
Based on feedback from the community, this year's organizers have made some changes to the events that should please attendees. ## Mission

The mission of Vistas, the monthly newsletter of the ECIA, is to inform the Eldorado community about issues before the ECIA Board and the membership at large. By so doing, the publication seeks to foster increased neighborhood pride and community participation in the decision making process.

## Visiting RV Courtesy

s Santa Fe is a major summer tourist destination, Eldorado residents are frequently visited by family and friends who arrive in their RVs and end up parking in Eldorado driveways and on our residential lots. When this happens, we often hear from neighbors who are concerned that their nextdoor neighbor has purchased an RV and has not submitted a screening plan for it.

The ECIA Convenants in Article II, Section 13, address the issue of visiting RVs as follows:

Section 13. Storage and Screening of Vehicles and their Accessories. (a) Recreational vehicles, such as motor homes, RVs, campers, camper shells, vehicle accessories, trailers, horse trailers, airplanes, boats and the like, when stored on a lot shall be located so as to minimize their visual impact on the surrounding neighborhood and roads, and shall be obscured by screening in a reasonable manner, for example by the dwelling house and/or with plantings or fencing. No more than three such vehicles shall be stored outside on any lot at any time. No more than one additional vehicle shall be parked temporarily on a lot for a period not to exceed three weeks. This paragraph shall be applicable to recreational vehicle accessories, such as camper shells and the like.

In other words, we allow for visiting RVs to be on a lot for a period not to exceed three weeks, after which time it could be considered a violation of the covenants. Because three weeks can be a long time for a neighbor to have to look at an unscreened RV owned by a non-resident, we ask that residents notify their neighbors, as well as the ECIA, when a visiting RV is going to be on their lot. This notification should include the anticipated dates of arrival and departure of the RV, as well as where it will be parked on the lot. This small gesture is likely to result in much happier neighbors and will help eliminate extra work for the ECIA staff, as we will know what RVs are owned by visitors. ## Reporting a Road Problem or Concern

r f rain, wind, or other weather events create a problem on the road you live on, or if you notice a pothole has popped up or a stop sign is down or missing, you can report it directly to the County's Public Works Division. Here's how.

Because of the safety hazard that is created when a stop sign is down or missing, the County asks that you report the problem by calling the County Public Works Department at 992-3010. For any other problem with the road system, including road maintenance requests, you can use the online reporting system, "Report a Road Concern," available on the Santa Fe County website at http://www.santafecountynm. gov/public works/road\_concern.

Residents can type in the name of the county road or use the interactive map to select the area where the problem exists. The system requires a login consisting of an e-mail address and a password. Once you have submitted a request, you can view the status of your request, see if anyone else has submitted a similar request, or see if there are any other requests in your area. Your ECIA Road Committee members can also track all reported problems in Eldorado.

he Board of Directors has moved a step closer to filling the vacant position of general manager for the Association. As of the application deadline on July 23, around 20 individuals and a management company had expressed interest in the position. A committee of six ECIA members has reviewed all the applications and has forwarded a list of semiinalists to the Board. We are currently in the process of contacting these applicants and setting up interviews.

While it would be impractical for us to arrange meetings between the successful candidates and the ECIA membership at large, we do encourage members to contact us with specific issues we might address during the interviews. You can e-mail your suggestions

to the office at marilyn@eldoradosf.org or stop by with a written note. We will keep the community informed about the hiring process with updates on our website.

The Board has also scheduled a Town Forum for Monday, September 8, from 7 to 9 PM. Topics for this event will be security patrols and greenbelt trail improvement. At that time, we also hope to be able to provide additional details about the hiring process for the general manager.

## Recent Board Actions

The ECIA Board held its regular meeting on June 19, 2014, with all seven Board members present: Dag Ryen (President), Pam Henline (Vice President), Greg Colello, Gershon Siegel (Secretary), Todd Handy (Treasurer), Jeanne Calzada, and David Yard. The following formal actions were taken unanimously, without the Chair voting:

- President Ryen announced that the ECIA is conducting an active search for a new general manager, with applications due by July 23.
- ▼ A variance was approved for 2 Demora Court to build an addition inside the required 50-foot roadside setback.
- ▼ A variance was approved for 9 Toreno Court to allow an existing large accessory structure to remain more than 15 feet from the house.

- A variance was approved for 12 Balde Road for an 8-foot-tall fence to screen an RV where 6 feet is the Guideline height.
- ▼ Security cameras and alarms were approved for the Community Center.
- ▼ Juliet White was appointed to the Information Committee.
- ▼ Betty White and Carol Lachman were appointed as members, and Jeanne Crawford as alternate, to the Election Committee.
- ▼ Dag Ryen, Pam Henline, and Todd Handy were authorized as check signers for the primary checking account and for the principal brokerage ac-
- ▼ The Association's debit card was changed to a credit card.
- ▼ An ad hoc working committee on Information Technology was established.
- The ECIA Employee Manual and Confidentiality Statement were approved for posting, with a signed copy of the Confidentiality Statement to be placed in each employee's file.
- Funds not to exceed \$4000 were moved from the Replacement Reserve to the 2014 maintenance budget to replace the heater for the Kiddy Pool.
- Director Colello proposed that the County's ballot scanning equipment be borrowed for use in future ECIA elections.

Regular Board meetings are scheduled on the third Thursday of each month at 7 PM at the Community Center and are open to the public. An open forum, community announcements, and reports from ECIA committees are normally included. Since then, the Association has come a long way, both in membership (over 200 at this point) as well as in its expanded purpose. Upcoming monthly meetings will focus on how to move the EACA forward on a variety of fronts.

The August 28 meeting is titled "Suggestion Box," and presenters will be reporting on topics covered at the August Board Meeting regarding the evolution of the tour as well as the implementation of developing opportunities.

Members will be invited to participate in an open forum, to express what they would like to see happening with EACA from social as well as business-building aspects. The intent of this upcoming series of meeting presentations is to develop avenues for members and EACA itself to grow professionally as well as creatively.

Every year EACA donates funds raised from the Studio Tour to various Eldorado-based non-profit organizations. ## Eldorado/285 Recycles

B ig improvements are underway at the recycling area of the Eldorado Transfer Station. The area is being reconfigured to eliminate steps and make depositing materials much easier.

While the work is being done, the recycling bins will be moved just east of the main building where trash is deposited, near the metals recycling area. When entering the facility, drivers will make the complete loop. The project will be finished in about two months.

Eldorado/285 Recycles has been encouraging many of these changes and is delighted that the County is moving forward with them.

Here are some reminders about basic court etiquette that will help ensure that everyone gets a chance to enjoy the courts.

- Be respectful of all players. Do not disturb those on the court with loud conversation or erratic movement outside the fence.
- If you are playing singles and there are players waiting, you should relinquish the court after an hour of play.
- 3. If you are playing doubles and there are players waiting, you should relinquish the court after an hour and a half of play.
- 4. When you are finished playing, gather your belongings quickly and let any waiting players take the court.
- 5. Do not litter the court surface. Pick up any trash, ball can lids, bottle caps, or even snapped screen ties that are lying around. If you are supervising children, do not let them throw rocks or gravel onto the courts.

Other rules for the safe enjoyment of the courts are posted on the fence. Following these simple guidelines will help provide the maximum benefit to all tennis players in the Eldorado community.

## Sphinx Moths and Lizards

#### **SPHINX MOTH**

he first time I saw a Sphinx Moth, taking nectar by hovering from flower to flower in the early evening, I thought it was a beautiful but strange hummingbird. In fact, the Sphinx Moth is also called "hummingbird moth."

There are more than 100 species of Sphinx Moths in North America; we in Eldorado are likely to see the White-Lined Sphinx, Hyles lineata. Colorfully patterned in brown, tan, pink, white, and black, their wings (2.5 to 3.5 inch wingspan!) beat rapidly. Their amazing proboscis is rolled up when flying, and bent (into a right angle!) when obtaining nectar. In some species, the developing moth's proboscis is so long that the pupa has a sheath curving from the head away from the body and back; in Canada and Europe, members of this family are known as "hawk moths." The moths lack hearing organs, however, so they will not be able to hear your sounds of admiration at their beauty.

There are two or more generations of these moths each year. The Sphinx Moth caterpillar is bright green, with two lengthwise wide rows of pale spots bordered by black lines, three yellow lines, an orange or yellow rear horn, and a yellow head.

#### **LIZARDS**

While admiring the moths, I noticed lizards doing what looked like push-ups on the garden wall. What is with these little athletes?

New Mexico has several lizard species; the three most likely to be seen in Eldorado are the Sagebrush Lizard; the Desert Whiptail Lizard/New Mexico Whiptail, and the Horned Toad (actually a lizard in the Iguana family).

It turns out that what I saw were male Sagebrush Lizards. They are territorial and will attempt to scare off other males by using intimidating techniques such as head bobbing and their daunting push-up display. Sagebrush Lizards are striped brown and gray.

Males (those doing the push-ups) have blue bellies and blue on their throats. These lizards eat insects, including the Sphinx Moth.

The desert Whiptail Lizard, New Mexico's State Lizard, utilizes reproductive parthenogenesis (in which eggs develop without being fertilized). This allows the resulting female-only population to reproduce; yet, the females continue to engage in mating behavior with other females of its own species. Whiptails have long thin tails—hence their name.

Our Horned Toads dig into sand late in the day and then crawl out in the morning to soak up the sun. Although they are well camouflaged, hawks-one of their primary predators—can spot them from high up. People like to capture Horned Toads and keep them as pets, but please don't do so; it reduces our native population and the animals die in captivity.

**SUMMER REMINDER!** Hailstorms can strike at any time of year, of course, but can be especially damaging to summer growth. If possible, move your plants to safety or cover them when the sky is darkening to the point that you think it might hail.

f you're wondering why you've got a mosquito problem here in the middle of the high desert, it's a good idea to look around your property for places where water can pool. Mosquitos need water to breed. Likely places are leaky rooftop swamp coolers, unscreened water barrels, unmaintained fishponds, or other water features, as well as unused equipment of various sorts being stored on your property. With

monsoon season finally here, rainwater can accumulate and provide mosquitos and other bugs a place to breed. Mosquitos can carry serious disease such as West Nile Virus, in addition to ruining your wellplanned garden party. Do what you can to minimize this pest.




## The Stables Congratulates Our Very Own Santa Fe Rodeo Royalty
