Phishing

Phishing e-mail scams have been "professionalized" to become even more of a menace. The level of sophistication is unfathomable. Too many companies are making money collecting and selling your data. Such as Google, Facebook, LinkedIn, etc. whose business model is to sell ads. Thus, intrinsically linked to spying on your web surfing history, cookies from other entities, and various techniques to track you as you surf. It

does not take much for these entities to know who you bank with, what your insurance company is, what type of smartphone you have, etc.

Criminals with this data are now being supercharged because they already have a dossier on you. They bait you with something reactionary, such as a monthly subscription to Clash of Titans for \$49, or your account has been compromised. Naturally, you drop your guard; the e-mail, after all, has all the trappings of the company that you usually get messages from. So, you click that "login now" button. As soon as the crooks have your credentials, they not only steal things like card num-

bers, they change the password, your address, your secret questions, etc. All electronically and within minutes. You cannot log back into the real site of the company you do business with. You must call them – drop what you are doing to make that call right there and then!

So, how do you spot and combat these sophisticated new phishing schemes:

- Never click a link from a suspicious e-mail. Realize that these crooks are Americans right in the US making things look authentic.
- ▼ Go to your web browser and either click on a bookmark you set or type in the name of the company. Do not search for say, "First Security Bank" that link showing up could be compromised also.
 - ▼ On the e-mail, look at the "To:" field if it says "Undisclosed recipients" it is a sign this is not legitimate. Also, the "From:" field should have the name of the company. Do not trust if it says From "12019094AF@109483204.com" or look for "accounts@FirstSecurityBanc.com." Your eyes will not pick up that "c" in Banc.
 - ▼ Use a password wallet, such a mSecure, to create complex 30 character passwords and store the information.

▼ Get a highly secure e-mail such as @icloud.com or


- **@protonmail.com** and use only for sensitive companies you do business with, such as financial institutions. This way not everyone has your one e-mail.
- ▼ Clear your browser data daily and use multiple browsers.
- Sign up for one of the free Internet Security classes at the ECIA Community Center offered by Eldorado Classes & Lectures (www.eldoradocandl.com).

The Eldorado Farmer's Market Celebrates 11th Year

Susan Tarver, an Eldorado resident since 1998 and Executive Director of the Santa Fe-based food pantry Bienvenidos Outreach, Inc., started the Eldorado Farmers' Market just over a decade ago with three vendors. Today the Market boasts over thirty-five who bring their fresh, locally grown produce, dairy, meats, plants and other products every week to our community from late spring to mid-fall.

The Farmers' Market is conveniently located at La Tienda and is open every Friday from **3:30 pm** to **6:30 pm**, weather and wind permitting. The Market opened the first week of June to an enthusiastic crowd that arrived to enjoy the afternoon. The Market will continue until **October 12**.

Each week the ever-popular Farmers' Market Raffle provides customers a chance to win goods. For every \$5.00 spent with a vendor, the customer receives one raffle ticket (so don't forget to get them). At **6:00 pm**, the winning ticket is drawn, and the lucky person is called to pick up their winnings, which typically includes a fantastic array of produce, cheese, baked goods, plants, handmade crafts and soaps provided by the vendors, plus a \$5.00 coupon to spend at the Market. All tickets collected during the season are entered into the Final Drawing on the Market's last

day. That prize contains everything from Market goods to items such as Amex gift cards and hotel/restaurant/store vouchers.

Ms. Tarver proudly stated, "The Eldorado Farmers' Market is fortunate and honored to have so many great vendors from Dixon, Taos, Alcalde, Espanola, Las Vegas, Moriarty, Macintosh and other areas in New Mexico. They love Eldorado and its residents! Most drive up to two hours to get here, then go home only to rise as early as 3 am to make their Saturday markets in Santa Fe, Albuquerque and elsewhere."

In appreciation of the vendors and their families, each year Bienvenidos Outreach Inc. hosts a dinner for them at La Plancha Restaurant, also at La Tienda.

Stall fees, as well as proceeds from the Market's hot dog stand and contributions by generous customers go toward healthy breakfast foods and snacks for children in the Smart Breakfasts = Smart Kids Program. The Farmers' Market also serves as a dropoff point for donations of clothing, housewares, books, and nonperishable foods contributed by residents toward Bienvenidos Outreach 's mission to help those in need. Library News and Events

Did you know your local library is unique? Vista Grande Public Library is an independent nonprofit, and not a branch of the Santa Public Library system, or a county entity. A library committee of Eldorado residents, as well as neighbors from other communities, formed in 1996 and was able to persuade the New Mexico State Legislature to approve funds, under the control of Santa Fe County, to establish a 1600-square-foot library. Ground was broken in April 2000, and the new facility opened its doors a year later. A nonprofit group, with a Board of Directors from the community, was created to operate the library.

The original collection came from donated materials, and that continues to be where a good portion of the library's items originate. Santa Fe County has an agreement to provide maintenance and specific services for the building, while the Library Board oversees operations, fundraising, and staffing. More than sixty percent of the budget comes from community donations, and the library still relies heavily on volunteers to do everything from sitting on the board to running the circulation desk, to manning fundraising events and so, so much more. So, Vista Grande truly is your community library!

The Negative Consequences of Mowing

oncerns about wildfire or aesthetics tempt some Eldorado residents to mow their yards. While mowing in some places may be necessary, or considered an improvement in a yard's appearance, in our high-desert environment mowing is unnecessary and has many negative consequences. Mowing causes severe degradation of your land, especially during hot and dry periods, as it causes further desiccation of the soil and may cause irreparable harm to plant life. Our native soils are highly erodible, and mowing removes the vegetation which helps control erosion during the monsoons. Eliminating ground cover offers a foothold for invasive weeds, which flourish in disturbed areas and will outcompete native plants. Mowing destroys the delicate cryptobiotic soil crust (which helps prevent erosion, and increases water infiltration and soil fertility), and causes soil compaction, which will inhibit the regrowth of native vegetation. Bare soil and sparse vegetation conditions are attractive to burrowing rodents which, although native, are not usually a welcome presence. A mowed yard can be an eyesore and can decrease the value of your property and its "curb appeal" if you are trying to sell it. For those who are mowing from concerns about fire danger, note that running a mower over dry vegetation might cause a fire if the blades strike a rock. One of many things that make Eldorado special is that we share the habitat with so many species of wildlife. To ensure that the birds, mammals, reptiles, and insect pollinators we enjoy seeing continue to have a home here, it is important to retain the native vegetation in its natural state. The basic elements essential to wildlife which a healthy habitat provides are food, water, cover, and places to raise their young. Mowing eliminates these essentials, creating a biological desert. Let's make sure that all the wild creatures which grace our properties continue to have a place to raise their families too. If you feel the area immediately around your house should be managed, you can concentrate your selective mowing or weed-whacking there. Try to leave native flowers and grass seed heads uncut. Wildlife depends on the cover and the seed. A "native" yard still benefits from stewardship, to remove weeds, help it recover from past overgrazing, and create resilience in the face of climate change, but it works best with a light touch.


The Eldorado Snake Relocation Volunteers

he Eldorado Snake Relocation Volunteers (ESRV) is the safest and fastest resource for snake relocation. ESRV efforts help support the New Mexico Wildlife Center—your donation (in any amount) will benefit wildlife. ESRV routinely relocates non-venomous bullsnakes and western coachwhips (red racers). ESRV has safely relocated venomous prairie rattlesnakes and western diamondback rattlesnakes.

- Rattlesnakes are approximately 20% of relocation calls—most residents prefer to keep non-venomous snakes.
- ▼ Other non-venomous relocations: western hognose, Arizona glossy, terrestrial garter and Texas night snakes. Non-venomous snakes are critical to rodent control in Eldorado. They are ambitious and passionate in their pursuits.
- ▼With our mild winter, this will be a very busy year for snakes. Snakes seek out food, water, and shelter.
- ▼Snakes can be easily coaxed off roads and from around homes with brooms—or a long pole or stick. Snakes are defenseless on roads. Thank you for driving carefully.
- ▼ ESRV maintains a waiting list for bullsnake adoptions. Prospective locations must be snake-friendly which includes locations away from traffic and dangerous companion animals. Compatibility with neighboring residents is critical. Contact Lyn deMartin: 505 603-0250.

Wildlife Habitat and Chipmunks

FLORA AND FAUNA

hy is it so important to preserve wildlife habitat? Aside from the beauty of our natural environment, maintaining native plants allows the ecosystem to sustain itself and support the wildlife we all enjoy. Many environmental disasters and loss of species can be prevented by understanding our ecology and working in harmony with it.

We can coexist with and support our beautiful environment by maintaining wildlife habitat-friendly residences with attractive natural landscaping. Areas immediately around homes can be maintained with exclusion in mind (avoiding dense shrubbery and temptations like bird food that attract rodents) while the balance of the property can be dedicated to wildlife habitat. Understanding the community's indigenous wildlife and other species is key: The more we know, the more adaptable we can be while enjoying the special privilege of living among a wonderful mix of native plants and wildlife. Our residency here is, after all, transitory; the original indigenous species will remain!

The National Wildlife Federation offers homeowners a certified wildlife habitat designation. Some Eldorado homes proudly display the NWF certification, which requires important elements: Food, water, cover, places to raise young, and sustainable practices. For more details, please visit https://www.nwf.org/certify.

The easiest way to meet these requirements is to make as few changes as possible to the natural environment – replicating conditions before humans arrived. We can further offset our impact by adding certain key elements such as sustainable water, water-wise gardening and nurturing native plants – excellent sources of food and shelter. We can also avoid doing harm by honoring existing species' populations, avoiding ALL pesticides, herbicides, and other environmental toxins, and by not trans-



forming terrain. Mowing, for example, when done down to the ground, virtually eliminates any wildlife habitat – and creates conditions similar to the historic dust bowl tragedy.

We've seen quite a few squirrels here – small Spotted Ground Squirrels with their flat tails and small ears (often mistaken for prairie dogs) and the larger Rock Squirrels with bushy tails and large, upright ears. But we've never seen a chipmunk in Eldorado, have you?

There are several species of chipmunks in NM; the ones most likely to be found in our area are the Least Chipmunk (*Tamias minimus*, which is the smallest) and the Gray Collared Chipmunk (*Tamias cinereicollis*). They range in size from 6-9 inches total and have grey to reddish-brown fur on their sides with several dark stripes on top separated by white. Their faces have dark and white strips, and their tails are bushy.

Chipmunks – known in Native American mythology for failing to think before they speak! – live in burrows and are active during the day. Quick runners, they are generally solitary except during courtship and when rearing their young (typically 4-7 young, born in the spring). They eat seeds, berries, nuts, fruits, and insects. They do not go into a true hibernation during winter but enter torpor for long periods of time, waking to feed on food stored in the burrow. Common predators include hawks, owls, and weasels.

Please watch for wildlife when driving – in Eldorado, on 285, and I-25, especially at dawn and dusk. There have been car crashes on I-25 near the Eldorado exit, involving a variety of wildlife! Natural Cleaning Hacks to Replace Harmful Chemicals

any cleaning products are harmful to your health and the planet – So, why not make your own, all-natural, non-toxic cleaners? They are also better for the environment, consume less packaging, and are easier to store at home.

- ▼Grout Cleaner #1: Mix equal parts borax and baking soda with water to form a paste and scrub grout.
- ▼Grout Cleaner #2: Mix ½ cup baking soda with ¼ cup hydrogen peroxide in a squeeze-top bottle, add 1 teaspoon of liquid dish soap, shake and apply.
- Sink Scrub: Mix equal parts water and baking soda to form a paste and scrub sinks.
- ▼Remove oil stains from carpet with baking soda: Scrape off excess oil, sprinkle baking soda, let 15 minutes and vacuum.
- ▼Natural Air Freshener: Mix 15-20 drops essential oil with 1 teaspoon baking soda and 2 cups water. Pour in a spray bottle.

- ▼All-Purpose Cleaner: Mix ½ cup vinegar, ½ cup water, fill with citrus peels, infuse for two weeks. Pour in a spray bottle.
- ▼Garbage Disposal Cleaner: Mix 1part baking soda, 2 parts vinegar, rinse with warm water, run citrus peels.
- ▼Clean Glass: 1 part hydrogen peroxide with 2 parts water. Spray and wipe clean.
- ▼Sponge Sanitizer: Soak sponge for 10 minutes in 1part warm water and 1 part hydrogen peroxide.
- Shower Curtain Cleaner: Machine wash shower curtains with a bath towel, detergent and one capful of hydrogen peroxide.
- ▼Clean Your Coffee Pot: Swirl equal parts water and sea salt around in a coffee pot to clean stubborn stains.
- ▼Cutting Boards: Pour salt and use a halved lemon to scrub wooden cutting boards and surfaces.
- ▼Clean Tub Ring: Pour salt and use a halved grapefruit to scrub the bathtub ring.
