Significant Year

s this is the last issue of Eldorado Vistas of 2012, I want to reflect on some of the important activities that the ECIA undertook this past year.

ELDORADO

At the beginning of the year, the ECIA took a significant step in financial stability by implementing the "Securing the Future" budget program. The budget was built using an estimating tool that tracks the life cycle of the Association's amenities and its capital items that are replaced from time to time.

The plan calls for increasing homeowner assessments gradually, starting in 2012 and continuing each biennium for approximately 10 years. In this way, it is estimated that by 2020 the ECIA will achieve a sustainable reserve for the indefinite future, assuming that no additional amenities are added. In 2013, the Board will again rely on our excellent Finance Committee to develop a budget that will include an assessment increase, about \$37 per year, for the 2014-2015 budget biennium.

Also in 2012, the ECIA embarked on an experiment to determine the best way to improve some of the older hike/bike trails that the community built years ago under inadequate standards. This is a work in progress, and the ECIA will be seeking community comment. These trails are among our most valued amenities, along with the Eldorado Vistas, the greenbelts, and the Wilderness Preserve, according to a survey that was conducted this past year.

One of the most exciting events of the year was the Fourth of July Celebration, which coincided with Eldorado's 40th Anniversary as a homeowner subdivision. The event was one of the largest ever at the Community Center.

The Conservation Committee conducted a wildfire assessment of the community, including the Community Center property, the stables, and some greenbelt areas. Among the recommendations were that residents should cut combustible plants and material from around their homes, expand the goat grazing in more areas, clear beetle-killed trees in some

areas, and clear brush from around fire hydrants so that firefighters can locate them more easily.

The Conservation Committee and two Eagle Scout candidates from Troop 414, Jim Rose and Matt Rohr, blazed a new trail in the Eldorado Preserve. Trail 105 is a moderately level trail that skirts the Los Vaqueros neighborhood. Over the years, signage and trail repair work has been undertaken, and it is a delight to explore the Preserve on well-marked and wellmaintained trails.

A review of the year past would be incomplete without noting the reconstruction of the El Dorado Community School. Kudos to the project managers and the school district for completing the work on time, and for the free entertainment we experienced as we watched the construction while driving by.

Finally, I want to thank all of the many residents who participated in the community dialogue about allowing residents to keep hens. From the beginning, I felt it was a valid question to be put to the community, and the outcome was a 55-to-45 margin against allowing chickens as pets. Although the vote did not change the covenant, we learned a lot about our com-

I wish all Eldorado residents a happy holiday season, and many blessings in the coming year.

Website Usage Statistics



Some of the most popular destinations on the site are the covenants, by-laws, architectural guidelines,



Recent Board Actions

The ECIA Board held its regular meeting on October 15, with Board members Ed Moreno (President), Pat Lavengood (Secretary), Paul Jacobs, Jan Deligans, and Jeanne Calzada present, along with 43 residents. The following formal actions were taken unanimously, unless otherwise noted:

- ▼ Director **Jeanne Calzada** was elected Board Vice President.
- ▼ Director **Nolan Zisman** was elected Board Secretary, replacing retiring Pat Lavengood.
- **▼ Cheryl Ford-Mente** was appointed to the Information Committee.
- A variance was granted for 22 Caliente Road for a small accessory building to be unscreened, with conditions, because its color and texture matched the house.
- ▼ A variance was granted for 63 Camerada Loop for a greenhouse small accessory building 77 feet from the house, where Guidelines require 15 feet or less, because of site conditions.
- ▼ A variance was granted for 10 Fonda Court for a ground-based solar array 17 feet 3 inches from the house, where Guidelines require 15 feet or less,

with screening conditions, to allow proper solar exposure.

- A variance was granted for 1 Encantado Circle for a screening fence 11 feet from the property line, where a 20-foot setback is required, to provide screening for a utility trailer, with stipulations.
- A variance was approved for 69 Condesa Road for two existing driveway monuments constructed within the required 50-foot front setback.
- A Home Business was approved for 5 Demora Road for a dog care business, with stipulations.
- ▼ The motion adopted at the July 19 meeting that temporarily suspended enforcement of poultry restrictions (Article II, Section 11 of the Protective Covenants) was rescinded (3-2, Deligans and Jacobs against).

Regular Board meetings are scheduled on the third Thursday of each month at 7 PM at the Community Center and are open to the public. An open forum, community announcements, and reports from ECIA committees are normally included. Rooftop Equipment and Ductwork

ue in part to the failure of older Entran II heating systems in homes in Eldorado, this past year we have seen a number of residents switch over to rooftop-based heating and cooling systems. While such rooftop systems are not prohibited in the Eldorado Covenants or Guidelines, residents are required to at least paint these systems, and associated ductwork, to match the adjacent walls of the home, unless it can be proved that it would interfere with their operation. This requirement is detailed in the Eldorado Guidelines for Protective Covenants and Building Restrictions for Eldorado at Santa Fe under Section 6:

LIMITATIONS ON PERMITTED DESIGN FEATURES:

While certain design features may be desirable, their incorporation into a structure may be disruptive to adjacent property owners. Accordingly:

Flagpoles shall be no higher than the Santa Fe County height restriction of 20

Unless it can be demonstrated that it will interfere with operation, visible roof top equipment such as swamp coolers and the like shall be painted to match adjacent walls (or pitched roof if applicable). Covers shall match the adjacent

In addition, should residents need to install such a rooftop heating and cooling system, we encourage them to consider the impact of the system on their neighbors' views and ask that such systems be designed to be as low profile and non-obtrusive as feasible.

Lastly, in keeping with the guidelines for these rooftop systems, any covers used on visible rooftop equipment (or swamp coolers) are required to match the color of the home stucco as closely as possible.



Emergency Planning for Your Family

s I sit here writing, I am thinking about the devastation that nature brought to the east coast with Superstorm Sandy. Here in New Mexico, many people are looking out their windows at our beautiful blue skies and expressing gratitude. Although we may not be in the path of a devastating hurricane or need worry about floodwaters, we do have our own potential disasters to think about.

In the coming months we could suffer severely cold temperatures or a record-breaking snowstorm. Two winters ago some Eldorado residents experienced their water pipes freezing, causing their homes to flood from within. Four years ago we had people stranded for up to three days because of severe snow.

ARE YOU PREPARED?

There are lots of websites and government organizations that tell us what to have ready for a disaster. They invariably include three days' worth of water and food, medications, important papers, and similar recommendations. A quick Internet search will lead you to the standard recommendations.

I would like to share some of the measures I have taken to prepare for an emergency. These may sound like simple common sense, but many people still don't take such basic precautions as these: Get to know your neighbors. Too many Eldoradoans have no idea who their neighbors are or how to get in touch with them in an emergency. People are our biggest resource and source of support.

Have cash on hand. I keep \$300 available, because if there is no power or employees can't get to work, the cash from the bank will not be available.

Make sure you have half a tank of gas in your car. Just fill up at half a tank; don't wait until you're empty.

Keep extra clothing, a sleeping bag, food, and water in your vehicle in case you get stranded, either off the road in a storm or on the highway because of a road closure.

Have an extra cooking and heating source at home, such as a fireplace and a propane camping stove.

Make sure your vehicle's tires are good and will get you through the snow. Many people with summer tires on their cars get stuck in the winter here.

Get creative, think about the unthinkable, research emergency planning websites, talk to your neighbors, and have a plan.

It is your health and safety—you are responsible for it. No one else is. Take a few precautions and be prepared. You won't regret it. Be smart, be safe.

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH FLORA AND FAUNA WORKING GROUP Time To Talk Turkey about Birds

lthough it's the holiday season and our thoughts about birds may turn to the edible kind, the topic of discussion is migratory birds, not our favorite food of the month.

It goes without saying that Eldorado is generally considered rural. While we have many resident creatures living in and around us, we also benefit and enjoy many species of migratory birds. Sadly, some number of our avian friends meet with minor and major hazards, careening into our windows, being hit by cars. Many of us, instinctually, try to nurse injured birds back to health, sometimes deciding that the birds are better off kept in captivity, as pets. Who would have guessed that the United States enacted the Migratory Bird Act in 1918, a federal law, governing the protection of migratory birds.

The statute makes it unlawful to pursue, hunt, take, capture, kill, or sell birds listed as native to North America (excluding pigeons, European starlings, and English house sparrows). The statute does not discriminate between live or dead birds and also grants full protection to any bird parts, including feathers (except among registered and recognized Native Americans), eggs, and nests. Over 800 species are currently on the list. There are specific regulations pertaining to native North American raptors, and depending on the species of bird, one or more federal permits must be obtained. These include our resident red-tailed hawk, peregrine falcons, and the bald eagle.

Recently, the Santa Fe New Mexican published an article about the Santa Fe Raptor Care Center. The Center is located within a few minutes' drive from

his attractive small sparrow is around Eldorado mostly during the summer and fall. I spotted two under my sunflower seed feeder on September 30, 2012. The CS is about 5.25 inches long, with a wingspan of just over 8 inches and a slender profile. The head has a bright rufous cap (less colorful in fall and winter), white on the head, and a black eye line going from bill to the back of the head and a white whisker mark and white on the throat. The bill is small and pointed; the under-belly is light gray with no marks. The back is strongly streaked brown with black, and there are two white wing bars. Songs are about 3.6 seconds long, consisting of around 55 nearly identical chip notes in a row. This little bird winters mostly in Baja California, northern Mexico, and Florida. During this time they can join small flocks of other sparrows.

Eldorado on Jacinto Road. The Center rescues, rehabilitates, and releases birds and is not exclusively limited to raptors. Injured birds are brought from as far away as Ruidoso and receive professional care. The veterinary surgeon is the best in the Southwest. Currently, they have two eagles, an eaglet, a screech owl, a kestrel, and a kite. The Center has plenty of volunteer opportunities and needs support. Founder and director Lori Paras has offered to bring birds to small gatherings or to make them available for photographers and artists for a contribution to the Center. I encourage all who are interested and/or curious to visit www.santaferaptorcenter.org. Once on the site, click on Current News. The pictures and briefs will warm your feathers. There is terrific information about handling injured and baby birds. As with snakes, it's a good way to get educated about how to handle these situations.

Not much is written about courting behavior, but pairs are usually monogamous. The male watches and protects(!) as the female builds a flimsy cup nest in a tree four to ten feet above the ground. Two to five eggs hatch in 11 to 14 days. By 10 days, the helpless young are developed enough to leave the nest. The female does most of the work during brooding. Males occasionally feed the female or young. Food consists of grasses, seeds, and forbs. CSs forage on the ground around feeders, open lots, and woodlands. During summer months insects are a large part of their diet. They can subsist on seeds without drinking for up to three weeks if absolutely necessary (a good adaptation for parts of New Mexico).

The oldest known CS was 11 years 10 months old. CS populations are doing well, especially as they thrive near humans in suburbs and parks.
