EFRS Improves Its Community Insurance Rating

In December 2012, the El Dorado Fire and Rescue Service (EFRS) underwent a review of its operations by the Insurance Service Organization (ISO). ISO evaluates communities throughout the United States using a standardized fire suppression rating schedule. Although fire departments, including EFRS, provide a wide variety of public safety services in their home communities, the ISO rating schedule looks only at the suppression of structure fires. Nonetheless, the ISO rating is indicative of a fire department's staffing, equipment, training, and a host of other factors related to service delivery.

ISO evaluates more than 48,000 fire protection areas in the U.S. and assigns each a public protection classification (PPC) on a scale of 1 (best) through 10. This PPC is used by many insurance companies for underwriting and setting premiums for homeowners and commercial fire insurance. Statistical data bears out a strong relationship between fire losses and fire protection as measured by the PPC.

ISO evaluates a community's fire protection based on three criteria:

- ▼ Receiving and handling emergency (9-1-1) calls = 10% of total score
- ▼ Water supply, including availability and storage, hydrants and hydrant maintenance = 40%
- ▼ Fire department, including equipment, distribution of fire stations, apparatus, staffing and training of personnel = 50%

The El Dorado Fire District was last evaluated in 2005 and received a PPC rating of 4 from ISO. EFRS was one of only two volunteer fire departments in New Mexico with that rating. The results of the 2012 evaluation have been returned, and EFRS has improved to a PPC rating of 3. EFRS is the highest ISO-rated volunteer fire department in New Mexico and the only one in the state with a PPC rating of 3.

We are justifiably proud of our new rating but recognize it is a team effort. The Eldorado area is also served by a regional crew from the Santa Fe County Fire Department and receives mutual aid from neighboring fire agencies in the eastern region of the county. These agencies and their emergency response in our district are factored into the EFRS ISO rating. The Santa Fe 9-1-1 Center scored well in the evaluation, as did the Eldorado Area Water and Sanitation District's water system. The support of the Eldorado community allowed us to supplement our training and equipment budget, which was very helpful in our evaluation, as was the role of EFRS volunteers who contributed thousands of hours in training and call response to their community. We are grateful to all who helped us achieve this success.

Finally, it might be worth a call to your insurance agent to see if an improved ISO rating will lower your annual fire insurance premiums. In some cases, it just might.

Mountain Biking in the Preserve

In their meeting of July 18, the Eldorado Community Improvement Association Board approved mountain biking on all trails in the Eldorado Wilderness Preserve, with the exception of two trail segments where bikes and horses are not recommended. This action changes the previous policy that restricted use of mountain bikes to a single isolated trail in the southeastern corner of the Preserve.

The ECIA Conservation Committee recommended the change after determining that riding mountain bikes on preserve trails is consistent with the community's management mission of providing recreational opportunities while protecting the natural resources of the Preserve. Trail 102 to Bishop's

Peak and the Spur Trail off 101 to Vista Grande Peak are still not approved for mountain bike or equestrian use due to their extremely steep and rocky terrain.

All users are asked to obey the rules of usage for the Preserve. This includes staying on the designated trails, keeping dogs on lead or under voice control, and being courteous to others. Cyclists should yield to hikers, with both yielding to equestrians. New signage is being developed for the trailheads to provide clear rules of usage. This language will also be included in the new trail map and brochure currently in development.

Recent Board Actions

he ECIA Board held its regular meeting on July 18, with Board members present: Dag Ryen (Vice President and Chair), Nolan Zisman (Secretary), Todd Handy (Treasurer), Pam Henline, and Jan Pietrzak. The following formal actions were taken unanimously, without the Chair voting, unless otherwise noted:

- ▼ Vice President Ryen announced the resignation of President Jean Calzada for personal reasons. Two vacant positions now exist on the Board.
- ▼ A variance was approved at 1 Conchas Court for a ground-based solar array to be located 105 feet from the dwelling, where 15 feet is the Guideline distance, to best use existing vegetation and site characteristics to obscure visibility of the array.
- ▼ A variance was approved at 47 Encantado Road to allow an existing garage to encroach 6 feet into the required 50-foot road setback because of prior approvals.
- ▼ A variance was approved at 2 Conchas Place for an existing small green outbuilding to remain approximately 100 feet from the dwelling, where 15 feet is the Guideline distance, to use existing vegetation for screening.
- ▼ A variance was approved at 6 Descanso Road for a fence existing for 19 years to encroach 2.5 feet into the required 20-foot side setback.
- ▼ A variance was approved at 7 Estambre Road for a small accessory building 19 feet from the house, where the Guideline distance is 15 feet, to allow better screening.
- ▼ A variance was approved at 13 Jornada Loop to allow an existing garden wall to encroach 4 inches

- into the required 20-foot side setback, and for a new portal exceeding the 20% facade length in a different architectural style.
- ▼ A variance was approved at 1 Ensenada Drive to allow a booster pump station to be built by EAWSD on a private lot with an 8-foot-tall chainlink fence (most to include latillas), where height and material do not comply with Guidelines, and with a construction time longer than 120 days, to allow for permitting and construction delays.
- \$1,470 was moved from the 2018 Replacement Reserve to the 2013 Reserve Maintenance budget to replace the Kiddie Pool filter.
- ▼ \$26,719 was moved from the Replacement Reserve to the 2013 Operating Budget for additional maintenance on the multi-use path network.
- ▼ Bicycles will be allowed on all designated trails in the Eldorado Preserve, except for the part of Trail 101 leading to the summit of Bishop's Peak and a short side trail leading to Vista Grande Peak, reiterating that bicyclists must yield to pedestrians, and both yield to equestrians.
- The Treasurer was authorized to negotiate a oneyear extension to the existing bookkeeping contract.
- ▼ A variance was approved at 24 Encantado Road for an 8-foot screening fence, to be reduced to 6 feet when the property is sold, 4-1 (Pietrzak dissenting).
- ▼ The cutoff time for amplified music at the Community Center was extended to 9 PM, 3-0-1 (Handy abstaining).

On October 2, from 7until 9 PM, the ECIA Board will hold a town forum at La Tienda Performance Space. This will be an opportunity for residents and Board members to exchange ideas about issues facing us in the months ahead.

Lot owners and residents in the western part of Eldorado may be interested in attending a meeting on September 26 that is being organized by the Santa Fe County Public Works Department to discuss the planned paving of Herrada Road. County officials will provide information on design, construction logistics, and safety concerns relating to the project.

As the days grow cooler, the pool will be closing, and once again ECIA will hold a Dog Pool Party where Eldorado residents can bring their four-legged canine friends for a refreshing dip. Final information about this event will be posted on our marquees and website (eldoradosf.org).

By the time this issue of *Vistas* is sent out, we hope to enter into a new agreement with the county regarding our multi-use trails. Months of research, analysis, and negotiations have gone into this effort to establish a framework for future cooperation with the county on these amenities that lie in the county rightof-way.

Finally, although details have not yet been finalized, in October the ECIA Board will hold a public meeting on next year's Board elections. This important election will once again give the Eldorado Community Improvement Association an elected Board of Directors with staggered terms to ensure continuity. Check our website for updates.

Please remember that school is in session once again and that your youngest residents will be making their way to school in the early morning and late afternoon hours. Drive carefully and observe the posted speed limits.



2014 Budget Work in September

Eldorado's Vibrant Economy

or many years, Eldorado was considered a "bedroom community" of Santa Fe, with most residents dependent on the city for their employment and shopping facilities. This is changing with significant employment within the Greater Eldorado area and increasing shopping facilities/professional services provided locally. Our area has long been considered the largest unincorporated community in the state, particularly after Edgewood incorporated a few years ago. Population-wise, we rival Socorro, Taos, and several other incorporated communities around the state. The U.S. Census Bureau recognized this when, in 2010, they designated the Greater Eldorado Area as a "CDP-Census Designated Place" with a population of 6,130 people, separate from the rest of Santa Fe County. Several rural communities between Glorieta and Galisteo now also utilize Eldorado for shopping and professional services.

Major business and employment sources include:

- ▼ The Agora: 18 shopping and professional services
- ▼ La Tienda: 19 shops and offices
- ▼ Office condos: 16 businesses
- ▼ ECIA employment: varies with the season
- ▼ El Dorado Community School: educational, administrative, and custodial employees
- ▼ Arts & Crafts Association (one of largest in state): about 200 members, many of whom sell art in Eldorado on a part-time basis
- ▼ Adam Senior Center: several County employees
- Vista Grande Public Library: both paid and volunteer
- ▼ Avenida Vista Grande/Avenida de Compadres complex: three businesses
- ▼ Highway 285 area: six businesses
- ▼ First National Bank

- ▼ Santa Fe County Road Department, Refuse Transfer Station, and County Fire Department employees
- ▼ Business office of Santa Fe Sun monthly publica-

Most of these businesses employ some Eldorado residents.

A major "shadow" economy also exists in the Eldorado community, composed of an unknown number of home-based businesses, both part-time and full-time. Many operate via computer. Probably only a fraction have submitted the "In-Home Profession Application" that ECIA requires within the Eldorado at Santa Fe subdivision. The business owner may also be required to apply to the State Taxation and Revenue Department for a CRS (Combined Reporting System) number. The Santa Fe County Treasurer also requires a Commercial Business License for businesses within the county. Failure to obtain required registration could result in fines.

Santa Fe County recognizes the need to provide for additional services in the greater Eldorado area to match its growth. They currently have work underway to expand the Senior Center, the Community Library, and an adjacent new Community Center for county residents. There is also a strong need for expanded road improvement and law enforcement presence. The county taxes generated by our local businesses, as well as personal property taxes, go far toward funding these services.

Greater Eldorado is rapidly becoming a self-sufficient community. In the medical field alone, we currently have a doctor, dentist, audiologist, pharmacist, and two veterinary offices. However, we still have to utilize Santa Fe for additional medical care, including medical specialists and hospital care.

Looking for a Mate

ver the course of the next month or so, if you are outdoors and notice a seemingly undulating ground, don't call the emergency numbers: it's the time for "migrating" male tarantulas in search of a mate. From what I have gathered, this occurs more often in the western part of Eldorado.

Generally, folks encounter wandering tarantulas at different times of the year, but late summer seems to be peak season for us. That said, in desert areas, the mating season is not as clear, and it may depend entirely on rainfall, particularly after the monsoons. Migrating (or wandering) tarantulas are usually mature males searching for the burrows of mature females. Immature and female tarantulas tend to stay in their burrows unless flooded, starved, or driven out by an invader (e.g., Pepsis wasps, rodents, etc.). Tarantula males (not unlike some human males) have no interest other than finding a female. And, let's be clear, they are "one-night-standers," having no inclination to be homebodies.

When a male tarantula molts for the final time, he matures, and will usually be darker in color (often black), depending on species. Males also are usually longer and slimmer than females and have much smaller abdomens on average.

Contrary to common lore, tarantulas are harmless to humans and most pets (e.g., dogs and cats). Their venom is of no medical significance, and no one has ever died from such a bite, which people often compare to a bee sting; ill-effects are usually limited to mild to moderate pain and slight swelling at the site of the bite. However, tarantula hairs can be problematic. If they get stuck in your skin, use tweezers to extract them and then apply a steroidal cream. If inhaled, get thee to an ER immediately.

Most species are nocturnal. If one shows up in or around your house, it is just because he is trying to hide out during the day to return to his search at night (or maybe you have female tarantulas living around your house).

If you do not feel comfortable having tarantulas around, please gently chase the spider into a jar with

a paintbrush or other long object with a soft end, and deposit it as far away as you feel comfortable. Remember, these animals are completely beneficial to humans, feeding on cockroaches, crickets, scorpions, and likely mice and other rodents.

If you'd like additional information on tarantulas, please email me and I'll be glad to share information with you, or check out the American Tarantula Society's website, from which I got much of this information.

On a sadder note, we know of at least two incidents where domestic cats have been preyed upon by Great Horned Owls. Unfortunately, the owners assumed that the pets were safe within the garden walls. Small pets are not safe, even in an unroofed enclosure. Bobcats, coyotes, raptors, and mountain lions all are highly flexible and can jump and/or climb in those spaces. Three years ago, a Northern Harrier (fairly big raptor) swooped into my back walled garden, perched on my Buddha and proceeded to tear apart a mouse, all the while staring at me.

The report from our Snake Rescue and Relocation group has triumphs and tragedies: eight snakes (four bull, two each red racers and prairie rattlers) were caught and relocated. Tom Wyant told me he was called by a local agency to relocate three snakes they had captured. Sadly, the agency used the wrong tool (tongs), which seriously injured all; two died shortly after Tom picked them up, and one is left so battered that it can't survive in the wild. If someone would like to adopt a small bull snake, please let Tom know (ettravel@q.com).

Lastly, keep your gardening gloves in a resealable baggie to prevent unwanted inhabitants from taking refuge. The dark, close space is a favorite of spiders (brown recluse, black widows) and mice. It is no fun pulling on your glove only to feel a "squish."
