Fire Department Annual Open House & Barbeque

I Dorado Fire & Rescue Service is holding its Annual Open House and Barbeque on Sunday,

September 17, from noon until 4 PM. The event will be held at the ECIA Community Center. All members of the Eldorado area community are invited to attend.

The El Dorado Fire Brigade was started in 1976, when there were fewer than 400 houses in the area. Its first home was in a barn near the Eldorado Clubhouse. El Dorado was soon designated an official fire district of Santa Fe County, and subsequently became known as El Dorado Fire & Rescue Service. As the Eldorado area community has grown over the years, so has El Dorado Fire & Rescue Service (EFRS).

The 100% volunteer organization has come a long way since those early days by virtue of the hard work of many and strong community support. EFRS strives to engage with the community through outreach and educational activities, and refresh their roster with continuous new member recruitment. The department also invests heavily in time and funding for training certifications in both fire protection and medical care, with the goal of enhanced safety, effectiveness, and response times for emergency services. All community residents are encouraged to join the group.

The Annual Open House and Barbeque is a thankyou to the community as well as an educational event.

All of the Service's emergency vehicles will be on display for inspection, and department members will be on hand to meet and talk with attendees throughout the event. Smokey will be there too. There will be demonstrations, activities for the kids, and live music through the afternoon. And, of course, there will be plenty of great food!

The El Dorado Fire and Rescue Service looks forward to seeing all of you at this traditional community gathering!


David McDonald, New Board Director

White Roofing Requires ECIA Approval

f you've read the Eldorado Covenants, you know that Article II, Section 5 of the Eldorado Covenants prohibits roofs with "highly reflective or glare producing materials." However, because there are new energy-efficient, but reflective white roof coatings on the market, the ECIA Board approved an update to the newly revised Eldorado Guidelines that addresses the use of such materials. Section 6.2.4.1 is detailed as follows:

6.2.4.1. White roofing products shall require completion and submission of the Architecture Plan form to the ECIA for review. The ECIA will then schedule a time to come meet with the homeowner on their lot to determine if the horizontal surfaces of the roof will be visible to any neighbors. If there is no visibility, the application will be approved with the stipulation that on any vertical surfaces of the roof such as the

inside of the parapets and the canales the tan version of the product or paint that matches the home's stucco color shall be used. When using any bright white roofing product for a roof repair it shall only be used where it is not visible to your neighbors. The tan color of the product shall be used on any vertical surfaces, parapets or canales.

Should you want to apply a white silicone or other reflective roofing project, the Guidelines require that you come to the ECIA, complete the necessary paperwork, and receive the ECIA's approval before any roof work is done. Stable Amenity is Open to the Community

arn owners would like to remind everyone that the stable, although the only user-fee amenity in Eldorado, is open to residents. Eldoradoans are welcome to walk around and see the equines, which range from a donkey to a draft horse. Horse owners love to talk about their animals, so feel free to ask questions. If you want compost for your garden, drive in and take manure. And don't forget our annual Community Day, which features free pony rides. This year it will be held on October 22.

Over 60 of your neighbors use the stable on a daily basis at least twice a day. Unlike the seasonal amenities, we are open 24/7, 365 days a year. After purchasing a barn—and there are currently four barns for sale—barn owners pay the annual fees for water use, manure removal, fly predators, property taxes, liability and barn insurance, and maintaining barns to ECIA standards. Any Eldorado resident can buy a barn or find a space to share and enjoy owning a horse.

Like all amenities, the stable adds to the property value of our homes. Eldorado is a popular place to live because we welcome the diverse interests of the community, from horses to tennis to swimming.

Please know that your dues support the common areas of the stable, such as the arena and road maintenance. In 2016, the office reports that \$28,540 went to support the stable amenity from dues. There are 2,776 lots in Eldorado. That is only \$10.28 a year per lot. Compare that to the pool, which is not only seasonal but limited to just over a 100-person capacity when it is open. Your annual cost to maintain it is \$115,345, and that does not include replacing failed equipment. The hike/bike trails cost around \$50,000 per year to cover the maintenance costs of one-third of the amenity.

We hope you visit soon and enjoy an amenity that celebrates the horse, the spirit of the West.

Message from the Board Treasurer

s a new Board member and newly elected treasurer, I want to give you all a little of my ▲ background. My wife, **DiAna**, and I have lived in this community for over 35 years. We have raised two daughters here, both of whom attended El Dorado Elementary School. When we moved here, there were about 250 homes and the only paved road was the first entrance into Eldorado.

I have retired after 40 years in government service, over 30 years with the State of New Mexico and 10 years with Santa Fe County. All of my work experience has been involved with finance, general administration, and project development.

As the new treasurer, I'd like to offer a brief idea of the community's finances. Our annual budget usually ranges in between 1.2 and 1.3 million dollars a year. Included in those numbers are funds to maintain community amenities and sustain the annual general operation of ECIA. Among the major items included in the current budget year 2017 are (1) the hike/bike trail repair and maintenance; (2) new decking for the pool; and (3) repair and fencing at the dog park.

Preparation of the 2018 annual budget has officially started, beginning with the general manager receiving input from ECIA staff and committees. When the this information is in hand, the GM works with the treasurer on a first draft of the budget. The Finance Committee then reviews the draft budget and then holds a public review of the draft budget. After this, the budget goes to the Board for a final review. One last public hearing on the budget is held in early December; and the final budget is adopted in late December.

There is one more area of the budget that I want to highlight: the Replacement and Reserve process. ECIA has a schedule of all items that need to be replaced over the next 30 years. During the budget process, we try to include all the funds needed for the scheduled replacements of that budget year. ECIA also tries to keep a reserve in place to fund the next five years' worth of replacements. This is a very sound financial practice that ECIA executes annually.

Overall I look forward to working with the Board and the community on all the planned and unplanned financial challenges that will arise during my term on the Board. -Joseph Gutierrez, ECIA Treasurer

Recent Board Actions Motion passed to approve and appoint Pool Ad-Hoc Committee and members Dave Borton, Jean Crawford, Mary Ellen Donat, Joe Oser, and Mike Schneider.

Motions passed to appoint Nolan Zisman as a new member of the Facilities and Grounds Committee and to appoint Dag Ryen as a new member of the Information Committee.

Motion passed to approve Stable User Fee Collection Policy; Director Henline voted no.

Motion passed to approve six-month Equine Burial Moratorium within the Eldorado Stable Amenity and on Eldorado common properties. See the October Vistas and eldoradosf.org for more on this.

Motion passed to approve the Environmental Engineer Service Agreement with Souder, Miller & Associates for \$5,415.62 to conduct site visits and preliminary screening to determine a process for collecting and disposing of horse stable waste to minimize or eliminate contact with water for the purpose of protecting surface and groundwater.

The next meeting of the ECIA Board of Directors will be a Working session on September 20, at 6 PM, in the Community Center Classroom. On September 25, at 7 PM, the Board will hold its regular meeting in the Railroad Room at the Community Center.

Regular Board meetings are held on the fourth Monday of each month at the Community Center and are open to the public.

¶he ECIA Board of Directors met on August 21, 2017. Members present were President John Henriksen, Vice-President Antone Forneris, Treasurer Joseph Gutierrez, Secretary Michael McDowell, and Directors Pam Henline, David Mc-Donald, and Jody Price. The following formal actions passed unanimously unless stated otherwise:

Motion passed to reconfirm Board approval of AFJ Custom Paving Contract # 8369, with ECIA addendum, for a total of \$99,410 plus tax for repairs and maintenance of hike/bike trails along Avenida Vista Grande and Avenida Eldorado.

Motion passed to approve the format of the ECIA 2018 Assessment Letter.

Motion passed to approve and appoint Dog Park Ad-Hoc Committee and members H. Marie Aragon, Bob Christie, and Bob Johnson.





You Found What Where?

Due to our allergies, our sweet dog, Tanner, sleeps in the laundry room next to the master bedroom, with a baby gate separating the rooms. Recently, Tanner became quite upset—as he is with thunderstorms—when he entered the laundry room at bedtime. Concerned, we consulted a behaviorist, but that didn't work. We couldn't figure it out.


Then we heard an unusual noise in the clothes dryer. We turned on the dryer and watched the outside dryer vent and . . . a mouse ran out! The vent and chimney cleaning service we hired found nesting material and big holes in the inside ducts. After making repairs, the technician advised that we likely had a dead mouse inside the dryer, so we called an appliance service. Yes, there was a dead mouse inside the machine's parts. There was also a live bull snake inside!


We released the snake into the yard (happy to have it going after rodents, but outside, please). The technician said that just the week before, he removed a rattlesnake from another dryer.

We installed a new, more secure, vent cover, then found that further repairs were needed for the inside duct work. Altogether, we spent \$500 repairing faulty materials uncovered (and partially damaged) by mice—discovered thanks to our dog!

We are not alone in finding wildlife in odd places. Where mice go, snakes tend to follow. Consider:

▼ Barbecues. Mice can nest there, especially during winter. Keep the barbecue lid open when not in use.





- Under car hoods. Mice love to nest under the car hood. Dave at Eldorado Automotive reports mice and woodrat damage can be significant. Keep your hood open if you park outside. We have also heard of snakes—and rabbits!—getting under car hoods.
- **▼** *Bird feeders and wood piles* attract mice, so be sure to keep them a good distance from structures.

Our favorite story occurred with visitors from the East Coast. They said they'd seen a "huge 30-foot-long black snake" along the roadside. Skeptical, we asked them to take photos . . . and had a great laugh when we realized it was a construction erosion control "boom snake." Our friends were not entirely convinced. They haven't been back for another visit.

Eldorado Relocation Snake Volunteers recently relocated Western diamondback rattlesnakes from residences in the Art Barns community, Las Campanas, and Lamy. The snakes are likely traveling up the Rio Grande drainages seeking cooler temperatures, due to climate change. It's reasonable to assume that Eldorado may be visited by Western diamondbacks, a new experience for our area. No reason for panic, though, as even encounters with prairie rattlesnakes are rare.

Some people love snakes. Some find them deeply frightening. We say, let us be grateful for the snakes, bobcats, coyotes, and raptors who do their best to keep our rodent population in check.

Recycling Know-How: Light Bulbs

here are many kinds of light bulbs these days, and it's not always clear how to dispose of them. Here are some recycling tips.

Reduce: Buy only low-wattage LED (light-emitting diode) bulbs. Light bulbs last for many years, prices are coming down, so lifetime energy and cost savings are enormous!

Recycle: Fluorescent tubes and CFLs (compact fluorescent lights) contain toxic mercury and should be dropped off at the ECC or BuRRT. CFLs, but not fluorescent tubes, are also accepted at Lowe's and Home Depot. There are no programs available to recycle in-

candescent light bulbs, so you will need to put them in the trash. You might consider wrapping the light bulb in something so any broken glass cannot rip through the bag and injure sanitation workers. As tempting as it may seem, do not place incandescent, halogen or LED light bulbs in your glass-recycling bin. The glass in the bulb has a different melting temperature than the glass in jars or bottles. A single light bulb can ruin a whole batch of perfectly recyclable glass.

Update: EAWSD's Well 19 Project

ince acquiring the water utility in 2004, each successive Eldorado Area Water and Sanitation District (EAWSD) board has addressed a list of continuous upgrades and improvements. These projects are undertaken in order to maintain a safe and reliable service to its customers. Except for rare wet years when the Lamy well recharges, the water supplied by EAWSD comes from groundwater wells.

As these wells are pumped over the years, they begin to "play out" and new wells must be added to the system. The latest of these is Well 19, planned to be dug at the south end of Torreon where it intersects Carissa inside La Paz. The need for this well was first identified in EAWSD's 2013 Utility Master Plan and Preliminary Engineering Report.

According to Steve King, EAWSD's project manager, "The Well 19 project, when completed, will provide a much needed additional source of water supply as required to meet our peak summer demands." Its location was selected as one with the potential for developing a well of significant capacity (greater than 100 gallons per minute of production).

Levels of the element antimony were detected in Well 19 at somewhat above water-quality standards. Design modifications were made to provide blending into the system. This was determined to be the most

cost effective and reliable means of ensuring a safe and fully compliant water supply.

The modified Well 19 design was completed in late 2016, at which point EAWSD had invested approximately \$600,000 into the project. The job was sent out for bid in early 2017, the lowest responsive one coming in at just over \$1 million. The award of that bid was contingent on receipt of a county permit to allow the project construction to move forward.

In the meantime, however, the county adopted a Sustainable Land Development Code (SLDC), and its requirements now impinge on Well 19's current location. In order to build the well in this location, originally sanctioned by the county before adopting SLDC, EAWSD must now obtain a series of variances. Appeals by the utility for those variances have been rejected, and the project is now stalled.

Said King, "EAWSD, its consultant, and attorney are now considering options, including appeal to the Board of County Commissioners as provided for in the SLDC. The board and its staff remain optimistic that outstanding issues can be resolved to allow this critical project to move forward." EAWSD's appeal is likely to be taken up by the County Board at its September meeting.

rivately nestled between piñons and lilacs behind the ECIA Community Center, a brand new stone labyrinth sits waiting for residents to walk its winding path and experience its peaceful possibilities.

My idea of building a new labyrinth for ECIA was initiated soon after my wife, Lisa, and I moved to Eldorado in 2015. We discovered "the ruins" of an abandoned labyrinth located behind the swimming pool. A faded sign indicated that it had been an Eagle Scout project from back in 2011. I contacted the local Boy Scout troop, and eventually the Eagle Scout himself, and learned that there was no plan to revive that labyrinth. I initially thought of just rebuilding it in the same place, but I preferred a more private location. I eventually got the scout's permission to "recycle" the rocks into a new, relocated labyrinth.

Lisa and I scouted out the grounds of the Community Center area for possible locations of a new labyrinth. Once we had some options, I pitched my idea to the ECIA Facilities and Grounds Committee and received overwhelming support, which led to the approval of the project by the ECIA Board. Then, with the help of ECIA Maintenance Supervisor Mike Armijo, Lisa, our dog Abbey, and a friend John Shields, we completed the project within just a few weeks—all thanks to the prompt funding support by ECIA General Manager Isabel Ugarte.



The purpose of the labyrinth is very broad, but generally it is to provide a peaceful place for walking meditation. It is loosely designed in the shape of a peace symbol. You can't get lost on a labyrinth, as the path always winds you into the center, where you can pause, receive insights into your life, then return on the same path back into your daily life, hopefully renewed and refreshed.

We hope you enjoy this special space and that it becomes a new private place for many of you!
