New ECIA Board Takes Shape

ecent elections usher in a new era for the Eldorado Community Improvement Association. Three director positions have been filled, two of them by individuals who had never served on the Board, and the newly constituted Board of Directors has elected a new slate of officers.

Leading the Board for the coming months will be President John Henriksen, Vice-President Antone Forneris, Treasurer Joseph Gutierrez, and Secretary Michael McDowell. The other members of the Board are Pam Henline, David McDonald, and Barrett "Iody" Price.

The new Board has chosen to change its meeting schedule. Board work sessions will be moved to the third Wednesday of each month, with the regular Board meeting on the following Monday. In June, the work session will take place on the 21st, and the regular meeting on the 26th.

Board President John Henriksen is committed to ensuring that Eldorado remains a great place for all residents. The new Board will work closely with staff and our management company, HOAMCO, to streamline association management, Henriksen states. The Board is also working on some new initiatives for the community. Members are encouraged to refer to the ECIA website and future issues of Vistas for additional information.

The April elections were closely contested, although participation remained low. Only about a fourth of eligible voters cast ballots. There were 555 qualified ballots, and all four candidates received more than 300 votes. Returning Board member Pam Henline received 412 votes. New Board members David McDonald and Barrett "Jody" Price received 414 and 396 votes, respectively. Losing candidate David Cihon garnered 317 votes. -Dag Ryen Note New Meeting Day!

Board Approves Revised Guidelines

he ECIA Board approved the latest version of the Guidelines for Protective Covenants and Building Restrictions for Eldorado at Santa Fe at their meeting on April 20, 2017. The previous guidelines had been updated in 2014. This new version represents over three years of work by the ECIA Architecture Committee, Board, and staff and is the most thorough update to the guidelines in many years. Additionally, this document includes many of the comments and changes requested by residents at the two public forums that were held.

The most noticeable update to this document is its new format and numbering system, which is more consistent and easier to read and reference. This new formatting follows the style found in the Santa Fe County Sustainable Land Development Code and in the City of Santa Fe Land Development Code.

While the ECIA Architecture Committee and Board went through every section of the guidelines to update those parts that were thought to be inadequate to address current ECIA needs, the most noteworthy modifications are the four new sections:

▼ Shade, Play, Storage and Similar Structures

- ▼ Screening with Berms and Vegetation
- ▼ Storm Water Management Areas
- Movable Storage Containers

Minor changes were also made to those sections that needed updating in order to bring the guidelines more into line with current building materials, new solar and energy technologies, and sustainable building practices.

One important point to note is that plans for any buildings or structures previously approved by the ECIA shall not be affected by these new guidelines. A Hard Stop at the End of the Slow Lane

n this month's installment about life in the slow lane out here in Eldorado, it's time to talk about Lstop signs. As you make your way to and from your home and work, school, and various places outside Eldorado, you are bound to encounter at least two or three stop signs. All drivers have had to learn that the law requires, and safe driving practice dictates, that we come to a complete stop and look both ways before proceeding past a stop sign and into an intersection. But as often happens, we can get in a hurry or think we can see if there are oncoming vehicles as we approach an intersection, so we may conclude that slowing down and rolling through without coming to a full stop is good enough. The problem is that not everything traveling the roads is a large and easily seen vehicle. It might be something smaller, like one of the many cyclists who ride the roads of Eldorado, or even a motorcyclist. It might also be a jogger, dog walker, or family with children crossing the road from the multi-use path just before the stop sign. A quick glance on approach to the intersection or glare from the sun might just be enough to miss the smaller things in the intersection. So, let's all try to leave a minute or two earlier, obey the speed limits, and come to a hard stop at each and every

stop sign we encounter as we travel the slow lanes of Eldorado.

ADDENDUM: An Eldorado resident who felt frustrated by the frequency of speeding motorists on our roads contacted the Sheriff's Department to obtain statistics on tickets issued to drivers in Eldorado. Here is what was learned from Captain William Pacheco. In an eight-day period in April when sheriffs were actively patroling our roads, 30 citations were issued. Of these, 19 were for speeding (most of them for going 50-56 in a 40 MPH zone), 10 were for failing to come to a complete stop at a stop sign, and 1 was for not having insurance.

In case Eldoradoans need a reason to slow down other than safety and courtesy, the fines for these tickets are as follows:

Running a stop sign: \$71

Driving 1–10 MPH over the speed limit: \$76

Driving 11–15 MPH over the speed limit: \$91

Driving 16–20 MPH over the speed limit: \$126

Driving 21–25 MPH over the speed limit: \$161

Driving 25–30 MPH over the speed limit: \$186

Driving without a seat belt: \$25

Recent Board Actions

he Board of Directors of the Eldorado Community Improvement Association met on Thursday, May 18, 2017. Members present were President John Henriksen, Vice-President Antone Forneris, Treasurer Joseph Gutierrez, Secretary Michael McDowell, and Directors Pam Henline, David McDonald, and Jody Price. The following actions were taken:

- A motion was passed to reconfirm and approve a motion made on March 6, 2017, in an emergency situation to facilitate management of 2017 elections (Henline, McDonald, and Price abstained).
- A motion was passed to approve a variance request relating to 22 Juego Road to allow for driveway liner to remain as solid coyote fence design (Henline abstained).
- A motion was passed to approve a variance request relating to 6 Moya Place to allow existing fence enclosure space on lot to exceed 4000 sq. ft. (Henline opposed).
- A motion was passed unanimously to approve the reappointment of Nina Harrison to the Architecture Committee.
- ▼ A motion was passed unanimously to approve the appointment of Jolene Petrowski to the Architecture Committee.
- ▼ A motion was passed unanimously to approve the bid from Heads Up for the breezeway project in the amount of \$15,466.71 (not to exceed \$17,000).

- ▼ A motion was passed unanimously to send a 30day contract termination to Signature Offset, the Vistas printer.
- ▼ A motion was passed unanimously to approve the proposal from Ambitions Document Solutions to print the Vistas at a monthly rate of \$1,046.30 from July through December, 2017.

The next scheduled meeting of the ECIA Board of Directors will be on June 26, 2017, at 7 PM in the Railroad Room at the Community Center. Regular Board meetings are held on the fourth Monday of each month at 7 PM at the Community Center and are open to the public. An open forum and community announcements are normally included. 

The History, First Settlers

from Part 2 of Windmills and Dreams

The history of human habitation in the Eldorado area definitely begins with the Anasazi. They came, they dwelt here, and they left. The land and the water did not provide enough for survival. Water was barely enough during the good years, and when droughts came and the wells ran dry, they had to move to survive.

It is believed that those who lived here remained until around the middle of the 1300s, their adobe homes built atop those of the ancestors who had been here before them. Archaeologists believe that the population more than likely moved to the Galisteo Basin, and from there eventually to the many pueblos existing today in the Santa Fe, Taos, and Albuquerque areas.

It is where, in 1914 and 1915, an anthropologist named Nels Nelson would first dig up these ancient


homes and ruins, and in 1969, the white man from far away would once again build homes that seemed to blend with the earth.

Remains of the ancient Anasazi pueblos have been found on parts of the former Lamy Ranch near Eldorado as well as in and around the town of Lamy. The area these tribes of ancient humans inhabited some twelve thousand years ago ranges from the hills of the Cañada de Los Alamos and Lamy Grants north of I-25 to sites past the town of Lamy down to Galisteo. Our subdivision is a part of this ancient prehistory.

Simple Paper Recycling

nlike money, paper does grow on trees. Check out these earth-friendly tips for recycling paper:

- ▼ **Print again:** Reuse printer paper if it has text on only one side.
- ▼ Take note: Create a notepad by stapling together pieces of recycled paper of the same size.
- ▼ Let them scribble: Printer paper is great for kids to draw and paint on.
- Cushion your packages: Newspaper or old wrapping paper can be used as package padding, which eliminates the need for Styrofoam.
- Wrap it in your own style: Use unwanted newspaper, decorate, and voilà—instant customized wrapping paper.

Recycle it: Paper bags, newspapers, and magazines can all be recycled. The only recycling no-nos are waxed paper, laminated paper (like that in fast food products), pet-food bags, and oil or foodsoaked paper. Magazines, catalogs, telephone books, direct mail, brochures, pamphlets and booklets, in addition to cereal, cake, chip, and cracker boxes and pizza boxes can all be recycled. Be sure to remove the liner and all food from boxes and place them in a paper sack with your junk mail, mixed paper, magazines, and catalogs. Paper smaller than an index card (3×5") can be placed in a larger sealed envelope or included with shredded paper. Place shredded paper in a clear bag before tossing into the recycling bin, and punch a few holes in the bag with a pencil to keep it from bursting.

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH FLORA & FAUNA GROUP

When is a Willow Not a Willow?

nswer: When it is a Desert Willow (Chilopsis linearis), which is not a true willow but actually is related to the Catalpa trees of the Bignonia family. It is called a willow because of its narrow willow-like shaped leaves. It is native to the Southwest, growing along washes and arroyos to about 6,000 feet, and is important in erosion control. The leaves have a waxy coating that helps to prevent water loss; it also, along with its very deep roots, aids the tree in adapting to arid environments.

With showy, fragrant flowers that bloom late in spring, the Desert Willow is a desirable ornamental bush (some call it a tree), growing to a height of 20 feet and 10-20 feet wide. The beautiful bellshaped flowers come in white, pink, or purple and attract hummingbirds, bees, and butterflies for the nectar. The plant provides dappled shade in the garden, and the long-flowering blooms continue until early frost. Once established, the Desert Willow is quite drought tolerant; but when young, it does need more water. It is a deciduous bush, dropping its leaves in the winter and even perhaps in very hot, dry weather. The fruit is a pencil-thin capsule/bean, although some varieties produce no seed pod. The Desert Willow was designated the official tree of Albuquerque in 1964.

Native Americans used the wood to make bows, and the leaves and stems were powdered and used to treat skin infections. Decoctions of the flowers are used in Mexico to treat bronchial problems, and the stiff, durable wood is often used for fence posts.

In the actual Willow family (Salicaceae), there are only two genera: Salix (willows), which consists of about 300 species, and *Populus* (aspens and cottonwoods), which has about 40 species. Both willows and poplars have a strong affinity for water and are mostly found near ponds and rivers. Almost all are deciduous. Their flowers are in the form of catkins, which appear on the tree shortly before the new leaves come out. Reproductive events are mostly driven by the wind.

Willows have been important to Native Americans for generations. The supple branches were used to make baskets, and the bark was made into a medicinal tea. Young branches were chewed to relieve headaches, and, as a matter of fact,

the active ingredient, salicylic acid, is used as the basis for our modern aspirin. Additionally, the shade provided by willows on the water helps keep the water temperature lower, which in turn is beneficial for native fish such as trout. Some wildlife species use the willows as a source of food and cover, and beavers use the wood to make their dams. A few of the species of willow found in the Southwest are Covote Willow, Sandbar Willow, and Bluestem Willow.

Aspens and cottonwoods will be covered in a fu-

Ryen and Handy: Co-Residents of the Year

ach year our Board recognizes one ★ ECIA volunteer with a "Resident of the Year" award. Most often, the Board chooses a committee member who has shown remarkable dedication in their service to the community.

However, this year the Board gave two separate awards. Even more unusual, the recognition went to two of its own directors, Treasurer Todd Handy and President Dag Ryen. Both Todd and Dag were more than a little surprised.

At the end of 2009, the Association experienced a serious staff embezzlement and needed a new Board treasurer. Although Ryen had been aware that Handy was to be the recipient of this year's Resident of the Year award, he wasn't expecting a second award. "I was certainly surprised and delighted at the many accolades and honors that were heaped upon me at the

Annual Meeting," said Dag. "I would go so far as to say that I was humbled. It's been a joy to work for the ECIA, and it's really nice to realize that there's been some appreciation for what we managed to accomplish."

Both Dag and Todd have given immensely of their time and talent to this community. How fitting that they both be recognized for it.
