OTHER ACTIVITIES INCLUDE:


- Painting a pony... seriously, dip brush into paint and apply to horse

BOARD CORNER

n lieu of the full text of the Minutes, we're starting a "Board Corner" column to inform the community of the actions taken at Board meetings and important happenings in the community.

LESSONS PROHIBITED BY INSURANCE

The ECIA's long-time insurance carrier, Cincinnati Insurance, has advised us that they will not provide insurance coverage to ECIA if we allow any sports lessons to be conducted on our property (this restriction does not apply to the Community Stables, which are covered by a separate farm and ranch insurance carrier). This includes but is not limited to swimming, tennis, and other active lessons.

The General Manager is seeking quotes from other homeowners association insurance carriers, because it is our goal to restore the ability to let fully insured teachers conduct lessons on ECIA property for ECIA residents. We will let you know if and when this restriction is lifted.

AMENITY CARD ACCESS TO DOG PARK

On **Aug. 23**, the Dog Park amenity card system went live. This is the same system we currently use at the pool and the courts. Please do not prop gates open for those who do not have their Amenity Card. Members in good standing are entitled to two cards per lot, for no charge.

GUEST POLICY

In June, the ECIA Board adopted the new guest policy: "Residents take priority over guests during play times at all ECIA amenities." The Board did not place any limits on the numbers of guests you may have accompany you to amenities, but your guests may not use the active amenities if residents are waiting. If you have questions about the new guest policy, please contact the ECIA office.

MAINTENANCE FACILITY

The Board approved hiring local contractor
Lockwood Construction to assemble the new maintenance
facility. The prefabricated building should be delivered
before the end of the year, and, weather permitting, it
should be assembled before spring. This maintenance
facility will replace the old, unheated maintenance barn
plus the storage sheds, shelters, and tarps. It will provide
secure storage for our equipment, a heated workspace
where the maintenance crew can better do their work
during the winter, and it will have a bathroom. ECIA's
maintenance crew has saved us thousands of dollars by
completing projects in-house that used to be outsourced to
third parties. This maintenance facility will better support
and enable them to continue to improve their efficiency and
productivity, to the benefit of the community.

THE MISSION of the Architecture Committee is to support the ECIA Board in implementing the Covenants and the Architectural Guidelines as residents submit plans for construction, addition or remodeling of homes and other structures. All built structures (including—but not limited to—things like fences, above-ground cisterns, sheds, and some kinds of landscaping) require a submission to the Architecture Committee for approval.

ARCHITECTURAL GUIDELINES REVISION: The Architecture Committee is in the midst of revising the ECIA's Architectural Guidelines and is seeking member input. The first draft of the revised Guidelines is posted on the home page of the ECIA website, together with a Comments and Suggestions form. The Committee will prepare a second draft based on comments received from members before holding public meetings for further input.

Architecture Committee meetings are open to all ECIA residents. It meets twice per month on the **second and fourth Tuesdays at 3 PM via Zoom**.

eptember is a month of change and a month to celebrate. September brings cooler temps, the Fall Equinox, and soothing green leaves becoming vibrant yellows. September brings fun celebration days like *National*

Talk Like a Pirate Day, National Coffee Ice Cream Day, and National Double Cheeseburger Day.

Also, however, it is important to note that September is associated with the Roman god Vulcan, the god of Fire. September is also the month dedicated to celebrating the very important *Be a Good Neighbor Day*.

GENW wants to remind everyone that although September brings change, it does not bring an end to *Fire Season. It is still with us.* GENW has posted fire safety steps on its website along with the Santa Fe County Fire Prevention Information and Evacuation Information. You may also directly contact Santa Fe County at **505 992-3070** for this information.

In addition, GENW wants all of us to remember to *be a good neighbor, one neighbor at a time*. Take a moment to think about what you might do to be a good neighbor. One very simple act might have a very big, positive impact on someone else and on our entire neighborhood, or on your own safety too.

For example, can you help a neighbor by picking up their mail when they are away? Can you be sure your dog or music is not loud after dark? Can you call the non-emergency Sheriff's number if you see a suspicious vehicle driving up and

down your block? Can you take a minute and check the height of your grasses and vegetation and make sure they wouldn't contribute to a fire? Can you call the Sheriff if a strange car is in your driveway or the driveway of the neighbor you know is away?

Safety and neighborliness begin with each one of us. GENW helps by providing simple tips and information to you as given to us by Law Enforcement and other County, National, and Private Public Safety Organizations.



Night Skies over Eldorado during September

s darkness falls this month, the Summer Milky Way bridges the sky from the SSW to the NNW horizons. Saturn and Jupiter rule the night sky, while Venus reemerges as the Morning Star.

Since there are no major night sky events in September, it's a good time to focus on the Moon. Even a pair of binoculars will show numerous craters on the Moon's surface; a telescope will show even more surface detail.

Essentially, the Moon appears white, with large splotches of gray, always showing the same face to us as it orbits the Earth. The white areas are the lunar highlands—geologically old areas, riddled with craters. The gray areas are lunar maria (Latin for 'seas'). The maria are flat basins, covered with solidified, iron-rich, basaltic magma. Because the maria (the singular form is 'mare') are geologically younger than the lunar highlands, they have significantly less cratering.

Interestingly, meteorite strikes on the far side of the Moon caused volcanic activity on the near side, creating the darker maria. By contrast, the far side is heavily cratered and nearly maria-free.

You might wonder why the Moon is so pockmarked with craters caused by the impact of countless meteorites, while nearby and much larger, Earth is relatively crater-free. The answer is three-fold. First, the Moon lacks an atmosphere, while the Earth's atmosphere incinerates most meteors before they reach the surface. Second, the Moon lacks surface water, while water covers three-quarters of Earth's surface. Meteorites that land in the ocean seldom leave a trace. Finally, the Moon lacks erosional forces, while wind and water on Earth erode geological features over time.

Ancient cultures tried to make sense of the splotchy images they discerned on the face of the Moon. Some saw a man in the moon, while others saw a woman's face, presented in profile.

In ancient China and other parts of Asia, people saw the image of a hare on the moon. In one origin story, a hungry old man asked several animals to feed him. The rabbit, unable to

gather food, threw itself into a fire, offering itself as a meal. The man, admiring the rabbit's offering, revealed himself to be Sakra, the Buddhist ruler of heaven. He drew the rabbit's image on the Moon.

Surprisingly, a similar origin story can be found in Aztec mythology. With no food, Quetzalcoatl was extremely hungry. A rabbit offered to let the god eat it. Quetzalcoatl was so impressed with the rabbit's proposal that he imprinted its image on the face of the Moon.

Is it coincidence that two ancient cultures living an ocean apart would see a rabbit on the Moon and have similar origin stories to explain its image?

KEY SEPTEMBER NIGHT SKY EVENTS:

Sept. 4: The waxing gibbous moon passes above Jupiter.

Sept. 11: The waning crescent moon passes close to the Beehive Cluster, with Venus nearby.

Sept. 14: New moon.

Sept. 19: The planet Neptune is at opposition, rising at sunset and setting at sunrise. While Neptune is at its closest point to Earth, it's so far away that it's only visible with optical aid.

Sept. 22: Mercury is at greatest western elongation, rising during dawn in Leo.

Sept. 23: The Autumnal Equinox occurs at **12:43 AM**, marking the first day of fall in the Northern Hemisphere. The Sun is over the equator and days and nights are of approximately equal length.

Sept. 29: A full supermoon occurs at **3:59 AM**. This is the Harvest Moon, the full moon closest to the Autumnal Equinox. The moonlight helps farmers continue to harvest their crops after sunset.

SAVE THE DATE FOR THE 31ST EACA STUDIO TOUR

The 31st Annual Art Studio Tour will be held **Saturday**, **Sept. 23 and Sunday Sept. 24**.

The Opening Reception will be held on **Friday**, **Sept. 22 from 5–7 PM** at the Community Center, giving you the opportunity to see samples of the art being shown by all 102 participating artists and to meet many of those artists. ldorado/285 Recycles (E285R) wants to be one of the first to congratulate Reunity Resources for setting up a Compost Drop-Off location at the La Tienda parking lot area. Now Eldorado residents have three choices when it comes to composting!

Both Reunity and E285R are non-profit organizations, and both have similar missions—to encourage citizens to be more sustainable in how they manage food waste. Instead of viewing Reunity as competitors in the compost business with E285R, we welcome them as partners. Straw bale composting is not for everyone. Not everyone loves worms like E285R does!

It is important to know the differences between the compost services offered before you decide which one is for you. The chart below describes the basic components of each method.

For both the Doorstep and Drop-off programs, Reunity uses the same composting method. Instead of worms as the active agent, they use aerated static piles. They also run a commercial composting service for restaurants and schools, so they are equipped to convert large quantities of food waste into

compost and soil in just a few months. The finished compost products are offered to Doorstep and Drop-off customers at a discounted price. Contact Reunity for the discounts.

The composted soil yield from backyard straw bale composting is tiny in comparison but satisfying to those who know that they have completely recycled their food waste themselves.

Besides cost, the big difference between the three methods is the type of additives each method offers. Reunity takes all, repeat ALL food wastes, including leftover meats, pastas, gooey sauces, and all certified compostable containers. The straw bale system takes mainly veggie/fruit wastes, coffee/tea filters and grounds.
