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Eldorado 30th Anniversary Studio Tour: Sept. 23-25

A CREATIVE COMMUNITY OPENS ITS STUDIOS FOR VISITORS.

he community of Eldorado is home to an abundance of artists and fine crafts people. One weekend a year the Eldorado Arts and Crafts Association (EACA) hosts a Studio Tour, and our roads bloom with flags and directional signs and banners. You can select the artists you are most interested in, find them on the map provided, and see them in their own studios. Being able to meet the artist in person, in their creative "natural habitat" adds a special dimension to collecting art.

Our first tour was in 1992 with 25 artists. This will be our 30th tour, with 83 artists showing in 62 studios. Historically we have had the tour in May; however, due to Covid we have shifted to the fall for 2021 and 2022. The Eldorado tour has

become a destination event, and many of our out-of-town visitors tell us that they plan their vacations to Santa Fe to coincide with our event.

Artists of every medium participate in the Studio Tour. We have

painters and photographers, jewelry and fabrics, sculptural and ceramics, glass and metal, recycled and outdoor art, and other categories. There is no jurying process; any member of the association who lives in Eldorado can be in the Tour. The variety and quality of our creations is truly inspiring.

As the September weekend date approaches, you will see our catalogs around town with photos of each artist's work. An online version will be available at **eldoradoarts.org**.

On Friday, **Sept. 23**, our Preview Gallery will be open from **5–7 PM** and from **9 AM–5 PM** during the weekend. Located at the Eldorado Community Center, 1 La Hacienda Loop, the gallery features one or more works by each artist. This helps you

select which studios you want to visit. Items in the gallery are available for sale. Catalogs which include a map to the studios are also available. Studios are open **Sept. 24–25** from **10 AM–5 PM**.

You need not go hungry during the weekend. The two shopping centers at the entrance to Eldorado, the Agora and La Tienda, offer coffee shops, cafés, sandwich shops, food trucks, and fine dining. Brooks' grocery store provides quick grab-and-go options. Café Fina, located at the #285 exit of highway #25 on Old Las Vegas Highway offers a leisurely lunch.

The community of Eldorado has always been supportive of the tour, and the EACA reciprocates. By the end of the tour each artist is invited to contribute 5% of their sales (up to a limit of \$75) to the EACA which uses that money to support various community activities. In past years we have contributed to

the Library, the Fire Department, the Senior Center, the art programs at the school and Eldorado/285 Recycles. Over the years we have given back to our community more than \$30,000.

Board Actions and Summary August 16

THE ECIA BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING was called to order at 5:32 PM, board met in person and held via Zoom and recorded.

Roll Call: President Carol Sanguinetti, Treasurer Joseph Gutierrez, Secretary Jonathan McLaughlin, and Directors Jonathan Turkle and Mary Bonilla were present. A quorum was met. Excused: Vice President Amelia Adair, and Director James Herbert Williams. HOAMCO staff: General Manager Julie Navarro, Communications Coordinator Rhonda Pierce, Executive Assistant Ciara Walsh, via Zoom, Operations Manager Mike Rogers, Architecture and Compliance Coordinator Mark Young, HOAMCO–Albuquerque office Nigel Burgess.

Treasurer Gutierrez reported: as of **July 31**, ECIA has spent 53% of the budget and is 5% under budget on expenditures. The collections rate for 2022 dues has been exceptional, with less than \$10,000 outstanding which equals .0006%.

Treasurer Gutierrez, County Report: Infrastructure/Capital requests have been submitted. ECIA submits the capital requests to the county which then submits to the state. The legislators meet in January to vote on disbursements. Still waiting to be contacted for a meeting on the Azul project.

GM Navarro: We are getting quotes for the new phone system. The phones were down for two weeks in July. Will move to a VOIP system which will save money. Twelve liens were released from previous years. Total AR, which includes all outstanding dues from previous years is \$21,000 which is down from \$200,000 four years ago. Nine lifeguards have left to go to college. ECIA will help with scheduling to keep the pool open for as long as possible. Two new lifeguards have been certified. We will have to minimize hours if anything changes.

OM Rogers: Disc Golf course T-boxes are all in place. Graffiti and tagging in the box culverts at the arroyos into Gallinas park continues. It is vulgar, near a park and visible to residents. Maintenance will repaint, the county does not have the time or manpower. The cost of the paint is \$500.00 for each occurrence.

MOTIONS:

- Director Turkle—Moved to accept the emailed resignation of Sue Will from the Conservation Committee effective Aug. 1, 2022. Secretary McLaughlin seconded, all in favor.
- President Sanguinetti—Moved to approve the appointment of Naima Shea and Ben Greenberg to the Safety Education Task Force. Director Bonilla seconded, all in favor.
- Treasurer Gutierrez—Moved to accept Fernando Robles as a member of the Finance committee. Director Bonilla seconded, all in favor.

- Treasurer Gutierrez—Moved to table the Entrance Gate project under Capital, which was expected to be completed this year and use those funds to cover excess funds for the Compadres Park shade structure. Director Turkle seconded, all in favor.
- Director Turkle—Moved to accept the updated recommendation of the Conservation Committee to adopt the Preserve Policy based on their review of the Membership comments.

 Treasurer Gutierrez seconded, all in favor.
- Treasurer Gutierrez—Moved to approve the ECIA phone system replacement this year, which was originally scheduled for replacement in 2023. The cost will be about \$15,000 and will be funded from the reserve account. Secretary McLaughlin seconded, all in favor.

The General Manager's Report can be found on the ECIA website under Contact > Management and then scroll down. Committee and Task Group Reports can be found under the Board and Committees tab.

President Sanguinetti gave an update from the website task force: Need to have a login private section. Director Turkle gave an update on the GIS project. Debra Denker gave an update from the Safety Education Task Group.

The following Architecture Committee variance requests were presented to the Board:

- 1 Caliente Pl.—to allow water cisterns to be painted and not screened. This variance request was denied due to a lack of a screening plan.
- 3 Aula Ct.—to allow for one of the two water cisterns to remain on the lot without additional screening. This variance request was denied. The Board recommends they keep the second cistern and provide a different screening plan.
- 13 Ladera Rd.—to allow for a new small accessory structure
 to be located 40 ft. from the dwelling home. Architectural
 Committee recommended approval as no removal of trees
 were needed and will provide total screening to neighbors.
 Approved with the stipulation the structure is painted to match
 the existing dwelling and the roof color meets the guidelines.

Time was allocated for Old Business, New Business and Open Forum.

President Sanguinetti asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting, Director Bonilla moved, Director McLaughlin seconded, all in favor. The meeting was adjourned at 8:05 PM.

The next Board Meeting will be held via Zoom for residents and in-person and Zoom for Board members on Tuesday, Sept. 20 at 5:30 PM.

Covenants and Guidelines—Understanding the Process

ldorado is a covenant-controlled community, and ECIA encourages compliance with the Covenants by all property owners. Dedicated resident volunteers over many years drafted and regularly revised the Architectural Guidelines which are posted on the website at eldoradosf.org under the Governing Documents tab. The Board approved the Guidelines "for the express purposes of protecting the natural beauty and environment of the community of Eldorado at Santa Fe, providing an attractive rural setting for residential neighborhoods and home sites and preserving property values... to maintain the unique natural character of the community for all who acquire property therein, while encouraging individual expression consistent with the historical traditions of the region." (page 1, 2017-Guidelines-for-Protective-Covenants-Board-Approved-FINAL.pdf (eldoradosf.org).

The Covenants, Bylaws and New Mexico statutes give the Board the authority to pass and enforce rules, policies and guidelines consistent with our governing documents. The Guidelines are intended to provide clarity on the Covenants to maintain consistent application and enforcement of the Covenants and treat all residents with fairness. All permanently built items in Eldorado on the outside of the home, such as sheds, fences, solar panels, awnings, cisterns, pergolas, walls etc. must be installed with Architectural Committee approval, and according to the Guidelines and Covenants.

VIOLATIONS OF THE COVENANTS AND GUIDELINES

Violations are a complaint-driven process and action is taken based on what the Covenants and Guidelines allow. The ECIA office staff receive daily calls and/or emails from residents asking for checks regarding compliance issues, most of which are uncovered RVs, but also include weeds, and trash cans being left out longer than 24 hours, etc. When a complaint is received, the Architecture and Covenant Compliance Coordinator (ACCC) must complete a site visit to verify if the complaint is valid or not. If there is a noncompliance issue found, a letter is sent to the resident stating the violation, and the related Guideline/Covenant statute and asks for compliance. The ACCC does daily site visits within the community to follow up on complaints made by residents as well as following up on architectural projects to ensure they are being done as per the approved plans.

ENFORCEMENT OF THE GUIDELINES

The Architectural Guidelines are enforced as Covenants. Written in 1972 and last amended in 1977 the Covenants are broader in nature whereas the Guidelines lay out further specifics on the Covenants. When the Covenants were written, they could not foresee changes in architectural needs such as solar arrays, short-term rentals (Airbnb), and environmental concerns that would need to be addressed in our current day. In order for the Covenants to be changed it would require a 50 percent vote +1 by the membership of Eldorado, which would be almost impossible to accomplish

with the current size of the community. Without the ability to change the Covenants and in order for Eldorado to progress, the Architectural Committee uses the Architectural Guidelines which are reviewed for updates in an open and transparent public process every 3–5 years.

UPDATING THE GUIDELINES

For the past three years, the Architectural Committee and ACCC have been working on Guideline revisions, but due to Covid, have chosen to wait for in-person meetings for resident input. Organizational meetings for the Architectural Committee will begin in September to lay out the process, timeline and to go through the recommendations. In addition, two public, town-hall style meetings will be scheduled for resident input on the proposed rules. The committee will then create a draft of the changes that will go to the board for a vote. After the board votes on the proposed rules, the changes are sent for legal review after which the Board will vote to adopt the new Guidelines. This is a 4–6 month process and residents should know that the Architectural Committee is sensitive to the changing environment and has been working on Guideline changes that reflect these needs.

OUR CHANGING ENVIRONMENT

Page 3 of The Guidelines for Protective Covenants and Building Restrictions, states "in an attempt to lessen the impact of any home construction project on our local, as well as the global environments, ECIA encourages all residents to utilize green building practices whenever possible". This includes the support of water conservation with the use of cisterns and rain barrels, the planting of Xeric plant and tree species, and not allowing lawns over 1000 sq. ft., pools or large spas. Conservation efforts must meet the Architectural Guidelines and Protective Covenants to ensure consistency and fairness to all residents of Eldorado.

Eagle Scout Award Presented to Eldorado Scouts

our boys from Eldorado at Santa Fe—Samuel Verschoor, Ryan Cordova, Sean Kieling and Aaron Kieling—have earned the Boy Scouts of America's highest advancement award, the Eagle Scout Award, and were recognized in a ceremony on **Aug. 12**. Members of Troop #57 and Troop #414, these boys are of only approximately four percent of all Boy Scouts who attain the Eagle rank. Each candidate must earn 21 merit badges and successfully complete a community service project to earn his Eagle.

Samuel Verschoor's Eagle Scout project benefited the Eldorado Arts and Crafts Association, (EACA), with his construction of a Raku Ceramics Kiln, complete with all the supplies and hardware required to fire Raku pottery. This kiln is free for community use. The EACA is already planning Raku community workshops for the near future.

Ryan Cordova's Eagle Scout project benefited the Friends of Pecos National Historical Park and everyone who visits. He refurbished a monument site dedicated to the volunteer soldiers from New Mexico, Colorado and Texas. He led other scouts to fortify the monument with decorative rock and improved drainage while removing a dilapidated fence.

Sean Kieling's Eagle Scout project benefited the Santa Fe Parks Division with Little Libraries at Ragle Park and Monica Lucero Park. The Little Libraries are full of books for all ages, and they have been replenished by Sean and others in the community.



ell, after nearly a year and a half Eldorado is getting a Disc Golf course. Yes Eldoradoans, you are getting a 9-hole Disc Golf course which will open to play in early September. We are the lucky recipients of a new resident, Larry LaSota, and his course designing skills. Larry and his wife Elaine recently moved here from Kauai, where Larry designed the course that was just named the third best course in Hawaii by UDisc. The Facilities and Grounds Committee sponsored the Capitol Project Request for the course in 2021 and it was approved by the Board for this year. The course wraps around the Community Center, starting by the Dog Park and ending behind the pool. The "holes" will range from 250' to 309', with many trees to play through and around. The course will be perfect for beginners to experts, so bring the whole family!

What Can I Do About All the Weeds?

hat is a weed? Basically, it is any annual or perennial plant growing where we don't want it; weeds really are in the eye of the beholder. It appears that many Eldorado residents think of our native Tree Cholla as a weed with irritating glochids. But to others among us, the cholla is a beautiful rose-like shrub with magenta flowers. In fact, it is a significant part of the natural landscape that the Eldorado covenants seek to preserve.

There are some weeds that everyone may agree upon: tumbleweeds; goat heads; alfalfa; and mustard. I prefer to add

broom snakeweed and false tarragon to this list. The really bad nuisance weeds are the ones that we don't grow in our yards, but they blow in carrying seeds from neighboring lands. And these weeds are aggressive, they out compete our native grasses and wildflowers for scant resources.

Frequently, many Eldoradoans turn to mowing and trimming. They believe that these activities are effective in removing the pesky weeds and the fire hazard that develops when they dry up. But why do we have to mow and trim repeatedly? It is because these beliefs are not true. We are not removing the weeds by mowing and trimming; just lowering their height. And the fire hazard is not removed unless we remove the fire hazard; not leaving the dry clippings on the ground. The chopped-up weed bits deposit seeds waiting for rain to sprout, they provide mulch for weed seedlings to survive, and they create and preserve a weed carpet, not a lawn, devoid of grasses and wildflowers.

The best way to remove weeds and the resulting fire hazard is to weed them out by hand. Learn to identify weeds as seedlings and remove them before they set their seeds. After just a few years, your property can return to a natural landscape. This method is time-consuming, and it can cost a lot to hire someone to do it for you. But the reward is a permanent weed-free property that supports wildlife and provides beauty with prairie zinnias, penstemon, and blanket flowers.

The Night Skies Above Eldorado: September 2022

he summer constellations have shifted into the western half of the evening sky, while fainter autumn stars rise in the east. But, while dimmer, the autumn constellations have their share of interesting objects, for those with the patience to search for them.

As darkness descends, binoculars or a small telescope will help you view the Andromeda Galaxy, which looks like

a fuzzy oval in the ENE sky. Not far away from the Andromeda Galaxy is the Double Cluster in Perseus, a gorgeous pair of open star clusters that appear to touch, but are actually distant from and unrelated to one another.

By the end of the month, the Pleiades star cluster rises a mere 45 minutes after dark, heralding the

brighter constellations that will dominate Eldorado's long winter nights.

Jupiter is well-positioned this month, rising in the east around sunset. At opposition on the 26th, Jupiter is at its

closest this month, appearing at its brightest and offering a larger than average image in telescopes.

The four largest moons of Jupiter are easy to observe with a small telescope and are of continual interest, shifting positions from hour to hour and night to night in their neverending orbiting of their planet.

KEY SEPTEMBER 2022 NIGHT SKY EVENTS:

September 1–30: The Zodiacal Light (sunlight reflecting off dust particles orbiting the Sun) is faintly visible in the east for about an hour before dawn. Fourteen-century-old teachings of the Prophet Muhammad mentioned the Zodiacal Light, referring to it as 'Al-Fajr-al-Kadhib' or 'false dawn'.

September 10: The Moon is full at 3:58 AM. This full moon is known as the Harvest Moon because it's associated with the harvesting of crops.

September 15: The Summer Milky Way begins to set around 10 PM. By month's end, it will begin to set around 9 PM.

September 16: Neptune is at opposition to the Sun, as seen from Earth. The seventh planet from the Sun will be at its brightest and visible all night. That said, for most people, seeing blue Neptune will require binoculars or a telescope, due to its extreme distance from Earth.

September 22: The autumnal equinox occurs at 6:55 PM, marking the end of summer and the beginning of autumn in the Northern Hemisphere.

September 25: The Moon is new and not visible due to its proximity to the Sun.

September 26: Jupiter is at opposition to the Sun. This is the best time of year to view the Giant Planet since it's at its closest to Earth, is at its brightest, and is visible all night.
