Be an Energy Star

ARK YOUNG'S ARTICLE in the May Vistas concerning night sky protection was a welcome reminder of our neighborly responsibilities in sharing the night sky here in Eldorado. A number of issues concerning outdoor lighting are clearly delineated in our covenants, as Young's article indicated. However, if you actually do venture outside to take in the stars, you may sometimes wonder at the excessive lumens emanating from your neighbors' uncovered windows-or your own, for that matter. Big windows are a big deal here, whether for solar gain or vista apprecia-

tion. And while you may or may not feel that your interior lighting is anyone else's concern, perhaps you could consider your own comfort and your energy bill. Insulating window coverings will keep your home cooler in the summer and warmer in the winter. making you more comfortable and saving you money on heating and cooling. What's more, you can add some sparkle to the night.

S. WEISS RAISES A GOOD POINT. Residential windows here in Eldorado, especially large picture windows, can be a major contributor to light pollution. While interior home lighting is not covered under the covenants, there are some steps residents can take to help reduce the light that emanates from your home:

- 1. Turn off unused lights at night when possible.
- 2. Reduce the size of the light bulbs used in fixtures that are in front of large picture windows.
- 3. Replace or upgrade large lighting fixtures in front of picture windows with ones that use less-bright

bulbs and are more efficient overall.

4. Add insulating curtains to large picture windows, both to help with energy conservation and to reduce light pollution.

Plague Confirmed in Eldorado Pet

N MAY the New Mexico Department of Health's Scientific Laboratory confirmed plague in a cat from Eldorado. Reports of dead rabbits and rodents from the Eldorado area may also be due

Plague, a bacterial disease of rodents, is generally transmitted to humans through the bites of infected fleas, but can also be transmitted by direct contact with infected animals, including rodents, rabbits, and pets. According to Dr. Paul Ettestad, the Department's public health veterinarian, "Most pets infected with plague are hunters who have eaten an infected rodent or been bitten by their fleas prior to getting ill. The pets can also transport the fleas back into the home where they can infect people."

Symptoms of plague in humans include sudden onset of fever, chills, headache, and weakness. In most cases there is a painful swelling of the lymph node in the groin, armpit or neck area. Plague symptoms in cats and dogs are fever, lethargy, and loss of appetite. There may be a swelling in the lymph node under the jaw. With prompt diagnosis and appropriate antibiotic treatment, the fatality rate in people and pets can be greatly reduced.

To prevent plague:

- ▼ Avoid sick or dead rodents and rabbits, and their nests and burrows.
- ▼ Dispose of a dead wild animal by using a shovel to scoop it into double plastic bags; then seal it and throw it into trash; or bury the carcass where it will not be unearthed by pets or other animals.
- ▼ Treat pets regularly with an effective flea control product, and prevent them from roaming and
- ▼ Clean up areas near the house where rodents could live, such as woodpiles, brush piles, junk and abandoned vehicles.
- ▼ Take sick pets to be examined promptly by a veterinarian.
- ▼ See your doctor about any unexplained illness involving a sudden and severe fever.

Eldorado residents have always stepped forward in the past for our community, and the Board is asking you to get involved by volunteering for the Security Fair. ERA News

THE ELDORADO RESIDENTS' Association (ERA) added new members to their Board of Directors at the April 6 annual meeting, and in June, the Board elected new officers for the coming year. ERA's quarterly membership meeting will be held July 6 in the Community Center's Railroad Building at 7 pm.

John White joined the ERA Board and was chosen as the organization's secretary. Mary Anne Kenny, re-elected at the annual meeting, was named vice-president for 2009. The Board returned Marilyn Farrell to her post as treasurer. Bruce Blossman retired as president of the Board for health reasons, and the board voted to place Bill Dunning in the president's chair for the coming year. The ERA Board named Dolores Brock to head an ad hoc liaison committee to attend meetings of the EAWSD board.

The Board also agreed to enter a float in the ECIA's annual Fourth of July parade this month.

Neighborhood Watch, Tested and Working

Walker, chair of the ECIA Neighborhood Watch Committee, to ask about her startling success in recruiting block captains for this very effective crimefighting program. She now has 100 captains on her membership list. Each captain represents ten homes, which means a thousand people looking out for one another and reporting suspicious people and situations to law enforcement.

In a recent meeting, Marilyn briefed **Sheriff Solano** and his Chief of Detectives on the technology her committee has adopted for Neighborhood Watch. It includes the use of Google Earth, which permits block captains to see satellite photos of the homes in their group. It also includes email "bursts" in which block captains get timely information on crime incidents or suspicious activity in or around their neighborhoods.

It may be due to her very obvious, hard-working idealism, but Marilyn Walker will not be satisfied until there are block captains for every group of ten homes in Eldorado and there is no crime of any sort in our community. Her committee is a major portion of the way there.

I found out just how well Neighborhood Watch works when I interviewed Marilyn for this article. Just before I drove up to her house, I received a cell-phone call. I parked on the road a few yards from her mailbox to answer my phone. As I was talking on what was turning out to be a lengthy call, I saw Marilyn walking down her driveway and gesturing to me. As I ended my conversation and greeted her, she informed me that a member of her Neighborhood Watch group had just called her to report that "a man in a strange white car was parked on the road outside of her house and gesturing wildly as he spoke to someone on a cell phone." This experience convinced me how well Neighborhood Watch can work for all of us in Eldorado.

When I got the chance to interview Marilyn, she informed me of some statistics worth knowing with respect to law enforcement in our community.

- ▼ We have the lowest crime rate in Santa Fe County.
- ▼ The burglaries that do occur here are most often "crimes of opportunity." Too many of us leave doors to our homes and cars unlocked and garage doors open when they don't have to be and have valuable items in plain view.

Law enforcement officers from the Sheriff's Office and the State Police attend every Neighborhood Watch meeting. They have given members of the Neighborhood Watch Committee some valuable crime-fighting advice and information, including the following:

- Burglars are looking for an "easy mark." Don't become one. They scout our neighborhoods; they knock on doors and when nobody answers, they might kick them in. If strangers ring your doorbell, let them know you are home but don't open your door to them. Talk to them through the door and say something like, "I can't open the door; I'm giving my Rottweiler a bath.
- If you are away from home, your very best hope is a neighbor—one who looks out for you in a Neighborhood Watch group.

Sheriff's Substation in Eldorado?

N MAY 27, Commissioner Liz Stefanics held a town-hall meeting in Eldorado, as many of you know. Since I was unable to attend that evening, I sent Sergeant Joseph McLaughlin in my place. He reported to me that there was some discussion over an issue that crops up almost every year: the question of a Sheriff's Office Substation in Eldorado.

Many people who raise this issue seem to envision

deputies sitting in a substation building, waiting for the phone to ring and rushing out to their car to render help whenever someone calls. In my view, however, what we really need is for deputies to be patrolling the area, addressing speeding issues and making preventive rounds to deter burglaries, vandalism and other crimes. The deputies need to be a presence in the community, not sitting in a building waiting for the phone to ring.



At the Crossroads


PAD WORK should have been or is being performed as you read this article. As of the end of May, the County advised us that the start of repaving Avenida Vista Grande (funded through a bond issue passed in November 2008) was "imminent." It is expected that much of this work, particularly that part of the road closest to US 285, will take place in the evenings to minimize traffic delays.

Additionally, Verano Loop will receive a new chipseal surface. This project has been scheduled for this time because core samples taken by the County indicated that the underlying layer of base course was still intact but in danger of being lost if filling of pot holes were to continue. Because the existing chip-seal will be recycled (ground up and relaid), the project will cost less than it would with new base course. Verano Loop and Avenida Vista Grande are among the eight roads identified in the County's long-range planning as needing paving.

Finally, the County advised us that there was some base course material left over from the October 2008–January 2009 base course project funded by \$749,000

of legislative appropriations in 2007 and 2008. Since we received no new funding from the Legislature in 2009, we hope the County will spread the remaining material over those sections of road reported by our residents as "slip-sliders" when wet. If this happens, the worst portions of approximately 10 roads will benefit from receiving some of this material.

Say's Phoebe

Tyrant Flycatchers, a rather harsh-sounding name for this pleasant little bird. The SP is 7.5 inches long, has a wingspan of 13 inches, and is slender with a relatively small head. Its head, back, and upper breast are gray. The bill is small and pointed. Black coloration runs from bill to eye, the belly is a pale rufous color, and the tail is very dark to black. Males and females are similar.

This hardy bird spends its summers from central New Mexico through Alaska. Some individuals may winter in southern New Mexico, with others going to southern Mexico. They migrate at night! So far as is known, similar flycatcher species have distinctive wintering areas. According to the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, the SP breeds farther north than any other flycatcher, seemingly limited only by the lack of nest sites. It breeds north past the tree line, and may be

following the Alaska pipeline even farther north, nesting on the pipeline itself.

SPs lives in open woodlands, savannas and scrub areas. Mating display is not known. A small cup nest is built along a wall or building ledge and four or five eggs are laid. The female incubates the nest for 12 to 14 days. Young are fed insects by both parents and fledge in 14 to 16 days.

The SP is a flycatcher, and its food consists almost exclusively of insects, which are caught on the wing. Birds perch overlooking an open area and swoop out gracefully to pick off insects which they locate with their acute eyesight. Insects are generally swallowed whole, and the hard exoskeletons are regurgitated in a small dry pellet. These pellets help ornithologists identify a bird's particular diet.

Every year we do our best to increase the numbers of deputies on the streets. When I became sheriff in 2003, we had 69 deputies, including the sheriff and undersheriff. Today we have 80 deputies, and we have a pending federal grant that would add three more. The city annexation of land in the county, when complete, will allow 12 more deputies to be moved from the urban areas of the county to the more rural areas such as Eldorado.

Undersheriff Robert Garcia and I continue to work with ECIA, Eldorado Neighborhood Watch, and surrounding associations to ensure the safety and security of the area. In closing, I have to say your Neighborhood Watch and ECIA are the most active and enjoyable groups to work with in the whole 2,000 square miles of Santa Fe County, and we look forward to continuing to work together.
