# Is Eldorado A Safe Community?

**ECENTLY A NEW, PART-TIME** resident of Eldorado named Jody sent a letter of distress to the editor of Vistas. Last summer Jody's family bought a second home here, hoping someday to make it their primary residence. Beginning her letter with "I wish my house had eyes," Jody describes how, shortly after her family left their new house in Eldorado to return back east, the house was broken into and a car and television set stolen. To Jody's dismay, "no one saw anything."

Feeling "shocked and frightened," she goes on to comment, "I worry that I may have put too much faith in the words 'community', 'neighborhood' and 'communal' that are often used to describe the Eldorado development."

Property crime affecting one's home is always unnerving. But ECIA would like to assure Jody that there is a caring community here in Eldorado, and that there are ways our residents can protect themselves against such crimes—ways that may require some community involvement.

There are two programs that Jody (and anyone else in Eldorado) should consider. First, there's Neighborhood Watch. This program can be organized with minimal time and effort in any neighborhood. ECIA's packet for newcomers provides all the information needed to get a Neighborhood Watch program started on your block. Here's how it works. Wherever there is interest, a block captain can be assigned to a set of 10 to 15 houses. Neighborhood Watch monitors information from the Sheriff's Department and sends out alerts to the block captains



any time a crime occurs in Eldorado; the block captain then sends email notices to his or her neighbors. Also, neighbors who join a group get to know one another and can, if they choose, let the others know when they will be away, and may even ask for a little help with such things as picking up the newspaper, collecting the mail, or other small efforts that can keep an empty house from becoming an easy target. Neighborhood Watch also distributes brochures with crime-prevention tips that can help keep residents from being victimized. Even this minor level of involvement with one's neighbors can greatly increase the security of your home. The second solution is Eldorado Security. For a nominal fee, any resident can request our local security patrol to keep an eye on a property-whether the owner is out of town or not. This may be just what you need to help you feel a little more safe. To learn more about this service, check out the link on www.eldoradocommunity.org; or to make arrangements, call 204-2945.

# At The Crossroads

**NNECESSARY EXPENSES:** Our kids seem to be getting bored a lot earlier in the season these days. Even before school recessed for the summer, we had several instances of vandalism along our roads. Vandals damaged a number of crossing signs on the bike path along Avenida Eldorado, bent or knocked off several street signs and painted graffiti in one of the drainage culverts. These destructive acts take funds away from other, more positive expenditures (such as filling cracks in the bike paths or getting additional gravel and grading on our dirt roads). Do you know where your kids are? If they are caught, are you prepared to reimburse the expenses incurred?

RECENTLY COMPLETED OR COMING **ROAD PROJECTS:** As of early July, work should be complete on (chip seal) paving of Camarada Road between Avenida Azul and Camerada Loop. This

problem area was identified by the County Road Advisory Committee as one of the worst in the County and by a petition from the residents along the road. County The has requested bids for

laying new base course on several miles of our roads and should have awarded the contract in June. Work should begin later this summer.

The Road Committee is currently deliberating future policy on paving additional roads in Eldorado. Not only is the question of "should we" under consideration; we are also exploring what criteria to use to identify candidates and how to fund the roadwork. 
#### Adam Senior Center Programs Expand



#### **OUT OF THIS WORLD**

The months of May through July are a good time of year for your observing adventure. Constellations such as Sagittarius the Archer and Scorpius the Scorpion pass dramatically overhead. So does the Milky Way. The galactic bulge of this edge-on barred spiral galaxy is plainly visible on clear, dark nights.

On the recent June Solstice, the Sun reached its maximum northern declination of 231/2 degrees north. This latitude is called Tropic of Cancer. The tropics of Cancer and Capricorn were named over 2,000 years ago by the ancient Greeks. Today after centuries of precession, the solstices occur in Taurus and Sagittarius.

# El Dorado K-8 Begins Its First Year

L DORADO ELEMENTARY SCHOOL will begin its first K-8 year in August 2008. ✓ The elementary school will continue to include grades K-5, and the new middle school program will include grades 6-8.

For the 2008-2009 school year, the program will include three sixth-grade classes and two seventhgrade classes, rotating among five different teachers teaching specific subjects. Currently, the middle school teachers include Brian Delay, Anita Navrot, Suzanne Rodriguez, and Scott Larson as the new science teacher. Human Resources personnel are interviewing applicants for a fifth teacher as well.

Initial enrollment includes 46 seventh-grade students. According to Principal Yann Lussiez, interzone transfers from other elementary schools in the Santa Fe area may be a possibility for the seventh-grade classes if there are still open student slots later this summer.

Classes for the middle school students will be held mostly in existing space in the school. Two new portable science buildings-one classroom and one science laboratory—will be added

as well, located in the lower playground.

This summer the new field will be completed in the lower playground, for track and field events at the school. The Vista Grande Library will serve as the library for the middle school students.

Class schedules and curricula are being finalized by Vice Principal Jennifer Sallee. The K-5 students will continue their current schedule of Monday through Thursday 8 am to 3 pm, and Friday 8 am to 12:35 pm. The middle school schedule will be Monday through Friday from 8 am to 3 pm.

Some of the new and exciting programs being offered to the middle school students will take advantage of these extra hours on Friday afternoons. Principal Yann Lussiez is creating a leadership academy program for this time slot, with a curriculum of

new creative electives with more student community involvement. This program will include student mentorship programs involving the Vista Grande Library and possibly the Adam Senior Center as well as other community organizations. Vertical Ventures Inc. is a local program that will sponsor monthly leadership events such as camping trips, climbing wall training, climbing camps and hiking trips for the middle school students.

El Dorado middle school sports programs are not on the agenda for 2008-2009 because of lack of public school funding at this time. Students interested in participating in school sports will be allowed to try out for the Capshaw Middle School teams throughout the year.

The development of a parent-teacher committee is underway to establish a sports program at El Dorado School for the coming years after funding for coaches and equipment has been established. The K-8 architectural planning committee has developed plans for a full-sized gym which could accommodate basketball and volleyball teams, as well as a track and field for cross-country and track teams. The ECIA will be posting an activities/sports web page on its website (www.eldoradocommunity.org) for interested students, parents, and coaches in the community to help establish the sports program, generate ideas and help recruit volunteer coaches and trainers from the community.

The K-8 architectural planning committee is continuing to develop plans for new classrooms, gym space and laboratories for future El Dorado students. However, new construction will likely not begin until 2009-2010, after architectural plans and financing have been completed.

El Dorado School registration for the 2008-2009 school year will be held in the El Dorado School cafeteria on August 14 and 15 between 8 am and 3 pm for all new and returning students.

# Stage 2 Water Alert in Effect

S THE JULY VISTAS goes to press, Eldorado is under a Stage 2 (Severe) Water Alert, mandating water restrictions for all water users. Outdoor watering is limited to one day a week per household (even addresses on Thursday; odd addresses on Tuesday; watering only between 6 pm and 10 am). Car washing as well as filling, refilling, or adding water to spas, ponds, fountains,

or swimming pools are prohibited. Horse washing is restricted to use of a bucket. And restaurant customers must specifically ask for water to be served.

Residential users violating the restrictions will initially receive a warning. A second violation will result in water service being turned off. Construction users may receive a service shutoff with a first violation.

A sign remaining from a defunct, long-closed gas station says it all: regular gas selling at an astonishing \$1.39 a gallon, a price that will probably never be seen again near here or anywhere else in the world.

Though not gleaned from a scientific survey, Eldorado transportation habits seem obvious:

- ▼ Most residents own two or more automobiles.
- ▼ The vast majority of our daily trips are to and from the city of Santa Fe.
- ▼ Most cars on the road between Eldorado and Santa Fe proper have only one passenger (the
- ▼ Few of us who live here coordinate our trips "into town" with other family members in order to reduce our gasoline expenditures.

Assuming that the developers of Eldorado had a business plan, it is a safe bet that one of its assumptions read something like: "The community we propose to build is only 12 miles from the Plaza—a short trip. Although there is no public transportation, a buyer will not be deterred from going into town to shop or to access the services available in Santa Fe."

Given the price of gas today, what was seen as an advantage to the developers of Eldorado has turned into a distinct disadvantage. With gasoline prices now at \$4 a gallon, many of us have to reconsider the habit of making a solo trip "into town" and back, a 25- to 30-mile round-trip, not just once but twice a day.

Useful gas- and money-saving tips are available all over the Internet. One of the best sites for such information is www.gasbuddy.com. First on the list of gasbuddy's advice is this astounding bit of information, which should be noted by all of us who drive at the New Mexico speed limit of 70 to 75 mph (but who usually speed up to 80, assuming that no selfrespecting state police officer would ticket us for being just 5 miles above the legal limit):

> Avoid High Speeds! As your speed increases, your aerodynamic drag increases in an exponential fashion. Driving 62 mph vs. 75 mph will reduce fuel consumption by about 15%.

Gasbuddy.com also reports the lowest gasoline prices available in our area, throughout the state and everywhere else in the country. Price information for our area is now also on our community website (www.eldoradocommunity.org).

What more can we do for ourselves in this time of high-priced fuel? A suggestion from one of our



residents is that every household should hold a weekend meeting to coordinate family members' trips into Santa Fe for the week ahead. Meetings, shopping trips, medical appointments, attendance at entertainment events and dining out could be grouped and consolidated, saving several trips to and from the downtown area.

With respect to our fuel-intensive shopping habits, we have two shopping centers in Eldorado, one of which includes a well-stocked supermarket. We have restaurants, a bank, postal services, an auto repair facility, medical and dental offices and a business or two dedicated to making us look fit and wellgroomed. Surely those of us interested in reducing our respective carbon footprints and/or saving family income should consider making "Shop Eldorado first" a gasoline- and money-saving mantra.

The ECIA is doing its part to help its members cope with high gasoline prices. Check out www. eldoradocommunity.org for information on joining a carpool. It may take a price of \$5 or \$6 a gallon at the pump to get most of us to do it, but a system for forming carpools is there, ready to expand, for all of us who wish to make use of it.

In addition to making plans to rid ourselves of vehicles we know to be gas guzzlers, we should also urge our elected representatives to work toward providing Eldorado with more than the minimal public transportation it now has. With rail transportation coming to Santa Fe, with Santa Fe increasing its own bus services, it makes sense for Eldorado to have hourly bus service connecting with Santa Fe and the world beyond. We are too big a community to be neglected by transportation planners and providers at any level of government.
