audit report was accepted by unanimous vote.

The ECIA Board held its regular meeting on March 20, with six Board members present: Dag Ryen (President and Chair), Jan Pietrzak (Vice President), Karyn Mounsey (Secretary), Todd Handy (Treasurer), Pam Henline, and Dave Perlmutter. Jeanne Calzada was absent/excused. The following formal actions were taken unanimously, without the Chair voting, except where noted:

- ▼ Revised charters were approved for the Architecture, Facilities & Grounds, Stable, and Finance Committees.
- ▼ Revised Stable rules and regulations were approved. (3-2)
- ▼ A Board Affirmation Oath was approved to ensure that Directors meet attendance and responsibility requirements.
- ▼ Dana Atkins and Steve Taratula were appointed to the Architecture Committee.
- ▼ Larry Lemmon was appointed as an alternate to the Architecture Committee.
- A variance was approved for 3 Dulce Road for a fence located in the 20-foot required setback.
- ▼ A variance was approved for 5 Enebro Way for a pergola made of metal fashioned to resemble wood

Message from the ECIA Board

n the midst of spring, there is a lot going on in Eldorado, beginning with the ECIA annual meeting. We hope that the vast majority of members of the association will have cast their ballots in the recent Board election. The results of that election will be announced at the annual meeting, and other important information about the activities of the board and committees will be conveyed. The meeting will be held at La Tienda on May 5 from 7 to 9 PM.

Later in the month, on Saturday and Sunday, May 17 and 18, the Eldorado Arts and Crafts Association will hold its annual studio tour, featuring the work of 90 local artists and craft workers. On Friday evening prior to the tour, there will be a reception with the participating artists in the Exhibit Space at La Tienda from 5 to 7 PM. Maps and brochures will be available to help visitors and neighbors plan their studio visits. Please be aware of the extra traffic expected during the tour and exercise caution when traveling around Eldorado.

After the studio tour, the spring construction season will begin in earnest. The Santa Fe County Department of Public Works will begin its surfacing project on Herrada Road before the end of the month. Residents in the area should be prepared for some delays as they travel to and from their homes. The county expects to complete the project within 10–12 weeks.

There is also construction and maintenance work slated for some of our multi-use trails. Additional crack sealing and coating will be done on the trails along Avenida Vista Grande and Avenida Eldorado, as well as at the Community Center parking lot, and the county will reconstruct segments of the multi-use trails along Avenida Vista Grande and Monte Alto. Motorists and pedestrians should use caution when approaching any work crews along our streets and trails.

Toward the end of May, schools will be letting out and there will be more children and youth in our neighborhoods. Among the projects in line to accommodate our younger residents is a complete reconstruction of the play equipment at Compadres Park.

Finally, but not least, the swimming pool will reopen on Saturday, May 24. We hope these and other improvements to our community will contribute to an enjoyable and rewarding warm weather season for everyone in Eldorado.

Say No to Lattice

ver the past two years, the ECIA has noted an increase in the use of lattice as a building material for walls and screens. Under Section 7, line 6, of the Eldorado Guidelines, however, the use of lattice is not allowed as a construction material:

ELDORADO GUIDELINES FOR PROTECTIVE COVENANTS AND BUILDING RESTRICTIONS:

Item # 7 Non Approved Design Features:

Sections 4 and 5 of these guidelines list five styles of architecture to be used throughout Eldorado. Certain design features and structures are incompatible with those styles. To preserve the intent and continuity of those styles, the following features and structures are not considered compatible and are, therefore, not permitted. The list is not to be considered as all inclusive, but rather as examples of non-approved designs.

- 1. Metal gravel stops and edging unless pre-finished to be consistent with the dwelling stucco color.
- 2. Exposed corrugated fiberglass or plastic roof and wall panels unless blended with the existing structure.
- 3. Eyebrows unless they blend with the style of the principal dwelling.
- 4. Bay windows can be utilized if in keeping with the architectural style of the home.
- 5. Exposed wrought iron, steel or other metallic ma-

terials are permitted only on Mexican Colonial Style homes in Eldorado, with the exception of metal (other than chain link fence material) used to construct gates in walls or fences. Metal gates shall be of a design appropriate to the architectural style of the home and all such gates shall require review by the ECIA Architecture Committee. Metal security screen doors and entry doors may be used if they are colored or painted to match the color of the home.

- 6. Lattice work used as a construction material that is mounted vertically, diagonally, or horizontally.
- 7. Shutters except utilized in territorial style dwelling.
- 8. Awnings of a color not compatible with the dwelling.

Because lattice is considered a non-approved construction material, we ask that residents refrain from using lattice for any kind of fence, wall, or screen constructions. The only approved use of lattice is in a garden setting where plants and vines are growing onto it.

As stated on page 4 of the Guidelines, "The architectural styles and design motifs for Eldorado are, for the most part, a continuation of the architectural heritage of Santa Fe. Architectural approval of styles and design motifs in Eldorado is intended to preserve the predominant characteristics of this heritage."

ECIA 2014 Pool Season

Our beautiful Eldorado pool will open Memorial Day weekend, May 24. As in the past two years, the pool manager will be Julee White. She and her crew of lifeguards are anticipating a wonderful season.

Pool passes can be obtained in the office beginning May 5. For those who can't get to the office during the week, we will be open for three consecutive Saturdays, May 31, June 7, and June 14, from 11 AM to 3 PM. If you have a pool pass from past years, you will get a 2014 sticker.

This year, everyone who gets a pool pass or sticker will be asked to read the pool rules and sign a statement agreeing to abide by the rules. To be eligible for a pool pass, a lot owner must be a "Member in Good Standing," which means all amounts owed the Association must be paid. Children thirteen and over will be issued a pool pass. Each Member in Good Standing with a valid pool pass will be allowed to escort a maximum of three (3) guests per day. The member will be asked to sign their guests in and will be responsible for them.

As stated in the Bylaws, members may delegate their pool rights to a tenant with a valid lease. The tenant must bring a copy of the lease to the office to obtain a pool pass.

Herrada Road Paving

n March 20, Herrada Road Paving Project Manager Chuck Vigil attended the ECIA Board meeting to discuss the upcoming paving plan. Herrada Road intersects Avenida Casa del Oro, crosses Avenida de Compadres, and terminates just before the railway tracks.

The new roadway will have 6 inches of base course and 3 inches of asphalt. Each lane (one in either direction) will be 10 feet in width. While there is neither space nor funds for designated walking paths, a 2-foot area will be left between the edge of the pavement and the grading, to accommodate pedestrians.

The proposed schedule calls for bids to be in by April and the contract to be awarded at the end of May. Construction begins in June—after the Eldorado Studio Tour—and is expected to last for up to 60 working days, weather permitting.


The New Mexico Gas Company plans to move affected lines in April, as does PNM (which has only a few relocations). Comcast and Century Link have already started work. County representatives have been in communication with EAWSD General Manager David Chakroff about water lines that are within the county right-of-way, and EAWSD will handle any necessary modifications or relocations. Homeowners on Herrada Road are not responsible for the cost of the work on culverts or for moving their mailboxes.

The benefits of this project include a reduction in noise, dust, maintenance, and wear and tear on vehicles. Paving should also result in better drainage and emergency vehicle response times.

The Herrada Road speed limit will remain at 25 MPH. If speeding becomes an issue, the first step is to contact the Traffic Division and request a Traffic Calming Initiation Packet. This launches a process that involves petitions, traffic studies, and the possible installation of traffic calming devices.

changes, lists of permits sought and obtained, a timeline, and information regarding any community benefits. They also offered to help Pacer to identify a different location for the terminal.

Jennifer Talhelm, communications director for Senator Udall's office, said: "as of this writing, [April 1] Senator Udall and the other members of the delegation who signed the letter have yet to hear from Pacer in response to their questions." The original letter was dated February 12, 2014.

INFRASTRUCTURE

County Road 33 (aka Old Lamy Trail) provides access

to Lamy, and it was repaved just last summer. Santa Fe County, which is responsible for its maintenance, had an engineering firm assess the road. The core testing results revealed that, by instituting a 26-ton weight limit on vehicles, the road could last for twenty years.

County commissioners voted unanimously to publish a draft ordinance that restricts vehicle weight to 26 tons on Old Lamy Trail; the vote on the actual ordinance is scheduled for May. According to public works director Adam Leigland, "the Ordinance will allow Santa Fe County to place a weight limit on CR33... to preserve the County's investment in that road, in line with our pavement preventative maintenance practices." -Juliet White

Insects and Toxins

veral years ago, while jogging early on an autumn day, I was amazed to find a large number of "walking stick" insects. Since then, I've seen a few here and there, but never as many at one time. Walking sticks have always fascinated me. Closely resembling leafless twigs (hence their name), they are usually still during the daytime (blending into their surroundings) and more active at night when they feed on vegetation.

We have another remarkable insect here in Eldorado, the praying mantis. Our version is the Obscure Ground Mantid, which can grow up to several inches in length. Like walking sticks, mantids typically move slowly. However, since they carry their front legs close to their heads (resembling a position of prayer), they are able to quickly grab insects. Their favorite food? Ants!

Unlike walking sticks and the praying mantis, the termite can cause structural damage. Termites are pale in color, with soft bodies and no waist, whereas ants (with whom termites are often confused) are darker, have a hard exoskeleton, and a waist. Termites in our area are likely Heterotermes aures, found throughout the Southwest deserts.

Some Eldorado residents use pesticides to kill these and other pests – including rodents or even weeds. It's tempting to reach for a poison spray or granules, especially when we see undesired insects or rodents. Once toxins enter the environment, however, they accumulate in the food chain and negatively affect all beings, both human and wildlife.

Mouse Encounters

ike others, I believed that finding mice in the home was not unusual, and the need to clean up after them was just a fact of life. That opinion was based on my experience in homes in Massachusetts, Texas, Vermont, and New Mexico. When I spotted this little gray creature in our home in Eldorado, it was not a surprise. It did surprise me to find their droppings in a light fixture, and then on the washing machine below it. I almost had admiration for the resourceful little critters.

My wife saw it differently, and she started bugging me to do something about it. I put out some traps and soon caught three mice. But the droppings kept appearing; even worse, they started to invade the car. We found a nest behind the back seat in an area you can't see unless you fold it halfway down. This was not acceptable.

She wanted to take some positive action to stop these uninvited guests. I argued that since it was an impossible task, we shouldn't waste money on such a proj-

Rodenticides, pesticides, and herbicides can kill non-target organisms, including beneficial insects, soil bacteria, and important predators such as owls, hawks, and bobcats. The nervous systems and organs of ecologically valuable insects and animals—including our much-needed pollinators—can also be damaged, harming their ability to survive or reproduce. A bird, for example, can pick up a granular pesticide when looking for seeds, or can consume a pesticide-infested insect or plant. The dead bird, then, is eaten by a bird of prey or a mammal which, in turn, is affected. Children and pets can also be exposed to the toxins and can track them into the home.

We should use any such poisons sparingly (if at all) and with extreme caution. Some non-toxic alternatives include sealing entrances (see article below) and removing food sources to prevent rodents, and using mulches and weed barriers to keep weeds at bay. ect. Undeterred, she hired a local pest control company, who sent a man over.

He started work on the roof, putting metal screening around all the vents for the heating and plumbing systems. Then he inspected the outer walls for spaces around windows, doors, vigas, and canales. When he found one, he sealed it off. Around the garage he blocked any openings and put brush-like barriers at the base of the door. For the car, he had a different but equally effective solution, a set of little cloth packets containing a mixture that smells like balsam (and like a Christmas tree). Apparently, mice can't stand it. We put the packets in the car interior, the trunk, and the engine compartment. Then we went away for several months. On our return, I was expecting some of the usual mouse signs. Nothing! This was amazing. That was 2009, and we have had no mice since in either the house or the car. The traps have been set, but all are empty.

Meanwhile, we learned that mice attacked the ignition wires of a neighbor's car. We told her about our solution. Now her car smells like a Christmas tree, too. -H. W. Von Letkemann, hvonletkemann@earthlink.net
